today, after having acted as convey for quite a large party of Pendleton people to whom he had been explaining the merits of the project. "All that we promised and more too, is being done in furtherance of the great scheme of development at that point. The magnificent pumping plant station, to complete which a large force of men has been continuously employed for some months, is now ready to go to work, the last of the machinery having been installed and tested this week. At the power plant, seventeen miles above the pumping station, all of the very substantial buildings have been completed and the entire equipment of machinery is on the ground and being set up as rapidly as men and their movements, consistent with good work, can accomplish it.

Judge Hanford and a number of others interested in the promotion of this great project, spent last Sunday making an inspection of the work thus far completed and going over other plans for the future. That they were particularly well pleased with the present condition of affairs is putting it mildly. Some of them grew quite enthusiastic before they departed and from my point of view they had a right to, as in all my observation and experience with colonization and community development enterprises I have never seen anything in which recognition of merit by real homebuilders and home builders has been so spontaneous.

"In a comparatively short time we will have all of the points along the routes of the various enterprises connected up by telephone and in turn with the outside world. The line from the power plant to Hanford is now completed and should be into Kennewick within the next 30 days.

"The heavy copper wires are now up from the power plant to pumping station and the finishing touches will be placed within a few days. The copper will be continued on to Hanford at once and when finished the 'juice' will be turned on and the town will have a lighting system. Immediately following the lighting plant a city water system will be constructed. This will be on such a scale as to conclusively prove to all that those in control expect to see Hanford grow to a very pretentious place within a comparatively short time.

"This week the Columbia Herald will make its appearance under the editorship and management of W. W. Watkins, a very clever journalist, who has promised a newspaper that will be in the van of all progressive enterprises up that way.

"The most satisfactory thing to me, however, that I noticed on this trip, was the extent of the planting of trees, gardens and berry patches. The weather has been very propitious for such work and for the rapid growth of anything placed in the ground. As for the climate, why, man, it rivals the balmy Mediterranean at its most delightful point. Scoffers may question, but the proof is there and we will show all 'Missourians'."

HARVARD TO OPEN SEASON.

Baseball Schedule for Big University Is Arranged.

Cambridge, Mass., April 7.—Determined to maintain the prestige it won on the diamond last year, the Crimson nine will open the baseball season tomorrow. The fast team of Wesleyan college, which in the past has given Harvard some hard tussles, will oppose the Crimson on the Cambridge grounds in tomorrow's contest.

Harvard will play 27 games this year. Two new games have been added to the schedule, Georgetown and Fordham, while Columbia and West Point have been dropped.

The game with Georgetown university at Washington will mark the resumption of athletic relations with that institution, broken off some years ago because Harvard played a colored man on its team. In case of ties with Yale and Princeton, the extra games will be played in New York. The complete schedule is as follows:
