TO CONFERENCE OF METHODISTS

REV. ROBERT WARNER
LEAVES FOR BALTIMORE.

Former Pendleton Minister Is a Delegate to the General Conference of the M. E. Church Which Meets in Baltimore in May—Over 800 Delegates From All Parts of the World to Be Present.

Rev. Robert Warner of Walla Walla, former pastor of the M. E. church of Pendleton, departed over the O. R. & N. railroad Tuesday for Baltimore, where he will spend the month of May attending upon the session of the general conference of the M. E. church. The other delegates are Rev. M. H. Marvin of Pullman, Rev. U. G. Hawk of Spokane, and Mr. Cox of Walla Walla. Mr. Wells of Wenatchee and Mr. Sargison of Spokane, there being equal lay and ministerial representation.

The general conference is the legislative body in Methodism. It represents 125 annual conference, the Columbia river annual conference, extending from the Nevada line to British Columbia and from the Rocky to the Cascade mountains. It covers a very large and important portion of the country.

There will be about 800 delegates to assemble at Baltimore, and before them will come all the questions of a legislative nature. This body meets once in four years, the last one meeting in Los Angeles four years ago. There will be a number of bishops to elect, six leading ones having died

during the past four years, to-wit: Bishops Merrill, the great jurist, Bishop Fowler the great orator, Bishop Joyce, McCabe and Andrews, all spiritual giants, and Bishop Fitzgerald, the great parliamentarian.

It is expected that at least eight new bishops will be elected to fill vacancies and to make way for new work on account of increase in the work. Every country upon the globe will be represented. The Daily Christian Advocate will be published during the month at Baltimore giving all the speeches and arguments and all the work of the general conference besides photographs of all leading men and all new and old bishops and all work given by the conference.

There is only one large body and that not a legislative one. The Ecumenical Conference meeting once in 10 years and containing representatives of world wide Methodism having delegates from all the 16 bodies of the church and representing over 30,000,000 members and active adherents.

The book written by W. T. Euster, pastor of the M. E. church of Pendleton on "The Philosophy of Church Building," is to be represented at this conference with the view of having it adopted in the course of study for young ministers, it being the first and only book of this character and one that will aim to do great good in giving the necessary information to all the many preachers who are called upon to erect new churches in this church building age of the church.

The delegates from Montana, Idaho and Oregon and Washington are being interested in the work and many of them have promised to support it for this purpose and to have it used throughout the church work.

WALKER FOR THE WEST END.

County Court Has Divided the Work of the Members for Different Sections of the County.

That the work of the county court may be facilitated, the county has long been divided into districts over which each member of the court is supposed to preside in the routine work which comes before the court.

County Judge Gilliland attends to the south part of the county from Pendleton southward, while Commissioner Walker looks after the western portion of the county from Athena west, and Commissioner Lee looks out for the east end.

People writing to the members of the court on county business, and especially on road and bridge work, are requested to address the member assigned to look after their particular part of the county. In this way the work of the court is systematized and facilitated.

SHEARING SWYTHE SHEEP.

Band of 40,000 Head Is Being Sheared With 16 Machines at Arlington.

The Arlington Record of last evening says of the progress of shearing on the immense band of sheep owned by Smythe & Son at that place:

A. Smythe & Son are shearing their flock of sheep. They have only 40,000 ready and willing to part with their winter coats this spring, and as they shear 2000 a day, it will require 20 days to complete the job. The shearing machine is driven by a gasoline engine and 16 men are required to operate the plant.

SCHOOL FUNDS APPORTIONED

TOTAL OF \$34,649 SENT OUT THIS WEEK.

County Superintendent Frank K. Welles Mails Out Warrants for the Largest School Fund Ever Apportioned in Umatilla County—Pendleton Heads the List With \$11,938.50.

Thirty thousand four hundred and forty-nine dollars, the largest school fund ever distributed in Umatilla county, is being sent out this week by County Superintendent Frank K. Welles, the list of the districts having been made up late last evening.

This fund gives the sum of \$5.50 to every person of school age in the county and the law requires that 85 per cent of the annual fund must be expended by the districts each year before the annual school meeting, which this year will be held on June 15.

The amount of money apportioned to Pendleton district is \$11,938.50, by far the largest apportionment made and \$2000 more than the sum received by this district last year.
