MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION BRINGS MEETING TO CLOSE

Big Water Suit Adjourns Until After Circuit Court in Pendleton—Considerable Land Is Sold of Late—Candidate for United States Senator Speaks Here—Preaches Farewell Sermon.

Milton, April 10.—The three days' session of the Ministerial and Lay association of the Walla Walla district of the M. E. church came to a close last night. Ministers from different parts of the district were here, and altogether the meetings were very successful.

The circuit court which was in session here for some days, on the big water suit, has adjourned until after the circuit court in Pendleton, which begins next week.

Mrs. L. Rounine has sold her property near the Peacock mill race consisting of five acres, for \$3000 to Frank M. Shields. The land is mostly planted in orchard.

Peach Trees Blooming. Peach trees are in full bloom in this vicinity and cherry trees are beginning to bloom. Indications are for a bumper fruit crop this year.

Cake Spoke Here. Hon. H. M. Cake of Portland addressed the people of this end of Umatilla county Tuesday evening. His lecture was enjoyed very much, and was largely attended.

A number of the different candidates are coming in and out of here daily, and considerable interest is being taken in politics at this time.

A mass meeting was held at Ingie chapel Tuesday evening to consider the proposition of erecting a hall in the vicinity of the chapel to be used for lectures, debating societies, entertainments, etc. The building will probably be erected in a very short time.

HERMISTON NOTES

LANDS SELLING RAPIDLY AND BEING IMPROVED.

Work on East Umatilla Project Goes on in Most Satisfactory Way—Excursions Will Be Run May 27—Teachers' Institute Here Tomorrow Candidates Thick in Field.

Hermiston, April 10.—Much activity is being shown in and around Hermiston at this time. Lands are not only selling, but lands are being improved. Hundreds of acres of new land will produce crops this season. This year will show a boom in building and all sorts of improvements are going on in the irrigated district at this time.

Hundreds of bushels of potatoes have been planted, many hundred trees have been set out, and shortly a number of new cottages will be under course of construction in all parts of town. Hermiston is on the upward road, and in another year there will be a wonderful growth in this section of the county.

A number of tracts of land have been sold to different people who have come in to investigate conditions in the last couple of weeks.

Work Goes On.

Very satisfactory progress is being made on all parts of the Umatilla project, according to the present report of the officials. On May 27 it is expected that all the distribution system will be in readiness to receive water and that it will be turned in on practically all the lands declared open to settlement this year. This is the date when excursions will be run from Pendleton and different points.

A teachers' institute will be held in Hermiston tomorrow for the teachers in the west end of the county. A very interesting and instructive program has been arranged for this occasion, and it promises to be a most successful event.

Numerous candidates have been here of late, and politics seem to be the main topic of conversation. Irrigation has taken second place until after election, at least.

The time is drawing near when all voters from here will be required to go to Echo for the primary election, April 17.

MANY FRUIT TREES.

Tomorrow Will Be Clean-up Day in Pilot Rock.

Pilot Rock, April 10.—Many acres of land have been planted to fruit trees in the past few weeks in this vicinity. Many of the farmers are taking an interest in making this one of the best fruitgrowing sections of eastern Oregon. Many berries have also been set out in various places, and all are working together to bring out the best there is in the country.

Considerable land has been sold near here of late to parties who expect to locate here.

A great deal of interest is being taken in the erection of a hotel for Pilot Rock. The subscription is being increased, and it is thought that a subscription of \$5000 for this purpose can easily be raised.

Clean Up Tomorrow.

The city council has designated tomorrow as a clean-up day for the town, and it is thought that the town will be thoroughly clean after this date.

to enter the law department of the Iowa state university at Iowa City, Iowa, from which school he graduated with the degree of bachelor of laws on June 30, 1874, and was admitted to the bar of the supreme court of Iowa.

He began the practice of law in his old childhood home, Panama, Iowa. In 1876 he removed to Harrisburg, Iowa, and there continued in the practice of law except for one year, during which time he was engaged in the newspaper business as editor of the Harrisburg Republican until March, 1883, when he came to the coast, taking up his residence in 1884, in Heppner, then a part of Umatilla county.

In the spring of 1885 Morrow county was created and he was appointed the first school superintendent of that county. In January, 1885, he began service as district attorney under an appointment from Governor Z. F. Moody, and was elected in July, 1886, and re-elected in 1888 to the same office.

After the second congressional district of Oregon was created, he was in 1892 nominated and elected to represent the district, and was re-

elected in 1894, and again in 1896. His term of service as member of congress ended March 4, 1899.

In July, 1900, he was elected as circuit judge of the sixth judicial district, and in July, 1901, removed from Heppner to Pendleton, where he has since resided.
