### Early Morning Returns.

Portland, April 18.—With but a third of the vote of the state counted and returns coming in slowly, H. M. Calk apparently leads Fulton by a majority of 2500 at noon. Calk's majority in Multnomah county will be a little over 2000 and the returns from all over the state outside of Multnomah indicate that his majority at the present time is about 1500.

Fulton's lead in Lane and Clatsop cut Calk's majority, but at 5 o'clock this morning Judge Calk stated that the returns from districts outside of Multnomah were more satisfactory than he had expected.

Statement No. 1 has apparently carried and will probably control the state legislature. The entire Multnomah county delegation will be for statement No. 1.

## SCHOOL BOYS ENGAGE IN RIFLE PRACTICE

The school boys of Washington are looking forward to the Easter week tournament which will be the first held in this city where school boys will shoot with military rifles, says a Washington letter. The movement for school boy practice is spreading rapidly throughout the country, having been greatly stimulated by the success which it has met in New York city, where it is conducted under the auspices of the public schools athletic league.

Washington has no such influence of wealthy organization, but the National Capital Rifle and Revolver club, which is an organization composed of civilian and military men in about equal numbers, undertook the task and all indications point to a most successful tournament. The school boys fell in line and for some weeks the officers of the high school cadets, which is a corps, have been receiving instructions and imparting it to their companies.

During Easter week there will be individual matches for the junior marksmanship medal given by the National Rifle association, company, battalion and school team matches, ending with special matches for the officers. The war department and especially the National Board for the

Promotion of Rifle Practice, is heartily seconding the movement.

General Wm. P. Hall and Captain F. N. Slaydon of the board, will be in attendance and General Oliver, president of the board and assistant secretary of war, will present the medals and prizes. The National Rifle association will be represented by Lieutenant Albert S. Jones, its secretary, who did so much toward making the New York tournament a success.

Each of the ammunition companies and several of the arms companies will have their experts in attendance and the tournament is expected to attract wide attention. The war department has loaned a number of the new Springfields, fitted with 22 barrels, but other 22 military rifles may be used. The matches will last the entire week.

### AFTER SAM MILLER

FORMER GAMBLER TAKEN UPON THREE CHARGES.

Returned to Vote in Primary Election and Met With Three Long-Standing Warrants—Plead Not Guilty Through Attorney—Will Be Tried April 21—Admitted Guilt in Police Court.

Sam Miller, former Pendleton gambler and who came back to vote yesterday, was arrested this morning upon three gambling charges that have been pending against him since last fall.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Col. J. H. Raley appeared in the circuit court in behalf of Miller and entered pleas of not guilty to all three charges. April 21 was then set as the date for trial.

Until last fall Miller maintained quarters over the State saloon and he was arrested upon three gambling charges by the police. When brought before the police court he plead guilty and was fined. Later John McCourt, acting district attorney, filed similar charges against him in the circuit court. However, Miller left town before the papers were served

upon him and he was never found by the sheriff.

Yesterday Miller returned to the city to cast a vote in the primary election and this morning the long-standing warrants were dug up against him.
