RECORDS BROKEN

HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES SHOW MUCH SPEED

Jay and Means Make New Records for Broad Jump and Shot Put—Athletic Try-out Friday Afternoon Brought Out a Number of Excellent Results—Regular Practice for Coming Field Meet.

At the tryout held yesterday afternoon by the high school track athletes two local records were broken, Jay beating the former broad jump record, while Arthur Means put the 12 pound shot three inches further than ever before. The other records made were also good, the summary of events being as follows:

The Records.

50 yard dash—Turner, first; Gordon, second; Storie, third. Time, 5 1-5.

220 yard dash—Gordon, first; Euster, second; Turner, third. Time, 23 1-2.

440 yard dash—Euster, first; Bean, second; Baker, third. Time, 58.

880 yard run—McDill, first; Chapman, second; Engdahl, third. Time, 2:27.

1 Mile run—Dickson, first; Chapman, second; Cole, third. Time, 5:32.

120 Hurdle—Jay, first; Chambers and A. Means tie for second. Time, 17-3-5.

Hammer throw—Euster, first; 105.5; A. Means, second, 100; L. Means, third, 93.6.

High jump—Jay, first, 5.6; Bean and Euster, tie, 5.

Shot Put, 12 pounds—A. Means first, 42.3; Jay second, 39.8; L. Means, third, 39.2.

Broad jump—Jay, first, 20.4; Turner, second, 19.2; Chapman, third, 18.3.

The meet yesterday was held at the Frazier race track and Prof. A. C. Hampton acted as referee, while Nat Kimball served as starter. The meet was held for the purpose of selecting men for the team to go against Pearson academy next week. For the most part the team will be as listed above, though a few changes are possible. Arthur Means is manager of the track team this year.

CANADIAN PROGRESS.

The Growth in Imports—Foreign Capital Is Sought.

Consul H. D. Van Sant of Kingston, contributes the following information concerning Canadian foreign trade and development:

Canada imported from the United States in 1905 56,000,000 pounds of cotton of the value of \$5,500,000, and from other countries 500,000 pounds of the value of \$67,000. In 1907 the cotton imports from the United States reached 72,000,000 pounds of the value of \$8,000,000; from other countries 234,000 pounds, value \$29,620.

The following quantities of hard coal were imported in 1907: From the United States, 2,756,332 tons; from other countries, 28,539 tons.

Pulpwood exported from Canada to the United States in 1905 amounted to 593,624 cords, valued at \$2,600,814; in 1907, 628,744 cords, valued at \$2,748,901.

To secure British capital, not only for the large demands of the railway builders, but also for the smaller demands of the manufacturer and factory and house builder is a movement which the Canadian Manufacturers' association will seek to persuade British loan companies to establish branches here.

The winter has been an exceptionally long and dull one among tradesmen and retailers generally in Kingston. In some of the larger stores, preparations are being made to replenish the depleted stock. American dealers in all staple goods used in the retail trade will find a market here for a limited amount of goods of various kinds, hardware, drugs, staple groceries, cotton goods and fabrics, millinery, plated ware, tailor made clothing, windmills, wire fencing, fancy goods and toys, tinware and household goods. Taken in connection with other cities and towns it would pay to send commercial men early.

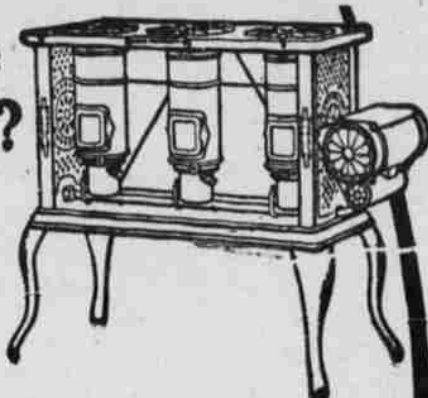

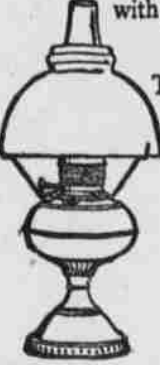
