GATHERING IN THE THIEVES.

Horse Stealing Gang of Eastern
Washington Very Active

Two more horses stolen from the
stock ranch near Lind, Wash., which
is a part of the estate of the late
John Bane of Adams county, have
been recovered from Chris Willis' ranch, 14 miles down the Spokane
river, and returned to the adminis-
trator of the estate, Alexander Cam-
eron, says an item from Ritzville, Mr.
Cameron also identified two other
horses which were taken at the time
of the raid on Willis' ranch, February
23, and they also were turned over
to him and taken back to Lind.

Up to the present time 12 horses
which were stolen during the winter
by an organized band of horse thieves
have been recovered and returned to
their rightful owners. When Willis' place
was raided the officers found seven
horses which had been stolen. All
these were found to be from the
Bane ranch. A week later Deputy
Sheriff H. J. Hamlin of this city found
three more horses which had been
sold by Willis and his partner, Lester
Van Cleave, to Watson Brothers for
\$5000.

These also were confiscated and re-
turned to the Bane farm. Deputy
Sheriff Hamlin also recovered a team
worth \$600 which had been stolen
from J. G. Johnson of Spangle, De-
cember 1. Mr. Hamlin found the
team in the possession of the thieves
over in the Big Bend district. The
outlaws escaped.

Chris Willis and Lester Van Cleave
are the only members of the gang
who have been apprehended. The
former is under bonds of \$1000 and
the latter \$2000 and both are at the
Willis ranch. They are awaiting trial
before the superior court.

WILL DRAIN GRAY'S LAKE.

Government Seizes Site for Reser-
voir on Blackfoot.

A settlement has at last been ef-
fected between Brazilla W. Clark and
the government whereby Mr. Clark
relinquishes his rights on Tin Cup
creek, Gray's lake and Blackfoot
river, says the Idaho Falls Register.
Mr. Clark this week received a check
from the government amounting to
several thousand dollars and so far
as he is concerned the affair is closed.

This means that the government
will now proceed with the draining of
Gray's lake, which covers some 25-
000 acres. The water will be car-
ried off in the spring of the year
through a cut made by Mr. Clark
about two years ago, the bottom of
which is about two and a half feet
below the lake bed. These waters
with the Big and Little Blackfoot
rivers will be stored in the Blackfoot
swamp, about 18,000 acres in extent.

When drained, the bed of Gray's
lake will make a valuable farming
section, its soil and climate being
particularly adapted to the growing
of fall grain. The surrounding moun-
tains include some of Idaho's finest
grazing land and lies within the con-
fines of the Caribou forest.

Gray's lake being from two and a
half to 15 feet deep, there is at present
a great loss of water by evapora-
tion and seepage and this amount
reservoir in the Blackfoot swamp
would probably irrigate 20,000 acres;
the water of Blackfoot river should
irrigate 35,000 acres, making a total
of 55,000 acres which will be re-
claimed by this project.

SEEKING WATER FOR CEMETERY

WELL IS DOWN 30 FEET
AND NOTHING IN SIGHT.

Cemetery Committee of the City
Council Will Perhaps Sink Well
Near Mouth of Tutuilla Creek.

Where It Is Thought Good Flow of
Water Can Be Found—Council Will
Discuss Matter Tonight.

Though the experimental well being
dug on Tutuilla for the proposed
cemetery water system is now down to
a depth of 30 feet, water has not yet
been found and the cemetery com-
mittee is about to despair of finding
water at that point. At the council
meeting tonight the subject will be
taken up and it is probable that the
council will decide to try a new lo-
cation.

When the cemetery watering project
was first started several councilmen,
among them Messrs. Montgomery
and Knight, favored locating the
well on the bottom land near the end
of Webb street. They urged that by
so doing the city would have greater
prospects for abundant water and al-
so the well would be so located that
the cemetery watering system could
be easily connected with the city water
supply in case such was ever found
advisable. Also the motive power
could be easily changed from a gaso-
line pump to electricity.

However, it was decided to try a
well above the Porter ranch and if
ample water was not found there to
try the bottom. The well now being
dug is located about 150 yards above
the Porter place.

At first it was believed sufficient
water could be found at a depth of 20
feet and some water was struck. How-
ever, it has since been lost and was
evidently surface water from the
storm that caused the recent high
water in the river.

ALASKAN VOLCANO SPOUTS.

Vivid Glimpses of Crater Fires Seen 65
Miles Away.

The Seward Gateway says of the
eruption of an Alaskan volcano, as
sighted from sea by the captain of
the steamer Dora, on March 10:

On the night of the 10th inst. as
Captain Z. Moore of the steamer
Dora, was making his return trip
from Unalaska to Seward, he saw in
the distance what seemed to be fire-
works on a very extensive scale.

Immediately taking his bearings the
captain found he was 63 miles off
Chonobora island and the fires which
lighted the heavens above came from
the previously long extinct volcano,
St Augustine.

As the molten mass within the
mountain was thrown up by internal
forces of the earth, the outer crust
was parted and the red glow of the
molten mass cast its lights far up-
ward on the smoke and clouds above.

This was followed by intervals of
darkness caused by the subsidence of
the volcanic action.

Then again the heaven above
would glow with the reflection of the
light from earth's mighty furnace,
making a display of nature's fire-
works as has ever been seen in this
part of the world.
