MESSAGE ON ANARCHY.

President Appeals to Congress to Pass Stringent Laws.

The briefest message ever sent to congress by President Roosevelt was that on the need of anti-anarchist legislation sent in this week. The message is as follows:

"To the senate and house of representatives:
"I herewith submit a letter from the department of justice which explains itself. Under his opinion I hold that existing statutes give the president power to prohibit the postmaster general from being used as an instrument in the commission of crime, that is, to prohibit the use of the mails for the advocacy of murder, arson and treason, and I shall act upon such construction.

Unquestionably, however, there should be further legislation by congress in this matter. When compared with the suppression of anarchy, every other question sinks into insignificance. The anarchist is the enemy of humanity, the enemy of all mankind, and his is a deeper degree of criminality than any other. No immigrant is allowed to come to our shores if he is an anarchist; and no paper published here or abroad should

be permitted in this country if it propagates anarchistic opinions.

DOG RACE WON BY FINK.

Distance of 420 Miles Covered in 23 Hours and 15 Minutes.

Special cable to the Times from Nome says that in the face of terrible storms, Albert Fink's dog team won the annual race across the Seward peninsula from Nome to Candel and return, covering the distance of 420 miles in four days, 23 hours and 15 minutes. Berger came in second and Atkinson third.

The winners reached Nome Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock and in spite of the early hour, 800 people were lined up at the finish, as the progress of the race on the trail was reported from time to time by telephone.

No less than \$200,000 was wagered on the outcome of the event. The 10 teams which started in the contest last Thursday morning belonged to Fink, Burger, Atkinson, Kijstad, Lawton, Condu, Adams, Heron, Cary and Derrick.
