AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Thousands of Inquiries Received.
Inquiries from more than 2000 persons and concerns in North and South America and Europe were received by the chamber of commerce during March, says the Spokesman-Review.

Letters requesting that the senders be furnished with special information and literature were received from every state in the Union and every province in Canada. All the principal countries in Europe are represented among those whose letters to the chamber of commerce show their interest in the Spokane country. The majority of the inquiries from within the United States came from the middle and middle-west states. Several letters were received from people in Mexico and South American countries and European communications came from England, France, Holland, Germany, Russia, and Switzerland.

A letter was received from W. J. Collins of Volant, Pa., announcing that he will leave Newcastle, Pa., the latter part of this month at the head of a party of 37, which will visit Spokane and go on a land-spying expedition through the inland empire. The personnel of the party is largely made up of farmers and includes merchants, civil engineers and tradesmen.

Loss of Lambs Has Been Light.

Lambing was commenced the first of the week in Morrow county. Although the weather conditions were rather bad the loss of lambs has been light so far. The sheepmen are generally very well prepared for that work, most of them having shed room enough for the earlier lambs, and better weather is expected by the time the season is well under way, says the Heppner Times.

The percentage in the loss of lambs has materially decreased the past few years in this county. One reason for this is because the flockmen have prepared sheds, another is because they put up more hay and feed their flocks better, thus placing them in better condition for the blustery March and early April cold blasts. The play of tagging their ewes a couple or three weeks before lambing commences also puts the ewes in better condition. These have all proved great factors in reducing the loss in lambing.

BOURNE IS MUM.

Senator Refuses to Discuss the Harvey Scott Deal.

A Washington dispatch to the Oregon Daily Journal says of Senator Bourne's attitude on the legislative corruption at Salem in 1903, as detailed by Lincoln Steffens:

Senator Bourne refuses absolutely either to confirm or to deny Lincoln Steffens' story in the March American Magazine, to the effect that Harvey W. Scott entered into a deal with Bourne in 1903, whereby the editor expected to be elected to the United States senate.

"I have not read the Steffens story and I don't propose to," is Bourne's invariable answer to all inquiries on the subject. He declines absolutely to discuss the matter any further. When asked point blank whether he had an agreement with Scott as to the senatorship in 1903, he declined positively to be interviewed.

The deal alleged by Steffens to have been made between Harvey W. Scott and Jonathan Bourne is related in an article published in the March issue of the American Magazine. Steffens says that on the last day of the legislative session of 1903, Mr. Scott wrote out with his own hand the following agreement, which was then transmitted to Bourne:

"In case I receive Jonathan Bourne, Jr.'s support for United States senator at the joint session of the legislature tonight, I hereby agree to use the full power of the Morning Oregonian and the Evening Telegram to defeat John H. Mitchell at the next senatorial election and elect Jonathan Bourne, Jr. in his place.

"I further agree that if I receive the support of Jonathan Bourne, Jr. for United States senator in the joint session of the legislature tonight that if elected I will turn all the federal patronage over to Jonathan Bourne, Jr.

"I hereby further agree in lieu (view?) of receiving the support of Jonathan Bourne tonight at the joint session of the legislature that whether elected or not I will pay to Jonathan Bourne \$25,000 in United States gold coin."

HEAVY FINES FOR GAMBLERS.

Bobo Tinchorns Get the Limit in Idaho Court.

J. H. Shanks was assessed \$250 on a plea of guilty. P. J. Doherty \$200 and J. S. Durke discharged, on motion of Prosecuting Attorney Koelsch and J. D. Dorn released, he turning witness for the state, says the Boise Capital News. This was the result of the trial in probate court this afternoon for alleged gambling contrary to state law.

Both Shanks and Doherty plead guilty to the charge, the former receiving a heavier fine on account of

the fact that he was one of the proprietors of the barber shop and cigar store, where the quartet was arrested. Drake, the other proprietor of the shop, was released upon motion of the county attorney, who stated that after investigating the case that he considered that Shanks was responsible for the gambling.

Dorn, who had agreed to testify for the state in the event that the other three stood trial, was released without being fined after it was ascertained that his evidence would not be necessary.
