The charges made against Mrs. Howard Gould by her husband in his suit for divorce gives another glimpse of the life among the Smart Set, so graphically pictured during the Shaw murder trial.

There is little danger in America of the rottenness above permeating the social fabric of the country, as happened in ancient Rome, when the nation became degenerate and an easy prey to barbarians, but the support of a butterfly class is useless luxury while idle workers parade the streets in vain search for work to pay for

food and drink, is likely to produce a social revolution having for its object the more equitable distribution of wealth among the real wealth-producers.

The excesses of the smart sets of their various times caused the "Roundhead rebellion," the French revolution and nearly all great uprisings of the people which have dotted the pages of history.

It is not a good thing for any land to have the many slaving for a bare sustenance so that the pampered few may lead luxurious lives, parasites sapping the life blood of the nation. President Roosevelt was right in classing both the idle rich and the kobo together as useless classes of society.

LABOR IS FOR THE UNIVERSITY.

The following for the Portland Daily Journal indicates that the intelligent workmen of the state do not purpose to be misled in the matter of ample support for the state university: The executive board of the State Federation of Labor has passed a resolution urging that labor union men in all parts of the state support the University of Oregon appropriation bill.

There are 68 affiliated labor organizations in Oregon and all of them have been notified of the action of the State Federation. When seen yesterday President C. H. Gram spoke in the highest terms of the university and its work and said that he was heartily in favor of giving the school the \$125,000 per year in order that the state may have an institution worthy of the name.

The action of the State Federation is merely a recommendation but it will doubtless be followed by a majority of the labor union men. Friends of the university are highly elated over the federation's action.

And it is right and proper the workmen should work in harmony with the effort to build up a great free university in Oregon, declares the Eugene Guard. With no tuition fees to pay and the cost of living very moderate, the laborer's son or daughter who is ambitious and willing to work may easily procure a collegiate education in Oregon.

A majority of the students now enrolled are working their way through school, and will come out of it well equipped for any profession or business they may choose to enter.

Close up the university, or circumscribe its usefulness by the allowance of only a niggardly support and the opportunity to educate themselves will be taken from thousands of Oregon boys and girls whose parents are not able to send them to institutions outside of the state.

The organized workmen are right in standing for higher education within the reach of all classes, and supported by every fair-minded citizen, in any walk of life, who is interested in the growth and prosperity of Oregon and wants to see its boys and girls given every possible opportunity for educating and fitting themselves for the serious business of life.

MRS. EDDY FOR A NAVY.

The following remarkable admission from Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, head of the Christian Science church, on the necessity of large navies to prevent war, is significant in view of the fact that she has always been outspoken for peace, an advocate of arbitration, an opponent of war in any form.

In the last issue of the official organ of the Christian Science church, she says:

For many years I have prayed daily that there be no more war, no more barbarous slaughtering of our fellow beings, prayed that all the peoples on earth and the islands of the sea have one God, one mind, love God supremely, and love their neighbor as themselves.

National disagreements can be, and should be, arbitrated wisely, fairly and fully settled. It is unquestionable, however, that at this hour the armament of navies is necessary, for the purpose of preventing war and preserving peace among nations.

JAPAN IS PRETTY BUSY.

Poor Japan is blamed for everything, and of that for which she can not be blamed she is suspected. She has Korea, and is accused of wanting to gobble all of Manchuria.

It has been said she plans the acquisition of the Philippines and Hawaii, and now the premier of Australia suggests that Japan intends to assume the aggressive and attempt to conquer the whole of that so-called continent.

If Japan makes an attempt for any one or all of the territories she is said to covet she will have a rather strenuous time, and just at present she has plenty to do at home and in Korea.

That Japan will eventually attempt to extend her dominions is altogether probable, but it is very doubtful if at present the mikado is sighing for more worlds to conquer.

GEER TOOK THE MONEY.

In answering the charge that he sold the office of superintendent of the Oregon penitentiary to H. B. Plummer for \$1000, during his term as governor, T. T. Geer says in his paper, the Pendleton Tribune: "The truth is that Mr. Plummer not only did not have any sort of an agreement with me, written or otherwise, but he did not pretend to have UNTIL LONG AFTER I HAD REPAID HIM HIS MONEY AND MR. LEE WAS APPOINTED."
