

ELLIS NOMINATED FOR CONGRESS, CAKE FOR THE SENATE

CRISIS DEMANDS MORE WARSHIPS

President Roosevelt Urges Upon Congress the Necessity of Action.

MANCHURIAN SITUATION IS SAID TO BE ACUTE

Secretary Root Joins With the President in Demanding More Naval Equipment—Would Begin Construction of Battleships at Once—Said That Japan and Russia Seek to Place Wrong Construction on the Portsmouth Treaty.

Washington, April 18.—That there has been some emergency in the international relations of the United States which has convinced the administration of the urgent need of squeezing out of congress every cent possible for a navy is believed by reason of recent developments.

The emergency is so serious that the president and Secretary Root have taken steps to inform several prominent congressmen of it in the hope of securing more favorable attitude toward the four battleships measure.

President Roosevelt has written a letter to Speaker Cannon urging it. Today Hobson, after a conference with Senator Perkins, declared an effort would be made to insert a provision in the senate bill providing for the immediate appropriation of money to begin the construction of battleships.

It is understood that the emergency that is giving the president concern is the situation in Manchuria and that it is involved in the seeming cooperation of Japan and Russia to force their own construction of the Portsmouth treaty to a disadvantage to China and other countries.

Pentagonary Grain Sacks Reduced.
Walla Walla, April 18.—A further reduction in the price of grain sacks has been determined upon by the state board of control at its regular meeting at the pentagonary. Having reduced last year's price of 9 cents to 7.5 the board made a further cut to 6.9 cents. Orders already received at will be filled at the lowest quotation. This price was reached after a close figuring of cost was done. The existing low figure on lute is responsible for the cut.

Big Track Meet.
Stanford University, April 18.—One of the greatest crowds in the history of the amateur athletic club in California, gathered on the Stanford campus this afternoon to witness the annual track meet between Stanford and California. Both colleges have strong teams although Stanford was weakened by the recent faculty uprisals. California is considered a slight favorite.

Earthquake Anniversary.
San Francisco, April 18.—San Francisco is too busy preparing for the coming of the battleship fleet to pay much attention to past events, and as a result the anniversary of the great earthquake and fire of two years ago passed with but very little observance. Special services will be held in a few churches tomorrow in memory of those who perished in the great calamity of April 18, 1906.

New Harriman Road.
Chicago, April 18.—Through freight traffic will be inaugurated tomorrow on the new Harriman road from Jackson, Tenn., to Birmingham, Ala., giving the Illinois Central a connection with the Southern, Seaboard Air Line with Central of Georgia roads.

TOBACCO TRUST GIVES UP FIGHT

BIG CORPORATION WILL BE DISSOLVED

With Capital of Over \$350,000,000 the Big Trust Decides to Dissolve Rather Than Face Trial—Government Officials Have Gathered Immense Mass of Incriminating Evidence Against the Trust.

Richmond, April 18.—Frightened by the mass of evidence gathered against it by government officials and rather than face the trial in New York before the United States circuit court set on May 19, it is said that the American Tobacco company will dissolve.

The dissolution of the \$350,000,000 company is practically admitted by the officials today who would not allow their names to be mentioned. This step is said to be advised by the company's attorneys in Washington, who are of the opinion that the company would be liable anyway to a forcible dissolution by the federal government under the Sherman anti-trust law.

Burned in Jail.
Seneca, Kan., April 18.—James Lally, who was charged with murder, was burned to death this morning in a fire that destroyed the jail. Prisoner is believed to have set fire to the bed with suicidal intent.

PRIMARY ELECTION SHOWS STATEMENT NO. 1 IS STRONG

Cake Leads Fulton By About 1800 Votes With But Few Counties To Hear From

Ellis Leads Geer in the District by 1600 With But Few Counties to Report Yet—Geer Is But Six Ahead of Shepherd at 2 O'clock—In the Legislative Contest Barrett and Mann Are Elected—Statement No. 1 Will Control Next Legislature.

With the returns from the state and congressional district practically all in this afternoon the result shows that Cake is nominated for the United States senate unless Senator Fulton makes some extraordinary gains in counties not yet heard from and that W. R. Ellis is renominated for congress, by a safe vote.

The returns come in very slowly and it will be well toward midnight before complete returns will have been compiled.

Fulton Concedes Defeat.
Portland, April 18.—Senator Fulton practically concedes the nomination of H. M. Cake as the result of yesterday's primaries in the senatorial election contest.

As yet he has not issued his formal statement, but in an authorized interview to the United Press at Astoria, he said:

"What the final figures will show I cannot state, but from present returns it looks as if I had lost out. If such shall prove to be the case I will cheerfully accept the verdict of the people. I will submit a formal statement later."

Senatorial Vote Close.
Portland, April 18.—With about three-fourths of yesterday's primary vote accounted for, the nomination of H. M. Cake over United States Senator Fulton appears to be practically certain.

The vote up to 2 o'clock including 34 precincts in Portland, but excepting the vote in Walla and Curry counties, not reported, is Cake, 15,848; Fulton, 13,950.

Senator Fulton does not concede his opponent's election, but declares that the reports are still too meagre upon which to base any conclusion.

Statement No. 1 next will apparently control the next state legislature although the division will be closer than first believed.

Twelve counties, including Multnomah, have returned statement No. 1 representatives.

Ellis 1600 in the Lead.
Incomplete returns on the congressional struggle give the plum to Congressman Ellis. The returns up to 2 o'clock are Ellis, 5596; Geer, 4379; Shepherd, 4273.

C. B. Atchison and W. H. Hart, both are running a neck and neck race for railroad commissioners in the second district and the nomination is claimed at the headquarters of both candidates.

Campbell is accredited with the nomination in the first district.

Umatilla County.
Complete returns have now been

received here from 27 precincts of this county and they practically represent the vote of the county for the reason that the points not yet heard from have but few votes. The summary of the voting in the 27 precincts shows the following:

In the city of Pendleton Ellis won over Geer by a vote of 4 to 1, while in the county at large he received more than a 3 to 1 vote. Geer failed to carry a single one of the precincts thus far heard from and in four of those now reported upon he failed to receive a single vote.

In view of the neck and neck race being run in this county between Fulton and Cake it will take the official count to tell definitely how the county has gone upon the senatorship.

L. L. Mann and C. A. Barrett are both assured of being nominated for representatives though the returns from some of the north end precincts are not yet in and they may lessen the gap between those two men and Steen. However, it is improbable that Steen can pass Barrett.

F. W. Hendley has easily won from his opponent for recorder, while Ralph Folsom has apparently a safe lead over Wall for coroner. However, Wall's race was a strong one and he carried the city of Pendleton by a majority of six votes.

For commissioner Horace Walker is safely nominated with Joe Bailey as his closest competitor.

Statement No. 1 Wins.
Portland, April 18.—As the count proceeds a sweeping victor for the statement No. 1 candidates in Multnomah becomes more apparent. At statement No. 1 headquarters it is declared that the statement candidates will win by a majority of about four to one.

Returns Come in Slowly.
Portland, April 18.—At the Cake headquarters this morning, Judge Cake is receiving returns, but refuses to make a statement. He declares that he expects to be elected on the

face of the present returns which are very slowly coming in.
Gilliam county reports Cake, 111; Fulton, 148; Ellis, 166; Geer, 53; Shepherd, 26.

Cake Carries Baker County.

Baker City, April 18.—H. M. Cake is leading C. W. Fulton for the senate by 162 this afternoon in Baker county with but a few outlying precincts to hear from. Geer is ahead 60 votes at 2 o'clock with a few precincts to hear from.

Cake and Ellis Carry Union.

La Grande, April 18.—Cake and Ellis carried Union county in yesterday's primaries by strong pluralities. The vote on senator and congressman in this county was as follows: Cake 533; Fulton, 505; Ellis, 807; Geer, 442; Shepherd, 129.

Many Complimentary Votes.

Upon both tickets yesterday many names were written in by voters and several democrats were given gratuitous nominations. Whether or not they will accept the invitations to run remains to be seen.

C. H. Carter received quite a number of votes for district attorney. Homer Watts, a sufficient number to nominate him for school superintendent, while T. C. Frazier of Milton was also given the democratic nomination for county clerk.

At Echo, Col. H. G. Newport received 65 votes for sheriff and he also received a few votes for that office in at least one Pendleton precinct. However, Sheriff Taylor also received many votes for the republican nomination for sheriff.

In North Pendleton he was given 15 complimentary votes, while a goodly number were cast for him in the other local precincts. In Pendleton precincts he was given in the vicinity of 50 votes, but the judges refused to count them, through a misapprehension regarding the law.

In several precincts Assessor Strain also received votes on the republican ticket, while on the other hand many complimentary democratic votes were cast for republican officials having no opposition.

In cases where a man is voted for by members of the opposite party the votes should be counted for him, according to District Attorney Phelps, and if he receives a greater number of votes than any other man he is entitled to the nomination, even though he be of a different political faith. There is little doubt but that Sheriff Taylor was given the republican nomination also, in which case he will be

GLORIOUS FETE FOR BIG FLEET

LOS ANGELES IS GORGEOUSLY DECORATED.

Over 200,000 People Line the Water Front at San Pedro to See the Battleships Enter the Harbor—Trolley Cars Crowded All Day in Carrying Out the Immense Crowds—Women Will Give the Sailors 5000 Easter Lilies.

Los Angeles, April 18.—Decorated more gorgeously than for any other event in the history of the city, Los Angeles awaits with impatience the arrival of the fleet.

Admiral Thomas and his fighters are due to arrive at San Pedro harbor at 3 o'clock this afternoon. By 8 o'clock this morning every outbound trolley car was filled to the guard rails with the tremendous crowds.

Fully 200,000 people will be massed on the water front at San Pedro when the big ships plough in.

Tomorrow morning the fleet will be divided, the third division in charge of Captain Harber will go to Santa Monica, the fourth under Rear Admiral Sperry will go to Redonda, the second under Rear Admiral Emory will go to Long Beach, and the balance will stay at San Pedro.

At Long Beach 5000 Easter lilies will be given to the sailors by the ladies of that place.

CATHOLIC CHURCH DENIES MARRIAGE

Archbishop Announces That Millions of Maloney Will Have No Effect.

SAYS THAT MARRIAGE WITH OSBORNE IS LEGAL.

The Pope Could Not Even Bring About Further Ceremony Which Church Would Sanction—Miss Maloney a Striking Beauty—Would Prefer Samuel Clarkson to Whom She Was Married in Montreal—Maloney Family Will Not Sanction Latter Marriage.

Philadelphia, April 18.—Pretty Helen Maloney has lost her efforts to get the Catholic church to sanction her marriage with Samuel Clarkson, a young Englishman. Today Archbishop Ryan has announced this fact. Bishop Ryan stated that what the millions and the power of Henry VIII, could not do 500 years ago, the millions of Martin Maloney could not do today.

The archbishop declared that if a legal wedding was performed when she eloped with Herbert Osborne, the stock broker, no power on earth, not even the pope, could bring about any ceremony which the church would sanction.

Miss Maloney is 22 years old and strikingly beautiful. In 1905 she eloped with Herbert Osborne, then a Princeton student and was married under an assumed name. They declare the marriage was never consummated and was always considered a joke.

Last October Miss Maloney eloped with Samuel Clarkson and was married at Montreal. Now the Catholic church, of which the Maloneys are very devout members, refuse to sanction the latter marriage.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING.

Church of the Redeemer Will Elect Vestrymen and Transact Other Business on Monday Evening.

The regular annual parish meeting of the Church of the Redeemer will be held in the church on Monday evening, April 20, at 7:30, at which time the treasurer's report will be submitted, vestrymen will be elected for the ensuing year and other business will be transacted.

Excellent Wool Crop.

The wool clip of the southern part of Washington is now coming into North Yakima, and is reported to be the best, so far as quality is concerned, produced in this state in years. The quantity is probably not more than half that of four years ago. The taking in of large areas of former free range to the forest reserves has reduced the number of bands of sheep to a definite figure. Shearing is now in progress in Kittitas canyon, states a recent report. At present the prices quoted are from 9 to 13 cents for wool. The lambing season has been a highly successful one.

President Nominates.

Washington, April 18.—The president today sent in the nomination of Lawrence O. Murray of New York, as comptroller of currency, in place of William Ridgeley, of Illinois, who resigned to accept the presidency of a Kansas City bank.

Left for Wallace.

Mrs. Ida Hamblen, supervising deputy of the Order of Royal Neighbors, left at noon today for Wallace, Idaho, where she goes to visit a number of local societies of the order in the Coeur d'Alene. She expects to be absent for several days.

FIRST GAME OF SEASON PLAYED TODAY

At the Matlock grounds this afternoon the Pendleton baseball nine is playing for the first time against an outside team. The La Grande team, captained by Jack O'Brien, came over on No. 1 today and the game was called at 3 o'clock.

The line-up for the Pendleton team is the same as announced yesterday. Parkes being in the box as pitcher, while Conrad is behind the bat.

Another game will be played tomorrow afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock, and if the weather remains fair it will likely be attended by one of the largest baseball crowds that has been out in several years.

A bunch of rooters, organized by Elmer Turner and several assistants, will hold down the bleachers and do what they can towards assisting the Pendleton team to win.
