Yakima Pioneers Organize.
Leonard I. Thorp, who has been in the county since 1861, was on Saturday elected president of the Yakima County Pioneers' society, says the Yakima Republic. A. J. Splawn, who came here about the same time, is vice president, and J. J. Wiley, who came here in 1868, is secretary. The society has a membership of 150, which means that that many came here prior to January 1, 1886, that is prior to the establishment of the railroad and means therefore, that they rode, or walked in.

Early in May the society will again meet at the institute rooms in the court house when the committee on constitution and by-laws will report. The committee consists of Hon. D. E. Lesh, A. J. Splawn, Wesley F. Jones, E. B. Marks and T. G. Redfield. After the society is properly organized there will be a number of social meetings in the way of reunions and at which papers and addresses on early history will be presented.

New Hotel for The Dalles.
Articles of incorporation creating The Dalles Hotel company, with a capital stock of \$75,000, were filed with the county clerk of Wasco county Saturday, says an item from The Dalles. It is understood that the company will erect a \$75,000 brick hotel in this city within the next year. The company consists of 50 representative business men of The Dalles. Simultaneously with the filing of these papers came a blue print from G. Friewalt, of Portland, who is proprietor of the Hotel Portland building in this city, with a diagram of the proposed improvements to take place in that building. According to the plans set forth in the blue print, the Albert building, which is now a two-story brick, will receive an added story and also be extended 50 feet in the rear.

Three Raps for a Bottle.
William Stoehrer, proprietor of the Idaho Brewing & Malting company, was found guilty in municipal court this afternoon for keeping the back door of the brewery saloon at 606 Main street open on Sunday, and was fined \$200 by Judge Flenner, says the Boise Capital News. Stoehrer entered a plea of not guilty to the charge and his attorney, Milton Cagle, has given verbal notice of appeal.

William Hittle, who was arrested at the rear door of the Brewery saloon yesterday afternoon by City Detec-

tive Allison just as he put a bottle of whiskey in his pocket, gave some important testimony. He stated he went to the rear door of the saloon and gave three raps, at which the porter opened the door and handed him out a bottle of whiskey, for which he gave him 50 cents. He stated he had just returned for another bottle when he was arrested.

Quick Fortune From Mines.
Through an investment three years ago of \$350 in Nevada mining stock, a Salt Lake man has cleaned up \$60,000, and his brother, a Pocatello clerk, will share the good fortune, the deal having been made between the two of them, says the Pocatello Tribune. The lucky Salt Laker is B. L. London, and his brother, I. Jack London, who has been employed for some time in Jacobs' department store in this city, last week received the good news from Zion. The London boys three years ago purchased 3000 shares of Furnace Creek Copper Mining company stock for 15 cents per share. The stock is now quoted at \$20 per share, so that the holdings of the London boys are now worth \$60,000. Jack left for Salt Lake Saturday to secure his share of the fortune.

Yakima Imitates Pendleton.
All-absorbing interest is being manifested in the Turner art exhibit which will be presented at the Congregational church beginning Wednesday afternoon and last the remainder of the week, says the Yakima Republic. Two hundred of the best reproductions from famous masterpieces are to be displayed. The exhibit is under the auspices of the public schools of North Yakima. The women's clubs are taking up the matter and will be patronesses of the affair. The proceeds derived will go toward purchasing decorations for the several schools of the city. Each school sells tickets for the occasion. The amount obtained by each school will go toward purchasing pictures and statuary for the different rooms of that building.

NEW CORPORATION

BIG COMPANY FOR KENNEWICK DISTRICT
Will Operate Line of Steamers On Columbia and Snake—Do a General Forwarding Business—All River Points Will Be Accommodated by This New Concern.

To operate boats on the Columbia river out of Kennewick, do a general forwarding business and establish an oil and fuel house for the purpose of supplying the demands of eastern Washington are the objects of a big company now being organized and for which articles of incorporation are being prepared, says the Kennewick Reporter.

Two boats for passengers, freight and express will be operated by the company for the present. The Matta-Hoyer will be used for passengers and freight and the Kennewick, the new boat being built in Seattle by the Seattle Gas Engine Machinery company, will be used for passengers, mail and express, the Kennewick being the fastest boat on the Columbia river and designed to ply between this city and Priest Rapids.

The Kennewick Transportation company is the name of the new organization and it is the intention to operate boats in every direction out of Kennewick, up the Columbia, down the Columbia and on the Snake river. A general forwarding business will also be conducted and all river points will be accommodated by the service contemplated by the new company.
