PUT OUT "REDS"

IMMIGRATION BUREAUS TO BE MORE STRICT

Conference of United States Attorneys Being Held to Discuss Methods of Suppressing Anarchy in the United States — Attorney General Bonaparte Taking Active Interest in the Matter.

Washington, April 20.—As a direct result, it is thought, of President Roosevelt's denunciation of anarchists, a conference of assistant United States attorneys who represent the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization in naturalization proceedings in different parts of the country met in Washington today.

The meeting, it is understood, has a direct bearing on the anti-anarchist crusade undertaken some time ago by the department of commerce and labor, and which is now being pushed with fresh vigor. Attorney General Charles J. Bonaparte will take a prominent part in the conference, which is being held in the department of justice and will continue through the week.

The function of these attorneys is to represent the government at the final hearing given to persons who desire to secure certificates of naturalization and thus become citizens of the United States. The bureau, under the law enacted 18 months ago, makes an examination not only of the antecedents of the person who desires to be naturalized but an examination as well of the two persons who sign the application.

This examination is made through the assistant attorneys who are in session here. Special examiners are detailed to assist the attorneys in their circuits.

It is thought that with the facilities at the command of the attorneys they will prove valuable adjuncts in locating aliens of anarchistic tendencies.

PRAIRIE FIRES RAGE.

Wyoming Ranges Are Swept Over by Flames.

With the continuation of dry weather come reports of prairie fires almost daily, and the later reports indicate greater damage than any of those previous, says the Cheyenne Tribune.

A report reached the city last evening that the ranch of L. N. Bard on Bear creek, was threatened by a prairie fire and Mr. Baird, who was in the city, left immediately for the ranch. The Bard ranch was badly damaged by fire a few days ago.

Reports from along the C. & S. in the vicinity of Iron mountain are to the effect that the light of a prairie fire was seen during the greater part of Monday night and it is reported that the fire burned off a great deal of the pastures of "Bob" Allen, whose ranch is some miles east of the railroad.

M. H. Hartung says that the north pastures of the Campstool ranch have been badly burned over, but that thus far the southern pastures are unharmed.

The greater number of the fires are caused by engine sparks, and when they occur generally make so much headway, and get so far from the railroad that section men make no effort to extinguish them. Trainmen are instructed to report the burning of fences or telegraph poles along the Union Pacific.

The report of the burning of a Colorado ranch's buildings and all appears in another column and is the worst blaze thus far reported as the result of a prairie fire.

The wind at Cheyenne changed this morning to the south and a thin haze of smoke indicative of forest or prairie fires far to the southwest.

Editors to See Fleet.

San Francisco, April 20.—Scores of Pacific coast newspaper men are in San Francisco today and will leave late this afternoon on the annual excursion of the California State Press association. Eight days will be spent in sight-seeing in southern California and the editors will be afforded an opportunity to inspect the battleship fleet now at Los Angeles ports. The itinerary includes visits to Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino, Arrow Head, Redlands, San Diego, Pasadena, Long Beach and other points of interest in the southern part of the state.
