PORTLAND'S FINE HORSE SALE.

About 300 Head of Blooded Stock to Be Sold April 28, 29 and 30.

Portland's annual sale of breeding horses, the development of which in the past few years has made this city the distributing center of fancy stock for the northwest, will be held at the Lewis and Clark exposition grounds April 28, 29 and 30 this year, says the Telegram. It will be on a bigger scale than ever before and many fine animals will pass under the hammer. Nearly 300 registered mares and nearly 20 registered stallions, are listed for the sale. This is more registered stock than ever offered in this section before.

The famous Brook Nook ranch of Montana will have 100 head here. C. X. Larabee, the owner, will sell his crack matched team that captured the prize at the Los Angeles horse show. They are Mirza (2:28 3-4) and Alama (2:27 1/2). His other horses will be from Morgan stock.

One Kentucky mare will be here that is creating interest among the horsemen. It is Mary Mims, a 2-year-old with a record of 2:30. She is by Bondsman from Serena by Allerton, and comes direct from the Blue Grass state.

R. Brady will sell Nick Nack (2:11 1/2) and A. C. Lohmire is selling Rockford (2:20). J. W. Bailey will offer Red Rock, a 2:20 matinee horse, and Bred Broker of North Yakima, will have his trotter, Henry Gray (2:18 1/4) here. He will sell, also, Minwal (2:22 3-4). A carload of Cauton and McKinney stock will be put up on sale from the Baderley farm, near Weston, Ore.

Because the new race track is not finished the sale will be held at the exposition grounds. Among the new bloods will be 15 or 20 matched teams which will probably be in great demand, since the Portland people have begun buying fancy nags. Three fine teams have come here since the show last fall. Blooded short-horns and herefords will be on sale one day.

Mary Mannering April 15.

Few, if any, attractions booked in Walla Walla for the current season have as great an interest for the regular playgoer as the appearance of Mary Mannering in her successful American play, "Glorious Betsy," by Rida Johnson Young, author of Brown of Harvard." Miss Mannering's date at the Keylor Grand theater Wednesday evening, April 15, when she will appear for the first time in the greatest success of her career, a play that provides her with a story of exciting and absorbing interest just as the author intended.

The Shuberts have surrounded their star with a company of unusual excellence and a production that all ingeniously could suggest. Following is the story of the play: In writing "Glorious Betsy," the author does not go into the darker side of Betsy's life but deals with those days when her name was the toast of every gathering of note from Baltimore to New Orleans. It takes us back to the Old Sweet Springs of Virginia, when that resort was the gathering place for the best in wealth and culture and beauty of which America could boast.

It is at the Springs that Betsy first meets Captain Bonaparte, who, weary of the endless round of entertainment and adulation he has received as a guest of the American nation, has traveled to this out of the way place incognito, and whatever romantic adventure might appeal to a youth of 19, full of spirits and away from restraint.

Jerome becomes infatuated with the reigning belle, Betsy Patterson, and manages to have himself employed during her stay there to give her lessons in French. Betsy becomes intensely interested in her tutor, but her pride and ambition fight against acknowledging that she could love a man in such an inferior position. She coquettes with him, however, as she does with half a dozen others. Betsy leaves the Springs ignorant of Jerome's true personality, deeply offended with him because of his refusal to accompany her party to Baltimore, where great preparations are being made for the reception of Captain Bonaparte. It is here at an elaborate fete given in his honor that Betsy first discovers that her tutor and the much talked of brother of Napoleon are one. Previous to this discovery, her pride overcome by the ardent wooing of her supposed tutor, Betsy has confessed her love for him.

They are betrothed and the rest of the play deals with the efforts of Napoleon's agents to prevent their marriage; their fruitless voyage to France, where Napoleon refused to allow Betsy to land, and the final happy triumph of the young lovers.

MONSTER GRAY WOLF KILLED.

Wyoming Man Was Viciously Attacked by the Animal.

A dispatch from Baggs, Wyo., says of the killing of a monster grey wolf there:

While engaged in looking after his traps which he had set in the hopes of capturing some coyotes, Edward Yoakum was attacked by an enormous grey wolf, which broke the iron chain of a trap and made a desperate attempt to reach the throat of its captor.

Yoakum, however, made a hasty retreat and avoided injury. As the huge animal still showed fight, Yoakum secured a large club and finally succeeded in braining the monster.

The beast was a timber wolf presumably of considerable age, as its hide is rather larger than common. Its body was larger than that of a mountain lion and was covered with fat, pointing to the fact that the animal had led a life of an epicurean on the cattle and sheep on the large Snake and Bear river ranges.

This is the second wolf killed in this locality in the last six weeks.
