AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

Will Celebrate at Champoe.

The 65th anniversary of the organization of the first civil government in American territory west of the Rocky mountains will be celebrated at "Old Champoe," under the auspices of F. X. Matthies Cabinet, No. 12, Native Sons of Oregon, on Saturday, May 2, says the Portland Oregonian. This will be the 8th annual anniversary of the unveiling of the monument erected to perpetuate this significant event in the history of Oregon. Joseph Buchtel of Portland, a pioneer of 1852, has consented to act as president of the day and Ralph E. Moody also of Portland, will deliver the annual address. Hon. F. X. Matthies, the only survivor of the memorable meeting of May 2, 1848, will be on the ground to welcome his legion of friends. Music for the day will be supplied by the well-known Parrott band, and in the evening a ball will be given at Butteville, the Du Bois orchestra, of Woodburn, providing the music.

Idaho Girl Drown at Eugene.

The many young friends in this city of Miss Edna Yarnell of Eugene, Ore., will be pained to learn of her death by drowning recently at that place while attending Eugene university, says a Boise paper. Miss Yarnell visited with Mrs. M. E. McCarty in this city last January and while here made many friends. Her father, James Elmer Yarnell, formerly lived in Boise, and is still well remembered by old timers.

Miss Yarnell, a schoolmate, Miss Davis, went out boat riding in a canoe. In turning around in the water, the canoe upset. Miss Davis, being a good swimmer, readily swam to the shore. She sustained Miss Yarnell part way, but finally let her hold on and Miss Yarnell sank to the bottom. The body was recovered after being in the water over six hours. Miss Yarnell was 19 years of age and a member of the Christian church.

Wild Man Ate Oats and Hay.

Dr. Waldrip, county physician, was called to take charge of a man who resided on a farm not far from this town. This man lived alone and was considered a sort of wild man. He lived among the horses and slept in the poorest kind of a house imaginable and subsisted practically on oats, some hay and different kinds of vegetation. This man was taken to the

hospital with indigestion and it was found that he had consumed in the last three or four days about two quarts of oats. The man is not crazy, but seems very rational. He is evidently the victim of a joke, for he states that he was informed that to eat oats would be the means of preserving his health, so he has evidently tried to follow the directions by consuming goodly quantities of the cereals and consequently landed in the hospital with indigestion.—Boise Capital News.

Ruling on Indian and Liquor.

District Attorney Rulick has received definite instructions from Washington governing the treatment of the famous saloon cases in the Nez Perce Indian reservation and the department indorses his attitude towards the treatment of the same, says a Lewiston dispatch. Mr. Rulick was of the opinion that the men implicated in the cases should not be prosecuted for violations committed prior to the announcement of the supreme court decision and asked instructions from the department of justice. He is now in receipt of a letter from the department on this matter and is instructed to make vigorous prosecutions of all violations of the laws subsequent to the decision of the supreme court in the Dick case. This means that all violations since that time will be aired before the grand jury when it meets in Moscow.

Blackfoot Project Ready.

T. B. Martin has just returned from Pocatello, where he went last week to attend some legal matters in connection with the Blackfoot reservoir site, now being purchased by the government, says a Boise item. This reservoir is located on the head waters of the Blackfoot river, and when completed will furnish water for the irrigation of the Fort Hall Indian reservation and all the lands surrounding Pocatello, making a total of 60,000 or 70,000 acres. He says he finds the people of Pocatello enthusiastic over this project and anxious for the early completion of the water system. They were all anxious to render every assistance possible to the government in making settlements with the land owners in the site, and have been able to do much good in this way. The land is practically all purchased.

BLACK FOX INDUSTRY.

The Animals Raised for Their Skins in Prince Edward Island.

Consul John H. Sherley of Charlottetown, in forwarding the following report, says that as strangers are not allowed on or about the fox farms it is impossible to secure any very definite information concerning the industry.

There are three black fox farms near Atherton, where these animals are raised for their skins. These farms contain 20, 25 and 30 foxes, respectively. The skins are sold in London at prices ranging from \$500 to \$1800 each, according to quality. I am informed that the fur is used for ornamenting the cloaks of royalty, as it is the only fur to which gold will cling.

The farm containing 30 foxes is on Cherry's Island. The farm containing 20 foxes is in a rough, broken woods country, where the animals are confined by heavy woven wire netting. The wire is set in the ground two and three feet in order to keep the foxes from burrowing under, and is about eight feet above ground, with a cure inwardly at the top of each post of another three or four feet of wire in order to keep them from climbing over the fence. They sleep in the open year around, in hollow trees and in hollow logs.

These animals are not crossbred, but are confined to their own kind, to keep the fur of the best possible quality possible. They are fed principally on oats and milk and bread and milk, with a small quantity of cooked meat once a day, at noon, the amount of meat being lessened during the summer, as it has been shown that too much meat creates mange, diseased scalps etc. These animals are very wild, and no one can get near them except the keeper, and he only when he brings them food.

Cheap Rate on North Bank.

The Spokane, Portland & Seattle and the Northern Pacific have established considerably lower passenger rates from Portland to a number of eastern Washington points than have been in vogue on the Northern Pacific via Tacoma, says a Spokane item. These reductions are due to shortening of distance by the North Bank route. Portland to Mabton via Tacoma has been \$10.60; the new rate is \$8.50. To Ritzville it has been \$11.50; it is now \$9.35.
