AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Competition Cuts Phone Rates.

The advent of the Home Telephone company, which expects to begin service in this city in August, has resulted in the establishment of a lower rate on two-party lines by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, says the Spokesman-Review. The new rate in effect gives former subscribers on a two-party line an extension telephone in addition to the original instrument at the rate formerly charged for a single instrument.

Until a short time ago the old company charged \$2.50 a month for connection on a telephone line supplying two subscribers, and 50 cents additional for an extension phone. It now makes a rate of \$2 a month for a single instrument and 50 cents a month for the extension, supplying both for the rate formerly charged for one.

Instead of making the proposition as a lower rate for a two-party line, solicitors for the old company are offering subscribers under the old rate an extension telephone in addition at the rate heretofore charged for a single instrument, the only provision required being that the subscribers renew their contracts for a year in advance.

Cut Grain Sack Prices.

As a result of the organization of the Farmers' Educational and Protective union, the farmers of Nez Perce prairie will save not less than \$16,000 on their grain sacks, says an item from Nez Perce. Although the price of grain sacks is considerably lower than last year the union has succeeded in securing a larger reduction because of the sharp competition of grain bag companies. Last year the farmers used 400,000 sacks for which they paid 11 cents each, but the bids for the same quality of bags this year indicate that they will cost less than 7 cents each.

The bids were opened but no contract will be let as the union hopes to secure a still further reduction in the price as several other bids are yet to be submitted. Sharp competition for the business has caused price cutting which will result in a saving for the growers. Besides discussing the sack question the local union initiated 25 new members and a number of applications were received. It is believed that the Nez Perce union will become the largest local in the northwest.

CARRIED \$45,000 IN GRIPSACK.

Yakima Paper Tells Good Story of an Alleged Oregon Farmer.

Carrying \$45,000 in gold in a gripsack, an aged Oregon rancher passed through North Yakima Friday on his way to Lewiston, Idaho, says the Yakima Republic. He was proud, rather than fearful, of his money and did not hesitate to communicate the fact of its presence to those with whom he engaged in conversation.

"Yes," he said, "I have got my money with me; right here in this here satchel," and he produced a grip which contained gold, or lead or bricks.

"You see," he said, "it is this way. I am just fooling those boys of mine. I got a couple of big, lazy sons who think they should live on the old man's money. They ought to get out and rustle and then I would be willing to whack up a little, but you see I can't bear the whole burden. I been selling out. Yes, sir; I just got rid of all my holdings down in Oregon and got the money for them. Yes, sir. Now I am going to Lewiston, Idaho, and ain't letting them know a thing about it. That's where I'm going, and the old man is just going to fool them."

"Kinda foolish to tell about it, you think, and to carry so much money with me? Think I ought to put it in the bank. Well, sir, I kinda been taking care of myself for a considerable time and I judged I must do it some longer, so I am taking the whole thing to Lewiston, Idaho; I am."

Another man with money was in North Yakima. He was rounded up by the police, who found that he was carrying a gun. He was from Easton, he said, and had put his property into cash and bought a gun to protect it. When searched he was found to have \$2.30. Justice Doust ordered the gun confiscated and a fine of \$10 assessed. The fine was paid, the man going with a policeman to where he had made a cache.

RAISE BIG SUM.

Salemces Raise \$100,000 Towards a Million Dollar Endowment to Willamette.

In Salem yesterday was completed the first \$10,000 of a proposed million dollar endowment fund for Willamette university.

Thanks are due to the loyal people of Salem, for they pledged \$30,000 of the \$100,000, a much larger sum than was contributed by any other city, excepting Portland, and her contributions were mostly by a few wealthy men. No one in Salem gave more than \$1000, excepting J. C. Thompson whose gift is now counted at \$1000, net, but will probably realize \$2500, says the Salem Statesman.

This \$100,000 endowment fund means great things for old Willamette. It means a \$250,000 endowment fund by the time of the June

At present 12 inches of the ore is being saved for shipping, the lowest assay from which is \$35 per ton.

Owing to the bad roads from the mine to Sumpter, caused by "the spring breakup," no shipments have been made for several weeks, and will not be till they are in condition for heavy traffic. In the meantime ore is accumulating on the dumps in quantities that will keep the teamsters busy.

Mr. Berkeley is understood to be in the east at present in the interest of Buffalo-Monitor and other properties of this section.
