RUSSIANS GO TO BEET FIELDS

EXODUS FROM WALLA WALLA TO LA GRANDE.

Sixty Russia Residents of the Garden City Go to Grande Ronde Beet for the Summer—Labor for the Beet Fields Is Scarce—Colony of Russians for La Grande.

During the past week a general exodus of the Russian population of Walla Walla was noticeable, says the Walla Walla Union. In two days the O. R. & N. ticket agent sold 61 transportation fares to Russians leaving the Garden city. The destination of the emigrants is the sugar fields near La Grande, Oregon, where they will work the large beet farms of that section by contract.

Nearly every one of the Russians moved, bag and baggage and all sorts of furniture and household articles could be observed among the shipments made by them. Having contracted for work in the beet fields furnished tickets for them, every one of the Russians and a job waiting when the destination was reached.

The concerted action of the Russian population of Walla Walla in moving to new fields is characteristic of the people. Like the Chinese and Japanese they go in bunches, large and small, and constitute a town of themselves.

The Russians who are more willing to do that kind of work than the average American, do it with a thoroughness and quickness not known among the natives.

SAN JACINTO DAY.

Victory of General Sam Houston Being Celebrated Throughout Texas—Congressmen Join.

Austin, Texas, April 21.—San Jacinto day is being observed throughout Texas today, celebrations and meetings having been arranged by patriotic societies in nearly all cities and towns. Business is generally suspended and all banks and public offices are closed, as this is a legal holiday in Texas.

San Jacinto day commemorates the victory of General Sam Houston and his army of 750 men over the main division of the Mexican army, 1800 strong, on the banks of the San Jacinto river, April 21, 1836. This battle was the last blow in the battle for the freedom of the Texas republic. The Americans rushed into battle shouting: "Remember the Alamo!" and hurled themselves against the stronger Mexican ranks with fury that was irresistible. In less than an hour the Mexicans were utterly routed; 630 of them being slain and 730 more captured. Santa Ana was taken prisoner and Houston had difficulty in restraining the victors from tearing the barbarous general to pieces.

Washington, April 21.—Texas members of congress will join with the Texas Society of Washington in an elaborate celebration of San Jacinto day this evening.

Musical Contest This Week.

Preparations for the Whitman Conservatory of Music northwest musical contest which is to be held here this week are almost completed. There will be about 40 contestants in all, the greater number being in piano, with a large number in voice as well and about a half dozen in violin.

This will easily be the largest musical contest of any sort ever held in the northwest and will be unique in the musical history of Walla Walla. Contestants will be present from all parts of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, to try for the valuable prizes which are offered. These consist of a full scholarship for one year, including board, room, tuition, and other expenses, in each department of the contest.

It will afford an unusual opportunity to the discriminating musicians of Walla Walla to hear the best pupils of the best teachers in the northwest and to compare the efficiency and technique of their work.—Walla Walla Union.

TO SAVE HOME OF M'LAUGHLIN

HISTORIC BUILDING IS GIVEN TO OREGON CITY.

Historic Building to Be Made Into a Public Library and Reading Room—Scores of Distinguished Guests Entertained There in Pioneer Days—Familiar Landmark for Many Years.

Oregon City, April 18.—The old home of Dr. John McLoughlin, where the founder of Oregon City and the father of Oregon entertained scores of distinguished guests in the pioneer days of the Oregon territory, is to escape destruction and a plan was placed on foot today to preserve the historic structure.

The ground on which the house stands was sold this week by Mrs. J. L. Barlow and Captain J. T. Apperson for \$8000 to the Hawley Pulp and Paper company, which intends to utilize the ground for an auxiliary manufacturing plant. Upon hearing of the transfer of the property, Mayor Carril immediately communicated to W. P. Hawley, president and general manager of the company, his desire to save the house, which is old and useless from a business point of view, and Mr. Hawley very graciously offered to give the building to the city.

Fund to Be Raised.
Early next week Mayor Carril will call a meeting of the city officials and interest people and endeavor to raise a fund of a few hundred dollars which will be used to move the building to city property adjoining its present location and fit up the old house for a free reading room and a rest room for visitors. This plan will unquestionably have enthusiastic approval, for there is no place of this kind in Oregon City.

Two years ago the owners of the property offered to sell the building and grounds to the city and the project was favored by E. G. Canfield, who was mayor at that time, but on a referendum vote the proposition was defeated, as the city was in debt and the majority of the voters considered it unwise to add another burden to its finances. The new scheme, however, will cost Oregon City nothing, and there is no question of its success.

The McLoughlin house has long been a familiar landmark here, and the building was so stoutly constructed that the ravages of time have left it in fair condition.

SOCIALISTS NOMINATE.

Disciples of Carl Marx Get Together in Wasco County—Put Full State and County Ticket in Field.

Wasco county socialists held a convention in the Schanno hall in The Dalles last night and nominated a full ticket with the exceptions of clerk and treasurer, says The Dalles Chronicle. It was an enthusiastic meeting and the following were nominated:

State senator, W. S. Crawford; representatives, E. R. Daily and H. Nickerson; school superintendent, D. L. Dutton; assessor, Frank Leblin; commissioner, Will Means; surveyor, A. B. Bradford; coroner, J. W. Elton; precinct officers, justice of the peace, F. M. Baker; constable, G. F. Arnold.

Diphtheria at Insane Asylum.

Three cases of diphtheria have been discovered in the Oregon state insane asylum in this city, says the Salem Statesman. The afflicted ones are all children and the authorities suspect that the disease was brought to the institution by a child sent up some days ago from Multnomah county. As soon as the disease developed the afflicted children were promptly isolated, the ward quarantined and an immunizing process used. Anti-toxin has been sent for and the treatment will be used for the three cases. There is not much danger of an epidemic, according to the physicians at the asylum, as everything possible has been done to control the disease.

Boy Killed in Salem.

Kirk Barr, a 16-year-old boy, whose parents reside at Turner, was run over and instantly killed by the Cottage Grove local at the Southern Pacific passenger depot about 2:30 last evening, says the Salem Statesman. The boy was trying to board the train while it was in motion, lost his hold and fell under the wheels. The body was badly mangled and the head almost severed from the body.
