MLNY LAND LAWS AFFECT ARID BELT

Notice of the passage of two bills by congress, provisions of which make important changes in the public land laws and which come into operation forthwith, has been received by the officers of the local United States land office from the department at Washington.

One of these acts makes provision for the making of "second" entries under the desert land law, on conditions similar to those under which "second" homestead entries may be made.

The other measure is entitled an act "limiting and restricting the right of entry and assignment under the desert land law and authorizing extension of time within which to make final proof."

To Prevent Fraud. As its title suggests, this act is aimed at the prevention of fraud and speculation in desert land entries.

It provides in the first place that upon and after the passage of the act the right to make entry of desert lands under the provisions of the act of March, 1887, and of the amendment act of March, 1891, shall be restricted to surveyed public lands, and no entries of unsurveyed lands shall be allowed, provided, however, that any person who has prior to survey taken possession of unsurveyed desert land not exceeding in area 320 acres and has reclaimed the land in good faith, or commenced so to reclaim it, shall have a preferential right to make entry within 90 days after the filing of the approved plat of survey in the district land office.

Limitation of Assignments. The act further provides that no assignment of desert land entries shall be allowed or recognized, except such assignments be to individuals who are shown to be qualified to make entry under the desert land laws. Such assignments may cover all or part of land entries. But no such assignments to or for the benefit of any corporation or association shall be authorized or recognized.

The provision regarding the extension of time of making proof are that any entryman who shall show to the

satisfaction of the commissioner of public lands that he has in good faith complied with the terms, requirements and provisions of the desert land laws but through unavoidable delay in the construction of irrigation works is unable to make proof of the reclamation or cultivation of his land shall, upon the filing of a corroborated affidavit, setting forth said facts, be allowed an additional period not exceeding three years, at the discretion of the commissioner, within which to furnish the required proof.

"Second" Desert Entries The act regarding the making of "second" entries on desert lands provides that, "any person who prior to the passage of this act has made entry under the desert land laws, but from any cause has lost, forfeited, or abandoned the same, shall be entitled to the benefits of the desert land law as though such former entry had not been made, and any person applying for a second desert land entry under this act shall furnish the description and date of the former entry, provided that the provisions of this act shall not apply to any person whose former entry was assigned in whole or in part or cancelled for fraud or who relinquished the former entry for a valuable consideration."

These second desert entries are to be made in the same manner as provided for the making of second homestead entries, similar affidavits being filed showing the location of the former entry and the cause of its forfeiture and abandonment, supported by the testimony of two witnesses.

Section three of the bill mentioned here is in substance a bill introduced by Congressman Ellis of this district. The measure was formulated by Congressman Ellis and Umatilla county people and it is thought will answer the needs of the arid belt.

SPOTTED FEVER AT BOISE.

Fatal Malady Puzzles the Physicians of Idaho.

"Spotted fever" has broken out in a number of families in this city, due to the bite of the sage tick, commonly known as the wood tick. The bug, after obtaining a hold on the body of its victim, proceeds to bury itself in the flesh, and is soon hidden from view, says the Boise Capital News. In this manner he forces the poisonous effects of his bite into the blood of the person attacked and creates a sort of malady in the form of a fever which results in forming spots or blotches on the body. Local physicians report that numerous cases have developed in the past week.

The ticks generally abound in large numbers at this time of the year, and the peculiar "spotted fever" that they cause is only known to the inland empire country, especially in the state of Montana. Often the fever proves fatal but local physicians state that if care is taken this seldom happens.

Dr. W. S. Allen was called to attend a case of this kind in a family on North Seventh street. A baby was affected with the disease and the mother did not know what the cause of it was. A lump had appeared on the side of the baby and it was feared that the child was suffering from a rupture.

An examination by the physician showed that the lump was caused from a tick which had fastened itself on the side of the child and succeeded in eating its way into the flesh, where it proceeded to suck blood and thus fatten itself, causing the protruding of the skin as well as to poison the child.

The lump was lanced and the tick removed. It is understood that there are numerous other cases, principally among the children, in the same neighborhood.
