



STATEMENT NO 1 HEADS THE LIST

Out of 75 Members of the
Legislature to be Elected,
66 are for People's Choice.

LOOKS LIKE SWEEPING
VICTORY AT PRIMARIES.

A Total of 158 Candidates for the
Legislature Have Filed Petitions,
and of This Number 66 Are for
Statement No. 1, 55 Are for Repub-
lican Voters' Choice and 36 Are Un-
pledged—With But 60 Members of
the House to Be Elected 53 Can-
didates Are for the Statement.

What looks to be a sweeping victory
for the statement No. 1 forces
of Oregon is indicated by the peti-
tions of legislators now on file for
the primary election.

Out of a total of 75 members of
the legislature to be elected, there
are 66 candidates pledged to state-
ment No. 1 in the different counties in
the state.

A total of 158 candidates for the
legislature have filed petitions for
the primary election, of this number 66
are pledged to statement No. 1, 55
are pledged to the republican voters'
choice and 36 are unpledged.

For representatives, there are 120
candidates and of this number 56 are
for statement No. 1, 41 are for the
republican voters' choice and 26 are
unpledged. Sixty representatives are
to be elected. For the senate there
are 38 candidates, 13 of whom are
pledged to statement No. 1, 15 for the
republican voters' choice and 10 are
unpledged.

WILL ASK WESTON FOR A FRANCHISE

WALLA WALLA ELECTRIC LINE WORKS WESTWARD

Right-of-Way Secured and Surveys
Made Practically the Entire Dis-
tance Between Milton and Weston—
Representatives of the Company
Will Appear Before Weston Council
April 15—Plans for Pendleton.

On April 15 representatives of the
Walla Walla Traction company, which
operates the electric railway between
Walla Walla and Milton, will appear
before the city council of Weston to
ask for a franchise for the construc-
tion of an electric railway through
Weston's streets, and it is believed
that within six months the line will
be extended to that place.

Surveying crews, as announced
from time to time in the East Ore-
gonian, have been at work between
Milton and Weston for the past month
and it is said that practically all of
the right-of-way between the two
towns has been secured already.

Ties for 100 miles of new line have
also been ordered, and agents of the
company, while reticent as to the ex-
act plans of the company, are yet very
active in the vicinity of Weston, Ath-
ena and Milton, and are making loca-
tions and securing right-of-way in a
business like and energetic manner.

Weston will grant the franchise to
be asked for, it is thought, without
hesitation and will give the company
every inducement to build its line to
that place.

There is not the least doubt about
the intention of the Walla Walla Traction
company to build to Pendleton,
according to the statements of those
who are in position to know, and it is
thought that as soon as the Weston
franchise is secured that work will be-
gin between Weston and Pendleton to
secure right-of-way and franchises, if
needed.

Ruef Affidavits Sent Broadcast.

Portland, April 6.—Hundreds of
copies of the affidavit of Abraham
Ruef's attack on the graft prosecution
and protecting the "higher ups" con-
cerned in the San Francisco graft pro-
secution, which was filed on March 20,
have been mailed into the Pacific
northwest and will be read by hun-
dreds in Oregon this week. The reason
why Ruef's press bureau should
get so active outside of California is
not known at present.

SALEM MINISTER HORSEWHIPPED

Women Arrested for Breaking
Up a Religious Meeting
Saturday Night.

REV. COFFEY ASSAULTED
FOUR TIMES IN SIX MONTHS

Church Fight at Salem Resulted in
Suspension of J. F. Goode, and This
Is Followed by Assault on Minister
—Mrs. Nettie Rhoades and Miss
Lulu Good, Sisters, Under Arrest—
Husband and Brother Assisted.

Salem, April 6.—As the result of an
assault Saturday night, Mrs. Nettie
Rhoades and Lulu Good, sisters, were
arrested this morning charged with
breaking up a religious meeting and
were brought before Judge Webster,
where they pleaded not guilty.

In the preliminary examination it
developed that the two women, ac-
companied by the husband and brother,
met Presiding Elder W. H. Coffey
of the district Free Methodist church
and horsewhipped him.

The women allege that Coffey made
certain statements about them which
they did not like. Rev. Coffey states
the trouble grows out of charges
against J. F. Goode, upon which the
latter was suspended from the church.

He asserts that this is the fourth
time he has been assaulted since last
November.

CAUGHT ROBBING A CAR.

O. R. & N. Train Crew Locked Rob-
bers in Car Until Officers Arrived.

Caught in the act of robbing a
freight train at Hermiston yesterday,
B. M. Elliot and William Tripp were
locked up in the car by the trainmen
and last night they were brought to
this city by E. B. Wood, O. R. & N.
detective. After their arrival here
they admitted their guilt to the offi-
cers.

The attempted robbery occurred on
freight train No. 55, westbound, yester-
day. While at Hermiston the trainmen
chanced to look into a box
car and found the two men busily
engaged in helping themselves to var-
ious articles from boxes they had
broken open.

Shutting the car door fast the pris-
oners were given an unwished for
ride to Umatilla. At that place they
were turned over to Detective Wood.

This morning the two boxcar rob-
bers were taken before Judge Bean
and pleaded guilty to the charges
against them. They will be sentenced
on Thursday.

Barrett, the check forger who was
caught with a pitchfork by the Helix
barber, was given a sentence of three
years this morning.

VOTE ON SUNDAY CLOSING.

Intense Interest in Coming Municipal
Election in Chicago.

Chicago, April 6.—Popular inter-
est in tomorrow's spring election in
Chicago is intense, the overshadowing
issue being the popular vote on the
Sunday saloon question. Both those

of a large outpouring of voters. The
foreigners have led the fight for Sun-
day opening, and secured the signa-
ture of 168,062 voters to the petition
asking that the question be submitted
to a popular vote.

PORTLAND FEARS HIGHBINDER WAR

Ten Hatchet and Gun Men
Are Imported From San
Francisco.

MURDEROUS GANG SEEK-
ING TO ENTER THE CITY.

Bitter Tong War Is Threatened by
the Raising of a Fund of \$1000 by
Astoria Chinese to Continue the
Fight—Rival Tongs Are Armed
and Ready for the Fray—Noted
Gun Fighter of San Francisco
Leads the Gang.

Portland, April 6.—With 10 San
Francisco hatchet men, headed by Lim
Ga Gee, a noted gun fighter, skulk-
ing in the suburbs of Portland await-
ing an opportunity to enter the city
without the knowledge of the police,
there is a renewal of anxiety over the
possible outbreak of the factional war
in Bong On Tong feud.

This war has already resulted in
one murder, one attempt at arson and
two mysterious disappearances among
local Chinese.

Now Astoria and San Francisco
tongs have taken a hand. The As-
toria tong has raised \$1000 to import
10 San Francisco gun fighters to
Portland in order to square the grievance
they have with the local Bow
Ongs in regard to the difference of
opinion over a cannery contract. The
police are watching every entrance
to the city to prevent the Chinese from
coming in.

IS FULTON BEING SHADOWED?

Mysterious Stenographers Take Notes
of Speeches.

Portland, April 6.—Who the em-
ployers of the two mysterious steno-
graphers are who have shadowed Sen-
ator Fulton through his entire speak-
ing campaign and who have taken
notes of every speech, would be wel-
come information at the Fulton head-
quarters. The stenographers were not
discovered until Saturday night at Se-
lew, when a Fulton man who has ac-
companied the senator throughout his
trip located them in the back of the
hall.

The theory is advanced that they
may be employed by J. S. Smith, ex-
senator, who is suing Fulton for slan-
der, or they may be in the employ of
Governor Chamberlain, who wanted
to get complete copies of Fulton's
speech for campaign purposes.

Rioting in Lisbon.

Lisbon, April 6.—Serious rioting
continued today between the troops
and voters, and scores are believed to
be killed and wounded. The news-
paper offices supporting Franco's policy
were stoned.

Inspect Father of Waters.

St. Louis, April 6.—Members of
the Mississippi River commission left
St. Louis today on the steamer Miss-
issippi for the annual inspection of
levees. Hearings will be held in sev-
eral cities during the course of the
trip down the river.

Dr. Patton in Milwaukee.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 6.—Dr.
Francis Landey Patton, president of
Princeton Theological seminary, will
deliver a series of lectures on theo-
logical topics in Milwaukee this week,
beginning tonight.

INJURED BY STANDPIPE.

Philip Cunha, O. R. & N. Car Repair-
er, Severely Bruised.

Philip Cunha, car repairer for the
O. R. & N. company, was seriously
hurt at 1:30 yesterday afternoon by
striking his head against the iron
standpipe by the depot while riding a
coach along the track. He was un-
conscious until early this morning,
when he revived somewhat and is
now resting well. However, Dr.
Cole, who is in attendance, says it
will require 48 hours before it can
be told definitely how dangerously he
was injured.

The accident occurred just after the
arrival of train No. 1 yesterday. With
that train were three special cars
bearing the Chicago orchestra com-
pany, bound for Walla Walla.

The cars were being transferred to
the Spokane line and Cunha, in his
capacity as car repairer, was over-
looking the cars. He was riding on
the steps of one of the coaches and
as the switching train was running
westward down the track he glanced
in the opposite direction. While do-
ing so the train passed the standpipe
and Cunha, who was holding on to
the hand bars, was dashed against
the pipe.

When picked up he was uncon-
scious and it was feared that he had
been fatally injured. He was taken
to the hospital by Dr. Cole in his
auto immediately after the accident.

The injured man is a nephew of
Joseph Cunha, the Echo sheepman,
and of Mrs. Vey. He is 27 years of
age and was popular among the rail-
road men, all of whom regret the ac-
cident.

Convicted Promoter Appeals.

St. Paul, Minn., April 6.—Samuel A.
Phillips, a promoter, who was recently
convicted of embezzlement and sen-
tenced to seven years in prison, will
appear before the state supreme court
tomorrow on an appeal. Phillips was
northwestern agent for the sale of
stock of the Chicago-New York Air
Line, a projected electric railway.

DRAGGED TO DEATH BY SADDLE HORSE

FRITZ ELLENBERGER MET HORRIBLE FATE SATURDAY.

Young Man Instantly Killed While
Riding on Father's Farm in Alkali
Canyon—Body Terribly Mangled
and Left Hanging on Gate Through
Which the Horse Plunged—Funeral
at Pilot Rock Was Largely At-
tended.

Fritz B. Ellenberger, son of Fred
Ellenberger of Alkali canyon, met a
horrible death Saturday through be-
ing thrown from his horse and drag-
ged for a distance of several hundred
yards. His lifeless body was found
some hours later hanging against a
gate through which his frightened
horse had plunged.

Ellenberger was killed early Satur-
day morning. At that time he was
riding on his father's place and his
horse stepped into a badger hole. It
is presumed that the jolt threw the
young man from his horse and that
his foot caught in one of the stirrups.
The horse then started to run and
dragged his helpless master under
him.

Coming to a closed gate the animal
dashed against it, breaking it down.
As the horse passed through the gate
Ellenberger's body struck the same
and was thereby freed from the
horse.

There were no eye-witnesses to the
accident but Ellenberger was still
alive when found by one of the War-
ner boys. Dr. Parker of Pilot Rock,
was summoned and reached the scene
before the injured man died. How-
ever, he could do little to save him.
Owing to the fact that witnesses were
present when Ellenberger died no in-
quest was held by Coroner Folsom.

Fritz Ellenberger was 23 years of
age and was born in Switzerland. He
was a single man and had been work-
ing for K. G. Warner, the sheepman.
Among those who knew him the de-
ceased was well liked and respected.
His funeral, which occurred at Pilot
Rock at 2 o'clock this afternoon, was
largely attended.

Raised Price of State "Grab."

Governor Buchtel of Colorado, has
raised the price of board to Wyom-
ing's wards at the Golden Industrial
school, also at the deaf and blind as-
ylum at Colorado Springs, and at the
Good Shepherd home in Denver, to
Governor Bryant B. Brooks of Wyom-
ing and his charity and reform board
went down to Denver to see whether
they are getting their money's worth
in the care of its girls and boys, says
the Cheyenne Tribune. Wyoming has
no reform, industrial or deaf and
blind institutions, so it sends its wards
to Colorado for care. Up to January
1, their board was \$16.50 a month.
Since then Colorado has raised the
price to \$20. There are 17 Wyoming
boys at the Golden school, eight at
the deaf and blind asylum and two
girls in the House of the Good Shep-
herd.

TEUTSCH STOCK RINGS 56 CENTS

G. M. Rice Bid in Bankrupt
Stock for First National
Bank.

INVOICE SHOWED A TOTAL
VALUE OF \$39,000

Bids on the Big Stock Started at 20
Cents, But Soon Ran Up—Bidding
Was Active and Many Prominent
Merchants Were Present—J. A.
Cobb Next Highest Bid With 25
Cents—Store Will Probably Open.

For 56 cents upon the dollar the
stock of the Teutsch department store
was bid in by G. M. Rice, cashier of
the First National bank, this morning.
The price offered means that \$21,000
will be paid for the store and that the
Teutsch creditors will receive in the
vicinity of 50 cents upon the dollar
for their claims.

This afternoon Charles H. Carter,
attorney for the bankrupt estate, is
preparing an order directing that the
sale of the stock at 56 cents on the
dollar be confirmed. Whether or not
the sale will be confirmed by Judge
FitzGerald remains to be seen. This
afternoon he stated that he would
confirm the sale unless something un-
expected occurred or was brought to
light.

When seen this afternoon Mr. Rice
was found reticent to say anything
concerning the bank's intentions with
the referee has passed upon the mat-
ter. However, he declared that should
the sale be confirmed the store will be
continued as a business.

By 10 o'clock this forenoon a crowd
had gathered in front of the Teutsch
store, the greater portion being at-
tracted through curiosity.

Addressing the crowd T. C. Taylor,
trustee, made an extended statement
regarding the stock and the conditions
of the sale. He said the sale would
be made with the recent invoice as a
basis. The invoice showed the stock
valued at slightly above \$39,000 and
was made under his supervision. He
stated that the stock would be sold as
a whole and that bidders should offer
a certain amount on the dollar for the
entire store, which included the fix-
tures and the interest in the lease
upon the location.

Thirty cents upon the dollar was
the opening bid, but it was soon
raised. By gradual advances the offer
was increased until the 50 mark was
passed. From that point it was raised
to 56 cents. J. A. Cobb, who is to
open a new store on Court street, was
the next highest bidder, having offered
55 cents upon the dollar for the
stock.

Among others who were in the
crowd and participated in the bidding
were Joseph Basler, R. C. Beach of
Leviston, Albert Wurzwiler of Je-
seph, Leon Cohen, C. E. Roosevelt and
R. Alexander.

Following the sale of the stock a
horse belonging to the estate was auc-
tioned off and was bought for \$40 by
Jack Beam.

The store accounts, amounting to
upwards of \$500, were taken by Ly-
man Rice, son of G. M. Rice, for
\$202.50.

Fifteen Teachers Will Wed.

school teachers have come to the con-
clusion that the life of bachelor maids
is not as happy as one would suppose
and each and every one of them has
become engaged. The 15 hands that
wield the switch and rule the world
have been given in promise to 15
lucky young men. The teachers have
resigned their positions and 15 vacan-
cies will have to be filled by as many
aspirants who now have their appli-
cations in for the plums. Housekeep-
ing, it is said by one of the teachers, is
preferable to single life, for what
is home without a husband.

All Clackamas candidates have
signed statement No. 1 and are now
on the same footing for the primary.

THE GERMAN SYSTEM FOR STANFORD, MAYBE

Portland, April 6.—If plans
contemplated by President Da-
vid Starr Jordan are approved
by the board of trustees, the
entry system at Stanford may
be changed from the English
standard to that of the German.
This change will take place
within the next five years. It
means the elimination of the
freshmen and sophomore classes
and the separation of all the
purely college courses from
those of the university standard.
