WANT 5,000 MEN

WORK TO BEGIN ON
GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

Expenditure of \$10,000,000 Will Be Made on Western End of Canadian Railroad—All Kinds of, Skilled Labor Will Be Needed—Work Will Be Pushed Forward Rapidly.

"Grading and clearing the right of way of the Grand Trunk Pacific will be commenced at Prince Rupert this week, says a Victoria item. My final instructions from Vice President Morse are to rush to completion the 100-mile section of the main line between Prince Rupert and Kitimat, and the branch line, 60 miles in length, from Kitimat to Kitimat to the junction with the main line at Kitimat. We expect to hand these two sections over to the company within a year and a half, and possibly sooner."

This was a statement made by J. W. Stewart, managing director of the railway contracting firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart.

"Our two contracts with the railway company approximately aggregate about \$10,000,000," was Mr. Stewart's reply to an inquiry. "Between 5000 and 6000 white laborers will be required on construction work. Any white man wanting a job is sure of obtaining employment. We shall give the preference at the outset to the unemployed men through labor employment agencies."

The more men we secure on the coast the better, as we desire to avoid if possible the necessity of bringing in men from points east of the Rockies, where a great deal of railway construction work is now in progress. Standard wages will be paid. Besides the army of laborers there will be hundreds of jobs for carpenters, blacksmiths and other mechanics. Headquarters will be established at Prince Rupert, where I shall direct operations when not looking after our contract for 125 miles of main line of the G. T. P. west of Edmonton.

"The task of distributing men, horses and outfits along the route is a big one, and will naturally occupy some time. Our plant from various sections between Edmonton and Thunder Bay Junction will be dispatched to Vancouver via the Canadian Pacific railway. A portion of it, now en route, will arrive this week, and will be shipped north in Canadian steamers. The transportation of our outfit will require about 500 cars. The plant and equipment will comprise thousands of dump carts, graders, scrapers, steam drills, derricks and about 600 horses."

"When the work is in full swing we shall be distributing about \$500,000 a month in wages and supplies. It is our intention to buy all these supplies on the coast—from Vancouver and Victoria. Taking everything into consideration, I have concluded that not an article we will need for the camps and commissariat will have to be ordered from the east, and equally good prices can be secured here."

"All we now want are the men—thousands of them. A start has just been made at construction along our contract for a 125-mile section of main line west of Edmonton. This will provide work for 2000 men all summer."
