GALVESTON PLAN FOR WALLA WALLA

NEW FORM OF CITY GOVERNMENT COMING.

Commercial Club of the Garden City Considering the Apportionment of the Most Progressive System of Municipal Government Known.

That Walla Walla adopt the Galveston form of city government will more than likely be the recommendation of the Commercial club of this city, says the Walla Walla Statesman. The matter was brought up in the meeting of that organization last night by George Ludwig, who referred to an article lately appearing in "Success."

A lively discussion and airing of opinions at once followed the mention of the matter and everyone who was conversant with the form of municipal rule which has worked so successfully in Galveston, where it was introduced, and in Memphis, Des Moines and other places, was heartily in favor of the adoption of the new system.

"The present form of government we have in this city is old and obsolete," said Vice President Dement, who was presiding. "We need an up-to-date form of city government."

This expression seemed to voice the sentiments of everyone present. Several spoke along the same line and all were of the opinion that the new system should be tried here. The matter was disposed of by a motion to have the secretary make a digest of this municipal control and report to the Commercial club for action at the next meeting.

When the census is taken to ascertain whether or not Walla Walla is to come out of the backwoods and be no longer a village, but a first-class city, this matter will more than likely be carried out. There is no doubt, as Director Kirkman of the club said last night, that Walla Walla has and can show, 25,000 inhabitants, taking them as do Seattle and Portland.

This census will be surely taken this summer, and application be made for a new charter. When this is granted, if an effort will be made on the part of those who favor the Galveston system, to have it introduced here, in all probability, it will be tried.

Baker Loses Patronage.

Another apparent unfairness was shown toward Baker City by the method of routing passengers from Portland to Burns, says the Baker City Herald. It is claimed that in order to secure as much money as possible out of the passengers, the road sends them to Burns by way of Ontario and Vale instead of via Baker and Austin. But the railroad would probably lose \$2 by sending passengers through Baker City so the patron has to pay out more money, spend more time and suffer great inconvenience of travel.

Those who are familiar with conditions state that the trip to Burns can be made much quicker from Baker City, the distance to be traveled by stage is much less and the inconveniences are not so great as when going by way of Ontario. Almost 12 hours is saved in the trip to Burns by way of Baker City and the traveler is given more time to rest between stages of the journey. But the passenger or his comfort evidently is not taken into consideration.

CANNOT USE SISAL

WOOL BUYERS REFUSE TO TAKE COMMON TWINE

All the Leading Firms Decline to Buy Fleeces Tied With the Old Kind of Wool Twine—Sheepmen Are Warned in Time to Give Them an Opportunity to Change.

J. E. Clinton, Jr., local representative of a Boston wool buying house, has received a communication, the contents of which are the utmost importance to wool growers of Idaho since they relate to the preparation of the fleeces for market and tell in what condition some of the houses will hereafter receive wool, says the Boise Statesman. The communication follows:

"For many years past the wool merchants of the United States have made ineffectual efforts to induce the wool growers to improve their methods in preparing the wool for market. One of the principal abuses is the tying up of fleeces with sisal twine, or so-called binder twine. The loose fibre from the twine clings to the wool throughout all the processes of manufacture and causes imperfect goods and consequent loss.

"We believe if this serious matter is called to the attention of growers they will cooperate with the dealers and discontinue the practice of tying their wool with such twine as described, thereby putting American wools in closer competition with those of foreign countries.

"We, the undersigned, hereby agree to at once notify all our correspondents and buyers in the fleece wool section that we shall not accept wool tied with sisal twine nor wool that is tied with an undue amount of string, as merchandise.

GATEWAY IS OPEN

O. R. & N. MAY TICKET THROUGH TO THE SOUND

Interstate Commerce Commission Withdraws Its Objection to the Sale of Tickets Via Portland to Puget Sound Points—O. R. & N. Officers Again Opened on the Sound—Homeseeker Movement Is Light This Year.

The Portland gateway has been open since April 9, but it is not believed the result will be to greatly increase the colonist movement, says the Oregon Sunday Journal. The fact is that there is a light movement of homeseeker travel this spring from the east, owing to the financial conditions that preceded the opening of sale dates, March 1.

Action on the part of J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman lines, resulted in remedying the trouble that caused the closing of the gateway. The Union Pacific railroad company modified the manner of issuing its passenger tariffs, and the Interstate commerce withdrew its objections to the sale of through tickets from Portland to points north on the Northern Pacific.

Objection to Method.
 General Passenger Agent William McMurray of the Harriman lines, has just received word that the Interstate commerce commission has approved the resumption of sale of tickets to and from Puget sound via Portland. Inquiry developed that the commission's objection was directed to the method of tariff publication rather than the matter itself.

When the objection of the Interstate commission was brought to the attention of J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman lines, that official ordered the immediate withdrawal of the old tariffs until the railway company could ascertain the exact wishes, and on and after March 15 the Harriman lines and connections will resume the sale of tickets from Puget sound points via Huntington and Portland to the east as heretofore. This arrangement was made effective westbound via Huntington and Portland April 9.

Take on Dismissed Men.
 John M. Scott, assistant general passenger agent, who went to Puget sound and reduced the working forces in the passenger department there, and closed the Olympia office of the company, will go back over the ground immediately and restore to their former positions the men who are available. Four men will resume work in the Seattle office, three in the Tacoma office, and one in the Olympia office.

The principal reason assigned for the falling off of homeseeker travel over the transcontinental lines to the entire Pacific coast this spring is that eastern farmers and men of property who were last fall contemplating removal to the coast, found that they could not readily dispose of their property to advantage, and they are awaiting more favorable conditions of the money markets.

STOP SLAUGHTER OF BIRDS.

Audubon Societies Create Sentiment Against "Bloody" Hats for Women.

New York, April 13.—Less bird blood has been spilled to decorate the Easter bonnets of American women this year than ever in recent history, it was declared by experts in this city today. Based on careful examination of the millinery market as well as reports from agents throughout the country, this conclusion was announced at the headquarters of the National Association of Audubon societies.

With the help of the million women members of the National Federation of Women's clubs and other organizations, the Audubon workers promise to "keep up their fight against this fashionable form of bird butchery till preparation for Easter Sunday no longer means a massacre of breeding birds.

That a minority among the women of this country still demands the bloody scalps of the mother heron for aigrettes is shown by the illicit and secret traffic in these plumes which officers of the Audubon association assert is today being conducted by the plume hunters.

Although the Easter carnage among this slightly species has practically exterminated it in all of its old haunts in the United States, sections of South America are now being secretly scourged, as well as southern Europe, Africa and Asia, for this nuptial plume of the breeding heron. Balked in their

repeated attempts to secure legislation in New York state to make prosecution of such traffic possible, the Audubon workers are today unable to effectively check the distribution from this city of aigrettes irrespective of where they come from to the women who still wear them.

FREIGHT BUSINESS BETTER.

Average of 75 Cars Per Day Pass Westward Through La Grande.

Railroad freight business has been on a steady increase the past few weeks, says the La Grande Star. The principal part of the business is westward. It is stated at the O. R. & N. headquarters that an average of 75 cars of through westbound freight pass through La Grande every day.

There is some eastward movement of lumber, but not in the quantities that this part of the road has been accustomed to handle. If there were the same proportional amount of business toward the east that there is now westward bound, the O. R. & N. would be doing the biggest freight business in its history.

The amount of westbound travel that was expected to get in motion on the strength of the spring colonist rates, is a disappointment. There are now scarcely more than coach loads, where there were train loads of homeseekers last year.

The railroad men in the La Grande offices assert as a positive fact that there is now more travel toward the east than there is toward the west. The cause of this unusual and unexpected condition is ascribed to the hard times in the east.

Throughout the section of country from which the homeseeker travel is principally drawn there is still a stringency and notwithstanding the cheap fares, the proportion of those who have money to travel is more limited than heretofore.

On the other hand, the coast people do not feel the stringency to any unusual extent and they have money with which to travel. This is given as the only explanation of the present situation in which more people are going east than there are persons coming west.
