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SENATOR FULTON DEFIES HENEY

"The Coming of Henev to Oregon is Immaterial" Says the Senator.

FULTON'S CAMPAIGN OPENS IN EASTERN OREGON

Personal Malice Is Assigned by Senator Fulton as Henev's Reason for Engaging in Senatorial Fight Against Him—Henev Opens His Campaign in Portland Saturday Night and Will Speak in Salem Tonight—Senator Fulton Is Hopeful and Will Make Active Campaign for the Office.

Portland, April 10.—Fur will fly in Oregon political circles during the next three days. Francis J. Henev is due to arrive in Portland tonight. He comes to enter the lists against C. W. Fulton, candidate for re-election to the United States senate.

He will open here Saturday night and will speak at Salem Sunday night.

Senator Fulton leaves for eastern Oregon today as he closed his western Oregon campaign last night with a speech at McMinnville.

When told that Henev was en route north to take the stump against him, he smiled. "It merely goes to show that Henev is actuated by personal malice when he will drop his duties in San Francisco to come up here to make two speeches against me. His coming is immaterial," he said.

The Henev Affidavit?

Portland, April 10.—A report that Henev had with him a number of affidavits from members of the legislature backing up certain charges that he had made against Senator Fulton in his speech last winter, was not denied by him while he stopped at Grant's Pass this noon for a few minutes.

"When I finish my speech next Saturday night the people will know whether I have such affidavits or not," he said.

He also intimated that he might extend his speaking tour in Oregon to cover several days and stump the Willamette valley, following Fulton's route.

MAY PLANT BURBANK CACTUS.

Eastern Washington People Are Being Shown Virtues of New Plant.

R. P. Probasco of Seattle, who is representing Luther Burbank's thornless cactus, addressed the chamber of commerce at its meeting on Tuesday, says a Spokane item. Mr. Probasco had a specimen of the new variety which may turn the desert waste into a fertile field by producing hundreds of tons of palatable cactus per acre. The specimen was about 18 inches long and eight inches wide by an inch thick, and was cut after six months growth.

He avers that 400 tons per acre can be produced with no effort except the planting, which would be equal to 100 tons of alfalfa as a cattle feed, and stock eating it will need no water. It may be kept in storage for months and still be in good condition. Not only is it an excellent stock food, but is palatable for man.

The chamber of commerce decided a committee should be appointed to investigate the matter of starting an experiment station in eastern Washington under the supervision of Mr. Burbank, to determine if the growth and cultivation of the thornless cactus is practical in eastern Washington. W. S. Thornber, horticulturist of the Washington State college, was telephoned and invited to come to Spokane tonight and meet with the committee and Mr. Probasco in regard to the matter.

AMERICAN CAR HAS REACHED THE FAR NORTH

Valdez, Alaska, April 10.—The Thomas car in the New York-to-Paris race has reached here and was met by a large crowd. A public reception will be held and tonight a banquet will be tendered the car crew. On Sunday the automobile will start for Fairbanks. Owing to the narrow trail the car will be sledged through Kristone canyon. From there to Fairbanks the trail is wide and can be made easily.

SAN DIEGO EXPECTS 100,000.

Preparations for Coming of the Fleet Are Elaborate.

San Diego, Cal., April 10.—San Diego is preparing to entertain 100,000 visitors next week, when the battleship fleet will arrive here and make its first stop at an American port on the Pacific coast.

The ships are expected to arrive on the afternoon of next Tuesday and remain until next Saturday. The work of decorating the city is now on in full blast and the streets have already assumed a gala appearance such as has never been witnessed here before.

The city, shipping, harbor and fleet will be brilliantly illuminated every evening while the fleet is here. On the second night there will be a display of fireworks and a parade of yachts and launches aglow with colored lights. The remainder of the time will be taken up with boat races, naval parades, review of the yachting fleet, dances, concerts, banquets and baseball games.

On Wednesday, the day of the big parade in honor of the Atlantic fleet, the general fleet celebration committee is planning to have a large number of beautifully garbed girls disperse an ocean of flowers to all whom they meet on the streets, so that every one may see and enjoy at least one of the natural blessings of San Diego.

It is also planned to establish a great booth made of flowers, probably on the plaza, which will be one of the most interesting features of the day, and will tend to give a very pleasant and lasting impression to the visitors in the city.

OGG INDICTMENT HAS BEEN DROPPED

SUNDAY LIQUOR SELLING CASE IS DISMISSED

Smiley Who Furnished Information Against Popular Resort Saloon Says He Has Forgotten Where He Secured the Liquor—Case Against Ab Ogg Will Now Be Dropped.

This morning the indictment against Ab Ogg for selling liquor on Sunday, was dismissed at the instance of District Attorney Phelps because of a "backdown" on the part of A. M. Smiley, the state's chief witness.

According to Mr. Phelps, Smiley, who was arrested for larceny, first told a story wherein he said he had purchased liquor on Sunday from the Popular Resort Ogg's saloon. Accordingly an information was filed against Ogg, who pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Smiley was permitted to plead guilty to the larceny charge against him and was fined by Judge Bean. When called upon to testify in the case against Ogg he claimed he was mistaken in his original statement and that he does not now remember where he bought his liquor.

Criminal Cases Deferred.

Monday morning the April jury session of circuit court commences and it was the intention to try Ogg's case first. Now that it has been dropped there will be no criminal cases up for a week. Melvin Buck and Guy Hayes were also slated for trial Monday, but their cases have been deferred so that witnesses may be summoned.

But while there will be no criminal session the first week there are some jury cases for trial and the court session Monday will be opened as usual.

TO BEGIN WORK ON THE O. & W.

Portland People Ready to Start Building Toward Seattle

The directors of the Oregon & Washington Railway company formally accepted the franchise recently granted by the Seattle city council, at a regular meeting at the Portland headquarters Monday. Present at the meeting were the following directors: W. W. Cotton, H. F. Conner, R. Blaisdell, W. A. Robbins and W. R. Litsenburg, all of Portland. The meeting lasted only a few minutes.

The most important business was the mere formal acceptance of these franchises, as is required by the Seattle city charter. It was strongly intimated by one of the directors that actual construction work on the Seattle end of the road would begin within the next few weeks, and that the entire Washington portion of the road would be in operation within the next year.

Specific denial was made that the Harriman people had any intention of making a joint arrangement with the Northern Pacific Railroad for the common use of the former's tunnel at Tacoma. The Oregon & Washington is to use the big hole exclusively. Formal notification that the franchises granted by the Seattle council had been accepted are being prepared and will be forwarded to the Seattle city authorities forthwith.

The new Y. M. C. A. building at Portland will be eight stories instead of six as at first intended.

OREGON WOOL MEN PROTEST AGAINST REDUCTION OF HERDS

By a petition drafted this forenoon by the executive committee of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, the forestry bureau is asked to forego making any cut in the number of sheep to be allowed upon Oregon reserves this summer and some good reasons are set forth why the request should be granted.

In brief the sheepmen hold that owing to the present state of the sheep market it would be injurious to the woolgrowers to have to sell off any of their bands this spring and they ask the government to omit the cut unless the market improves. It has been the intention of the forestry people to make a cut of from 10 to 30 per cent in the number of sheep that were allowed on the ranges last summer. If this stand is adhered to approximately 100,000 sheep will be forced onto the market for the reason that there will be no summer range for them.

According to the petition of the executive committee, which is most courteously worded, the reserve range sufficed for all of the sheep last summer and they will again if the forestry bureau will but allow the sheep to go upon them.

The executive committee has been in session today in the office of Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the state sheep commission and of the state woolgrowers' association. Aside from the above proposition it has also been considering other subjects. Among them is the question of foot rot and action was taken toward having the sheep commission take up the fight against that disease.

The Advisory Board.

Another sheep meeting of importance on here today is the conference between Henry Ireland, supervisor of the eastern division of the Blue mountain reserve, and the members of the sheepmen's advisory board for that division. The consultation has been on since morning. Mr. Ireland having arrived last night, and various problems connected with the administration of the reserve have been gone over. One of the topics for consideration has been that of barring from the reserve some stockmen who are said to have no rights thereon. All members of the advisory board are here and the personnel of that

Big Chief Murphy is believed to be opposed to the nomination of Bryan and the arrangements for the big New York delegation are looked upon as significant.

Special excursions will be run from Denver to Yellowstone park and the Pacific coast after the convention, for the benefit of the Tammany contingent. The best quarters available have been secured for the New York crowd, which will evidently not come to the mile-high town penniless.

FORD IS THE WRONG MAN.

Upon the return Messrs. Ackerman and Churchill will go to Hermiston via Umatilla, while Messrs. Landers and Welles will arrive here this evening and go to Hermiston tomorrow. Until yesterday it was not positively known that Superintendent Ackerman could be secured for the institute, nor was Prof. Churchill counted upon. The latter is noted as a strong man, having been city superintendent at Baker City for 20 years, and he will be a valuable addition to the program.

A feature of the program at Hermiston tomorrow will be selections by a male quartet composed of Messrs. M. L. Akers, Frank K. Welles, A. J. Owen and J. S. Landers. Tomorrow will be the first time Hermiston has ever been honored by make the stay of the teachers' institute and the progressive people of that little city are putting forth every possible effort to ant.

Cattle to Summer Ranges.

Henry Lazinka passed through the city this morning with 400 head of fine cattle which he has wintered in the north part of the county and which will be taken to his Camas Prairie range for the spring. The herd was mostly steers.

ADJOURNMENT MAY COME MAY 30

Congress Will Continue Long Into Summer Unless Emergency Rules Are Adopted.

MINORITY MAY BLOCK

ALL CONSIDERATION

Secret Service Is Guarding Against a Threatened Anarchist Outbreak in Washington—Threatening Letter Sent to Postmaster General Meyer—Outbreak Feared As Result of Roosevelt's Message Urging More Restriction for Anarchists.

Washington, April 10.—Representative Mann of Illinois, who is close in the confidence of Speaker Cannon, stated today that he expects to see congress adjourn about May 20, provided a rule is brought in to expedite the disposition of bills which have been to conference.

He pointed out that a motion to suspend the rules and place the Indian appropriation bill on immediate passage had failed and that the minority took advantage of its full rights, they could force the house to spend two months considering the senate amendments to this bill alone. All the leaders realize that their fences need attending to and they are anxious to get away, so more emergency rules can be expected.

Fear Anarchist Outbreak.

Washington, April 10.—Fearing anarchistic outrages will follow as a result of Roosevelt's short message of yesterday asking that congress adopt stricter measures against the spread of anarchy, the secret service men are today closely guarding the members of the cabinet, particularly Postmaster General Meyer.

An order directing the secret service to take such steps was issued last night after threats had been made against the life of Meyer and other cabinet members. News of these threats reached the White House in an indirect manner and so far it is not known who sent in the information. Roosevelt, however, has been told to be very careful of his movements in future and the service is very careful to see that no suspicious character approaches the White House.

W. H. STEUSLOFF INJURED.

Sheep Commissioner Sustained Fractured Ankle by Fall from Horse.

The Salem Statesman says of an injury sustained by Sheep Commissioner W. H. Steusloff, well known in this city.

W. H. Steusloff, while out buying stock for Steusloff Bros.' meat market suffered a severe accident yesterday by having his horse fall upon him. The accident happened six miles east of Crabtree, in Linn county, at 2 o'clock.

Fortunately it was close to the residence of Cooley Gaines, who brought Mr. Steusloff to Albany in a rig, from which place he came to his home by train. Mr. Steusloff's right leg has a compound fracture just above the ankle. Drs. Richardson and Bird are the physicians in charge.
