GROWTH OF IMPORTS AND EXPORTS OF THE PHILIPPINES

Consul Jacob E. Conner of Saigon, Cochinchina, sends the following summarized report upon the commerce of the Philippines for the year 1907, as shown by the annual report of the bureau of customs:

The total value of Philippine imports last year was \$29,666,140, an increase of 15 per cent over that of the preceding year. The total value of exports was \$34,127,253, an increase of 4 per cent. The imports from the leading countries were as follows:

United States, \$5,664,254; England, \$6,028,046; Germany, \$1,655,422; Spain, \$1,756,667; Chinese Empire, \$2,759,715; Japan, \$1,010,043; British Australia, \$1,753,874; British East Indies, \$1,626,299; French East Indies, \$3,474,236.

French East Indies, of which Sai-

gon is the chief port, for some years at the head of the list, dropped from first place in 1905 to third in 1907, on account of the decline of importations of rice. This decline is in turn due to the fact that the Philippines are supplying their own needs more completely in that commodity. Also that wheat flour is taking the place of rice, as indicated by the growth of the former.

It is to be noted that imports from the United States have gained in about the same proportion as have those of England, in spite of the fact that the carrying trade of the United States shows a marked decline, while that of England has noticeably increased. A few of the leading imports and the values thereof are:

Cotton, closely woven cloth, \$4,667,059; cotton, loosely woven cloth, \$1,405,691; cotton, yard and thread, \$1,321,778; cotton, knit fabrics, \$900,000; rice, \$3,662,493; cattle, \$1,058,534; wheat flour, \$589,174; iron and steel and manufactures of \$2544,992.

Imports of illuminating oil have practically doubled during the year, amounting in all to \$790,447. Of this the United States supplied \$551,699, an increase of \$279,468. But the percentage of the United States in the total traffic fell from 75 to 69, while that of the Dutch East Indies increased from 12 to 25 and the British East Indies from nothing to 4. Russia dropped out of the competition.

Of the \$900,000 worth of wheat flour imported, less than \$400,000 worth came from the United States. Australia's percentage has risen gradually to 8. The report states that "it can hardly be doubted that the application of the coastwise trade laws in 1909 will probably give this entire trade to Australia."

Iron and steel imports from the United States increased in volume but fell in percentage of the whole of such imports from 38 to 33. Imports of distilled spirits show a slight gain, but the trade of the United States is actually and relatively less than in preceding years, being at present but 25 per cent.

The race for supremacy in the import trade of the Philippine islands lies between the United States and England.

Hemp the Leading Export—the Carrying Trade.

The values of exports, inclusive of currency, during the past year is the greatest in the history of American occupation. More than a third of the values went to the United States, while England ranked second and France third as a customer.

Hemp is still the chief article of export, the value amounting to \$21,085,081, or 41 per cent of the total exports, a gain during the year of \$1,638,312. This was largely due to an advance in price, though the tonnage also increased. More than half of the crop went to the United States.

Marked changes are observed in the carrying trade during the past year. British vessels carried 56 per cent of the volume of imports and 76 per cent of the exports for 1907, an increase for the former from \$14,840,984 to \$16,697,111, and for the latter from \$25,294,385 to \$26,015,019. Spanish, German, Japanese and Philippine vessels show a decline in import cargo trade from \$1,753,266 in 1906 to \$342,940 in 1907, and an equally marked decline in the export trade. Of imports from the United States only 16.6 per cent was carried in American bottoms.

Unless more American bottoms are to be found for the traffic at competitive freight rates, the traffic must necessarily go to other countries in

foreign bottoms. Up to the present there is no reason to expect any other result.

FORTUNE FROM SAND DUNES

Founder of the Town of Roosevelt on North Bank Road Was Wise.

"Thomas B. Montgomery knew what he was doing when he went, five years ago, into that part of Klickitat county north of Arlington, Ore., known as the sage and sad flats of the Columbia valley, and bought something over three sections of this land that had been much sought by sheepmen for winter range and early lambing," said one of Mr. Montgomery's friends in Lyle today to the Portland Oregonian.

Mr. Montgomery came to Goldendale nine years ago and accepted a cashier's position in a bank that Walter H. Moore had started. Previous to this time Mr. Montgomery had seen the transformation of sage and sand dunes in California into great vineyards of Muscat and Flame Tokay grapes. After he had conducted the bank for four years the institution was sold.

About this time the voters nominated and elected him treasurer of Klickitat county. He served four years. During his term he ascertained the north bank road would be built. He had not forgotten what he had seen growing in the vineyards about The Dalles and Arlington, Ore.

So just five years ago Mr. Montgomery, who had come to the Pacific coast from New York, hid himself to the owners of the desolate sage and sand flats opposite Arlington, Ore., on the Washington side, and purchased from them cheap. Later he platted the town of Roosevelt and built some business houses that at once found ready occupants.

The doubting Thomases about Goldendale predicted the ex-banker had reached the end of his rope. The founder of the future Fresno of the Columbia valley, after his term of office as county treasurer had expired, moved to the new town.

For a time he did nothing but collect rents, talked up the town and the similarity of the Columbia and the Sacramento valleys as the home of the grape. Some months ago, after the North Bank road had laid its track to the town, there came one day some strange gentlemen to Roosevelt.

One of the party made a careful examination of the soils on Mr. Montgomery's lands and it has been learned since that the man was an expert on soils. Another of the party seemed to be an engineer who was looking over the possibilities of water for the town and adjacent lands. Today the reported sale of a part of the townsite of Roosevelt and adjoining three sections to a Seattle syndicate headed by Samuel Hill for the sum of \$54,000 is confirmed by Mr. Montgomery.

First Beets Seeded for 1908.

The first seeding of the 2500 acres approximately, which will be planted to sugar beets in this valley by the Amalgamated Sugar company this year, was done Saturday and from now on until the work is completed, crews of men will be actively engaged in this work.

The ground upon which the initial seeding was done is located in the La Grande district. Of course, there are patches of ground which are still too wet to be worked and prepared for the seeding, but there is plenty of dry ground on which to commence the spring work.

Plowing is in progress in various parts of the valley and if the warm weather continues each day will see large quantities of beet seed placed in the ground.—La Grande Observer.
