LA GRANDE PLAYERS GO HOME WITH TWO DEFEATS

"Beetpickers" Draw a Whitewash Saturday and Little End of Big Score Sunday—Parkes Makes Fourteen Men Fan the Air in First Contest—Crowds Small But Spirit Is Good—Season Opens Auspiciously.

By winning two straight games from La Grande, Saturday by a score of 6 to 0 and yesterday by 14 to 4, the Pendleton team has started the season with something like old-time spirit.

In the game Saturday Parkes was the twirler for the local team and the fact that the total score of La Grande is expressed by a goose egg shows he has not forgotten how. During the game he struck out 14 "Beetpickers," while but four Pendleton men were fanned during the game.

The game yesterday was a seven inning contest, the La Grande players being forced to quit at the expiration of that inning in order to catch their train.

La Grande Leads Off. During the first three innings the game was a close one, and for a portion of the time La Grande had the lead. It was then brought up to "four-all" and henceforth the scoring was all by Pendleton. When the local boys came to the bat in the seventh inning the score was nine to

four and they added six more to the list before the game closed.

A fair-sized crowd was out yesterday and from a Pendleton standpoint the game was satisfactory. But it was a slow contest and too one-sided to be of absorbing interest.

Baker and Heslin Mix.

An unpleasant feature was a scrap at first base between Baker, Pendleton's first baseman and Heslin, La Grande's pitcher. Heslin was running to first and while running was struck in the back by the ball. When he reached first he took a punch at the baseman and Baker swung back at him, but missed. He then grappled with Heslin and threw him when the two were separated.

Four Pendleton Men Look Over the Country Surrounding Prince Rupert.

Albert Horseman and J. B. McDill will leave this evening over the Northern Pacific for Seattle, where they will take a boat for Prince Rupert, the Pacific coast terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific, the new Canadian railroad which is now being built across the domain. Prince Rupert is 600 miles north of Vancouver from which latter place the party expects to sail this week. They will be absent a month and will look over the north country thoroughly with a possible view of securing land or timber.

LEADING KNIGHTS

STATE OFFICERS ARE HERE ON BRIEF VISIT.

Grand Chancellor, Supreme Representative and Grand Keeper of Records on Their Way to Baker City to Dedicate New Temple—Will Return to Visit Lodges of Umatilla County—Order Prospering Says Wall.

John M. Wall, grand chancellor, W. M. Cake, supreme representative, L. R. Stinson, grand keeper of records and seal, and George W. Knight, member of the finance committee, constitute a bunch of prominent Knights of Pythias in the city today.

All four of the gentlemen arrived last evening and stopped off while en route to Baker City to visit with friends here during the day. They will leave this evening for La Grande and will be at Baker City tomorrow, where the new Knights of Pythias temple is to be dedicated.

After their visit at Baker the party will return to Pendleton and it is probable that Grand Chancellor Wall and Mr. Stinson will make a tour of the lodges in this county.

That the order of Knights of Pythias was never in better condition than at present is declared by the grand chancellor. All over the domain lodges are now engaged in erecting buildings of their own or else have purchased land with that object in view. At Eugene the lodge but recently bought a \$5000 building site and at dozens of other points similar steps have been taken. The K. of P. building just erected at Baker City is one of the finest structures of the kind in the northwest.

AWFUL COST OF CRIME.

New York City Paid Out \$35,562,133 Last Year.

New York, April 20.—The annual cost of crime in the city of New York is rapidly assuming such gigantic proportions that it will soon be equivalent to not only the interest on the national debt, but also to a substantial annual payment on the principal. Last year crime and its results cost that city \$35,562,133.24. This sum could be devoted to the construction of new subways for which the city is so vainly clamoring would build one of these underground lines of travel every year, clean all the streets, pay the salaries of all the city officials, and leave about \$1,000,000 in addition for the support of hospitals.

In addition to this vast sum \$42,605,472 was spent in the greater city for the detection, punishment and prevention of crime. Crime during the past year exacted also \$424,180 for the maintenance of the district attorney's office and \$13,849,841 for the police department.

Throughout the whole country more than 300,000 inmates of almshouses, asylums, reformatories and similar institutions cost the country more than \$62,000,000 annually. In New York alone the proportion of the annual budget traceable to crime amounts to \$75,866,100. Through other channels the total probably exceeds \$125,000,000, so that New York city has the record of having the highest crime tax in the United States.

Throughout the country the direct cost of crime is estimated at \$70,000,000, but New York's bill is far in excess of that of any other city.

BLIND MAN TO GET DAMAGES.

Awarded \$10,000 From Sub-contractors on North Bank Road.

Goldendale, Wash., April 20.—In the case of John Johnson against Cochran & Woolson, sub-contractors on the north bank road, which has been on trial in the superior court for the past three days before Judge McCredie, the jury returned a verdict awarding Johnson \$10,000 damages. Johnson was a laborer in the employ of Cochran & Woolson, at Lyle, in May, 1906, and while engaged helping explode a spring blast, had both eyes put out. The case is the largest one ever tried in Klickitat county to recover for personal damages. Henry E. McGinn represented the plaintiff. The case was tried once before in the United States court at Walla Walla, where Johnson received a verdict for the same amount, but the verdict was set aside.

Oregon Has 750 Automobiles.

More than 150 applications for automobile licenses have been made at the secretary of state's office since January 1 and the number of licenses granted each day is growing. From eight to 10 licenses are issued daily, which would indicate that the automobile business in Oregon is good. The total number of state licenses issued up to this time is 750. A great number of motor cycle licenses have been issued from the secretary of state's office.

Marriage License Issued.

A marriage license was granted this forenoon to Le Roy, Walter Hill and Miss Lola Warren.

"The defeat of Senator Fulton was due in no sense to his personality, to his record, or to anything that he has ever done. In my estimation it is due simply, as I said before, to the fact that the people demanded that their senators should be elected by popular vote, and that Mr. Fulton's position

was not sufficiently positive on this to carry the people with him.

"A powerful cause of yesterday's victory, together with the sentiment in favor of Statement No. 1, was the newspapers throughout the state of Oregon. There could be no more striking illustration of their power. There are fully 80 per cent of the newspapers of the state which are ardent advocates of the popular election of senators and statement No. 1. As exponents of that cause they supported me—not personally, but as the one who was advocating the people's rights."
