HERMISTON NOTES NEWS OF WESTON

IRRIGATION DISTRICT WILL GET SHARE OF HOMESEEKERS

Everything Looks Good in West End of County—Preparations Being Made for Teachers' Institute Next Saturday—Lectures on Fruit Growing and Agriculture—Fire Company in Hermiston—Has Fine Team of Horses.

Hermiston, April 6.—Hermiston and the east end of the county promises to get their share of the homes-seekers that are coming west this spring. People want small farms, and this is the place to find them. Water can be secured from the government this season; and everything is in fair way to success for the fertile lands under the Umatilla project and other irrigation concerns in this vicinity of the county.

Teachers' Institute.

A teachers' institute will be held here next Saturday for the teachers in this end of the county. The program will be very interesting and instructive, including addresses by County Superintendent Frank K. Welles, Attorney F. H. Bartlett, Professor Keeler of the Echo schools, Attorney O. P. Morton, Mrs. Augusta Moulie, A. H. Perryman and others. Attorney Oliver P. Morton, attorney for the reclamation service is arranging to leave in a few days time for the Okanogan country in Washington, where he will look after the legal affairs of the Okanogan project.

All things are moving along nicely on the Umatilla project, and where tests have been made in running water over lands in the vicinity, all has been satisfactory.

Professor I. C. Lewis of the Oregon Agricultural experimental station, at Corvallis, recently conducted two meetings at the Hermiston hall. He gave some very good information as to how to plant fruit trees, etc. The meetings were well attended.

A number of the progressive citizens are taking steps to organize a fire company in Hermiston.

Colonel J. F. McNaught is driving a fine team of horses which he recently purchased from Jack Brown, the well known Pendleton wool buyer. It is one of the finest teams in this section of the county. Colonel McNaught is very enthusiastic over the fine new livery barn which is being erected here, and which will soon be ready for use. He says that some of the finest horses and turnouts in the state will be found here.

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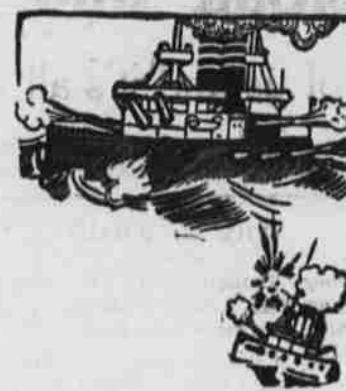
