EDUCATORS HERE

ACKERMAN AND CHURCHILL VISIT IN THE CITY

Superintendent Ackerman Goes to Condon and Prof Churchill Visited Weston Normal As a Member of the Visiting Board—Hermiston Institute Was Successful and Well Attended.

J. H. Ackerman, state superintendent of public instruction, is visiting the schools of Pendleton today. He came up from Hermiston Saturday evening following the institute held there and he will leave tomorrow for Condon, Gilliam county, where an institute is to be held Wednesday.

Prof. J. A. Churchill, city superintendent at Baker City, was also here yesterday, having attended the Hermiston institute in company with Mr. Ackerman and others who had been at the Inland Empire Teachers' convention at Pullman. During the day yesterday the two prominent educators were the guests of Messrs. Landers and Hampton of the Pendleton schools and they were taken upon an auto trip in the afternoon.

Last evening Mr. Churchill left for Weston, where he will visit the normal school today and tomorrow. He is a member of the normal school visiting board recently appointed by Governor Chamberlain and which consists of Supt. Churchill, J. M. Powers, superintendent at Salem, and W. H. Turner of Grants Pass.

It is to be the duty of the visiting board to inspect all the normal schools during the year and to submit a report to the governor which he in turn will transmit to the legislature. The report will deal with the efficiency of the different schools and will have an important bearing upon future legislation.

Hermiston Meeting Successful. The local teachers' institute held at Hermiston Saturday was very successful both in attendance and in the way of an interesting program. With Messrs. Ackerman, Churchill, Landers and Welles in attendance Hermiston was well recognized at its first institute and in turn the people of the little city did all they could to make the stay of the teachers a pleasant one.
