William Tripp Gets Three Years, Pal Goes Free on Parole.

William Tripp, one of the box car robbers arrested at Hermiston a few days ago, will go to Salem for a two years' stay in the penitentiary, while his pal, Bert Elliot, will go free upon parole.

This afternoon Elliot and Tripp were arraigned in court and both pleaded guilty to the charges against them. Thereupon Judge Bean imposed a two years' sentence upon each, but ordered that Elliot be admitted to parole. He gave Elliot his freedom because he had turned state's evidence and thereby clinched the case against his partner.

Back to Be Tried.

Melvin Buck and Guy Hayes were also arraigned this afternoon and both pleaded not guilty to the cattle stealing charges against them. Consequently Buck will be tried out at the opening of the jury session Monday and Hayes' trial will come immediately afterwards.

According to District Attorney Phelps Buck virtually admitted his guilt not long ago and so his decision to stand trial came as a surprise.

Colonel J. H. Raley will defend both Hayes and Buck.

LAKE IN CASCADES GONE DRY.

Pamela Lake Near Mt. Jefferson Has Disappeared.

News was brought to this city last Saturday by Tom Smith of Stayton, which will no doubt be received by the Salem rod and line enthusiasts as a real bit of hard luck, owing to the fact that it involves the complete destruction of one of the finest fishing spots in Oregon, known as Pamela lake, near Mt. Jefferson, on what is called the Bunch Grass mountain, says the Salem Journal.

According to Mr. Smith's statement there remains only the dry bed in which the body of water formerly stood.

Pamela lake covered quite a space it being one-half mile wide and about two miles long, with apparently no outlet, the water being freezing cold and very clear. In the fishing season the banks were seldom unoccupied by the lovers of that sport, and some of the finest specimens of the speckle beauties ever exhibited in this city were caught in that lake.

The news of the lake's disappearance was given to Mr. Smith on Monday, the 16th, of last month by two trappers situated up in around Mt. Jefferson, they having made a trip to Stayton, and at the time they had passed that point they saw thousands of fish, principally trout, lying dead, and animals of every description feeding on them.

The two men could form no suggestion as to the cause of the water leaving its bounds, but from the examination made, they found quite a large crack in one of the walls through which the water undoubtedly passed.

It is thought by those at Stayton who are thoroughly acquainted with the actions of the Santiam river, that the extremely high water which prevailed in that river several weeks ago, was due to the large volume of water released from Pamela lake. If such is the case, the Santiam river must have received a good many lake fish.

BOUGHT PANAMA TIMBER.

Portland People Describe Conditions in Canal Zone.

Dr. J. A. Pettit, who, with his wife and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McNeelan of Portland, made a trip recently to Panama, has returned to Portland very favorably impressed with the country and the work that the United States government is doing there, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Dr. Pettit and Mr. McNeelan also bought considerable timber land below the City of Panama, which, he says, can be secured with a good title and at very reasonable figures.

The timber that Dr. Pettit bought is hardwood that will be very valuable within a few years. It is quite accessible and thought by Mr. Pettit to be a fortunate purchase. Although the tract acquired has not been surveyed the physician says his holdings in Panama timber lands can be estimated in square miles much easier than in acres.

The party spent three weeks on the canal zone. According to Dr. Pettit the cities in the canal zone are cleaner and more sanitary than is the city of New Orleans. The work on the canal project is in a very satisfactory condition, and he says there is no longer any difficulty in obtaining labor. About 6,000 men were employed by the government at the time Dr. Pettit was in Panama. The steam shovels could excavate faster than the trains could carry away the dirt.

"The material taken from the canal is used to fill the swamps about Colon, Panama and other cities in the canal zone," says Dr. Pettit. "There are no longer any dangers from yellow fever or malaria, and the mosquitoes, that were for so long the confirmed pest in Panama, are scarce."

The social life of the Americans at Panama is a pleasant one, and many people have gone there to live, and will make it their home for the rest of their lives, undoubtedly.

Dr. Pettit and his party journeyed far into the interior and saw how the natives live in their crude villages in the forests. The party went by way of New Orleans.

BONETTI AT BOISE CITY.

Former Pendleton Saloon Man Now in Stationery Business.

C. Bonetti, recently engaged in business at Pendleton, Ore., and formerly a resident of Salt Lake, has rented half of the old Idaho National bank building on Main street and is having it remodeled for what will be known as "The Book Exchange," says the Boise Capital News. He will handle a stock of books and stationery as well as confectionery. The store will be opened for business this week, and when completed it will be

one of the most up-to-date in Boise.

Three years ago Mr. Bonetti visited Boise and looked over the city, intending to go into business here. After a careful inspection he decided that Boise was not the place for him and went to Pendleton, where he established a store. It took him three years to discover that Boise was not such a bad place after all and accordingly he sold out in the Oregon city, and returned here. He had not been here for three years until his recent arrival and he was greatly surprised at the improvements that had been made during his absence.
