MRS. E. B. BAKER, PIONEER, IS DEAD

WESTON WOMAN DIED OF PNEUMONIA TODAY.

Mrs. Elizabeth Butler Baker, Aged 85, Passed Away This Morning After Brief Illness—Husband, J. W. Baker, Died Three Years Ago—Is Survived by Son and Daughter, Both of Weston.

Weston, April 7.—(Special to the East Oregonian.)—Mrs. Elizabeth B. Baker, one of the best known and most highly respected women of this vicinity, died here this morning from pneumonia. She will be buried here tomorrow at 11 o'clock, the service being held at the Baker home and conducted by Rev. Charles Quinney, rector of the Episcopal church of Pendleton.

The deceased was 85 years of age and was born in New London, Conn. She lived in Brooklyn, N. Y., during the greater portion of her lifetime and came to Weston with her husband, J. W. Baker, 14 years ago. Her husband died three years after their arrival. Since that time she made her home with her son, M. A. Baker, postmaster of Weston. She is also survived by a daughter, Miss Maude Baker of this place.

Mrs. Baker was a woman of much education and refinement and during her residence in Weston became widely known among the people of the town and vicinity. She was universally esteemed and much regret is expressed over her death. She was an Episcopalian.

ELECTRIC LINES REACHING OUT

NETWORK OF LINES TO COVER INLAND EMPIRE.

Franchise to Use Walla Walla County Roads Is Requested From County Commissioners—Plans of New Company Are to Build Toward Pendleton With Feeders to Walla Walla, Bingham Springs and Elsewhere.

Activity in the development of the electric lines in the inland empire shows within a few years the entire section of country from Spokane to Umatilla will be covered with a network of lines. The consolidation of the Walla Walla Traction and the Oregon & Washington lines at Walla Walla and the efforts to secure additional franchises and right of way for the new company in the direction of Pendleton is evidence that this city is the objective point of the company.

On next Monday evening the company present a formal application to the city council of Weston for a franchise to use the streets of that town and work of securing right of way between Weston and Milton is being carried on constantly.

The Walla Walla Statesman of Monday says of the activity of the new company and of its plans for the development of this section of Oregon:

Franchise was asked from the county commissioners this afternoon by the Washington-Oregon Traction company to run their line along the county road, leaving the city limits at the cemetery and thence along the east side of the cemetery for half a mile. Here the line enters the private property and consent of the county officials is not necessary. The franchise will probably be granted.

This is another step in the development of the electric road, the announcement of which was made some time ago. The backers of the proposition say that work will be begun as soon as possible and pushed to an early completion.

It is to run south to Athena, Weston, Walla Walla, Pendleton and to Bingham Springs, rumor says, before it is completed. There is also another well-founded report which says that this road is to be merged with the Pomeroy-Asotin-Walla Walla road, which is in the preliminary stages of construction.

The consideration of this franchise was the only business of importance before the commissioners today.

Strawberries by May 1.

Strawberries will be on the market by the last of this month, the first coming from Finley, six miles below this city, says an item from Kennewick. The crop will be handled as usual by the Kennewick Fruitgrowers' association. According to the best reports obtainable by the Kennewick Fruitgrowers' association, prospects were never better for a fruit crop in this section. While the fruit was well advanced for this time of the year the recent cold nights have not damaged the crop to a great extent. The peaches in a few orchards are slightly injured, but in most orchards the smudges were started and all damage averted.

TO WELCOME THE FLEET.

San Diego Will Give Warship Squadron a Royal Reception.

San Diego, Cal., April 7.—With the arrival of the battleship fleet off San Diego now but a few days distant, enthusiasm in this city is passing all bounds and the celebration to be held here will doubtless be the most remarkable ovation in the history of the American navy.

Later Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and San Francisco will have an opportunity to demonstrate their hospitality, but San Diego, by reason of being the first American city on the Pacific coast to welcome the sailors, is determined to take precedence also in the enthusiasm of its greeting.

For weeks the various committees have been working night and day, and the results of their labors are already apparent. Thousands of invitations have been sent to prominent citizens of California, Arizona and New Mexico and assurance of large crowds of distinguished visitors have been received.

Pictures of Rear Admiral Evans and other officers, plaster the town. The stores are running over with souvenir postal cards relating to the fleet. Everywhere it is fleet, fleet, fleet, and also along the coast.

New features are constantly being added, the latest being a novel one. It is proposed that each sailor in the fleet be presented with a dozen big oranges and a bouquet of flowers. That would mean about 16,000 bouquets and 200,000 oranges.

There will be boat races by the crews of the fleet for prizes offered by the people of San Diego, also numerous dances, a banquet to the officers, illumination of the city and harbor, land and naval parades and concerts.

A jeweled sword will be presented to Admiral Evans and his wife will receive a golden key, symbolizing the "freedom of the city."

JAPANESE OFFER INSULT.

Staff of American Consulate at Mukden Is Attacked.

Mukden, Manchuria, April 7.—International complications will arise out of an attack made upon the native staff of the American consulate here today by four Japanese. The Japanese were quickly overpowered and delivered to the Japanese consulate.

The Japanese consul refuses to apologize and diplomatic action will result. It is believed the attack grew out of the ill feeling between the Japanese, Russians and Americans at Mukden.

EIGHT TRIBES TO JOIN IN REVIVAL

INDIAN MEETING ON TUTUILLA TO BE EVENT

Tutuilla Presbyterian Church Sends Out 500 Invitations to Northwest Tribes—Eight Native Ministers Will Be Present to Take Part—Camp Will Comprise at Least 100 Tepees—Meeting to Last from April 30 to May 10.

Eight tribes of northwest Indians will participate in a monster revival meeting which will be held at the Tutuilla Presbyterian Indian church on the Umatilla reservation six miles southeast of Pendleton from April 30 to May 10.

It is expected that at least 500 visiting Indians will be present. Eight native Nez Perce ministers will take part in the revivals and the encampment will number perhaps 100 tepees, at the Tutuilla church.

Rev. J. M. Corbillion is in the city today making arrangements for printing 500 invitations to be sent out these to be in the Nez Perce tongue. The Nez Percés, Warm Springs, Spokanes, Yakimas, Flatheads, Ban-nocks, Blackfeet and other northwest tribes, will be invited to the reunion and revival.

All the exercises, programs and hymns will be conducted in the Nez Perce language, the common language of the tribes, and it will be an event in the history of Christianity among the northwest Indians.

The camping ground is being cleared off now and preparations for the meeting are under way. The ministers will be entertained by Rev. Corbillion at the mission and everything will be done to make the meeting successful and pleasant.

The rallying song for the revival will be "The King's Business," which will be printed in the Nez Perce language on all the programs. The chorus of this song is as follows:

Ki hiwash taakst, tamattsa,
Ki tats wenpt Haangelsinim,
Sheshimimnin, hithia Inim Lord,
Shephimimnin, witseth

POSTOFFICE GAINS.

Month of March Shows 10 Per Cent Increase Over Last Year.

Pendleton's postoffice business for the month of March this year was about 10 per cent greater than for the same month last year. Likewise the business for the first quarter of 1908 surpassed that of the first quarter for 1907 and the business of the year ending March 31 shows a healthy gain over the year previous.

According to the report of Harry Reese, assistant postmaster, the total receipts for the month of March were \$1695, while for the same month last year they were but \$1558. The receipts for the 12 months ending March 31 were \$18,469.37, while for the 12 months ending March 31, 1907 the total receipts were \$18,247.51.

Will Ship Horses from Pendleton.

Thomas McAllister of Miles City, Mont., is in the city looking over the horse market and will perhaps ship five-carloads from here to the Montana ranges.
