NOT DEMOCRATIC VOTES.

H. M. Cake Denies Fulton's Statement Concerning Primaries.

H. M. Cake, republican nominee for United States senator, this morning denied emphatically the charges made by Senator Fulton that Cake had been elected in the primaries through the votes of democrats registered as republicans, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

"It is foolish to make such a charge," said Mr. Cake. "In the first place very few democrats registered as republicans and there is no reason why they should have voted for me instead of for Senator Fulton. Then the assertion is ridiculous on the face of it because of the large majority I have over Senator Fulton. No democratic vote would have changed the results or have effected the election. The number of votes cast for me puts aside any doubt that I was not the choice of the republican party."

"I am assured of the support of the entire party throughout the state in many telegrams which have been coming in since Saturday night. There is no doubt but that all republicans will vote for me. This morning I received a telegram from Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton assuring me of his support and his heartiest congratulations. Mr. Lowell was the leader of the Fulton forces in eastern Oregon."

Late reports received at Mr. Cake's headquarters show that if all the returns still out should show votes for Fulton they could not change the result in any way. Klamath county has returned 200 majority for Fulton and Lincoln has 7 of the 14 precincts still to be heard from. The other 7 returned a majority of 10 for Fulton. Mr. Cake will start out the last of this week or the first of next to tour the state and will speak in every important town on the railroad. The itinerary has not yet been made out but Mr. Cake is working on it and will probably have it completed tomorrow.

LOWELL AND THE ITCH.

DISPUTE SETTLED

STURDIVANT REACHES AN AGREEMENT WITH O. R. & N.

Railroad Company Given Use of Land and Unrestricted Use of Spring for Water Supply—Road Crosses Land But Under Protest of the Owner—Company Must Build Fence.

That the long standing controversy between A. J. Sturdivant of Pilot Rock and the Umatilla Central is at last to be amicably settled is indicated by an agreement that was filed today.

By the terms of the agreement recorded, the railroad company is given the unlimited use of a spring on the Sturdivant property and the right to lay pipes, construct a dam, head-gate, etc., for the purpose of supplying water for water tanks and depot use.

Another consideration in the agreement is that the railroad company at once construct a substantial fence along the property and that a certain parcel be deeded back to Mr. Sturdivant.

The Umatilla Central is now constructed across the property in controversy but in the past Sturdivant has opposed the right of the company to use his land. Several months before the road was completed an injunction was filed to prohibit the company from using the land and the suit is still pending.

However, the agreement which was made yesterday between Mr. Sturdivant and J. B. Eddy for the company, would indicate that at last the contending parties are to settle the matter out of court.

Dr. I. U. Temple received word today from Dr. C. J. Smith stating that the latter will arrive here May 10. The Smith party is now in Washington and they will visit in Ohio upon their way westward.

FAMOUS AS AN INTERPRETER

LEMOYNE, OF LAPWAL,
INDIAN CHARACTER

Well Known Interpreter of Northern Idaho Here to Help Settle Indian Land Matters—Can Speak Fluently All the Northwest Indian Tongues—Is Beloved by His Tribesmen and Would Be a Judge If He Could.

A keen eyed, quiet savage, with hair close cropped, wearing a suit of neat fitting "store clothes," educated in a high degree, yet associating wholly with his tribesmen, the Nez Perces, Lemoyne, the famous Indian interpreter of Lapwai, Idaho, has attracted much attention on the streets of Pendleton today.

Lemoyne was called here to interpret in a number of Indian land matters in which his tribesmen are interested and has been busy with the matters while in the city.

He is the most prominent Indian interpreter in the northwest and not only speaks the Nez Perce fluently, but is able to interpret the Flathead, Blackfoot, Yakima, Bannock, Cayuse and every other northwest Indian tongue. Having an excellent English education his interpretations are excellent and he is in constant demand in the Idaho courts as an official interpreter.

He has been employed as official interpreter in both the circuit and federal courts in northern Idaho and has been instrumental in settling more Indian difficulties in that section of the northwest than any other individual, perhaps.

Lemoyne is slightly deformed, is small of stature and stoops somewhat, but has a keen intellect and a ready speech for any translation of the difficult Indian tongues and is a most interesting character.

He is not only an excellent interpreter but he is an advisor and counselor for the Indians and has a broad sense of justice which enables him to see the equity of the intricate Indian cases which are constantly before the courts of the northwest. He says that if he were not an interpreter he would like to be a judge and sit in judgment among his people.

The Indians have much confidence in his ability and honesty and he is being consulted constantly by his tribesmen who are in trouble.

McMINN IN TROUBLE.

Young Man Who Kicked Out School House Windows Again Arrested.

"Doc" McMinn is in trouble again and from appearances he will be given a term in the Walla Walla penitentiary. He was arrested at Milton yesterday by Constable Dykes upon a charge of horsestealing sworn out in Walla Walla. At the time of his arrest McMinn was passing through Milton on his way to the mountains.

Saturday McMinn hired a horse from the Stewart livery stable in Walla Walla and agreed to return the animal that evening. He failed to do so and his continued absence led to the warrant for his arrest.

McMinn recently served a sentence in the Umatilla county jail for breaking windows out of a school building in the east end of the county.

New Telegraph Editor.

Edgar F. Averill, who for the past two years has been city editor of the Pendleton Tribune, has accepted the position of telegraph editor on the East Oregonian and is now at work in the offices of this paper. Mr. Averill is a competent young man and is a valuable addition to the East Oregonian force. He has made a host of friends in Pendleton during his residence here and is now considered a permanent fixture in the city. He takes the place of C. E. Fisher, who recently left the East Oregonian to accept a position with the Pacific Monthly in Portland.

TWO KILLED ON O. R. & N.

Work Train Struck Boulder on the Riparia Branch.

As the result of a wreck on the Riparia division of the O. R. & N. railroad, four miles north of Almota, two men were killed and 11 injured at 8 o'clock this morning, the dead and wounded reaching this city on a work train this afternoon, says an item from Lewiston. Melvin C. Ewalt, 26 years old, a brakeman, was instantly killed, and F. Hara, a Japanese laborer, met the same fate when the work train ran into a huge boulder on the track.

Little is known as to how the accident happened, but the wreck is under investigation. The dead and injured were employed on the work train engaged in construction work on the new railroad, and the train was backing up the track when it crashed into a huge boulder. Ewalt was riding on the first car, but gave no signal to the engineer who was running the train. It is not known whether the rock rolled down just as the train rounded a sharp curve, or whether it had been lying on the track for some time.

Five work cars were demolished and the Japanese crew, who were riding on the flat car, were thrown into the air when the wreck occurred.

Launch Big Ship.

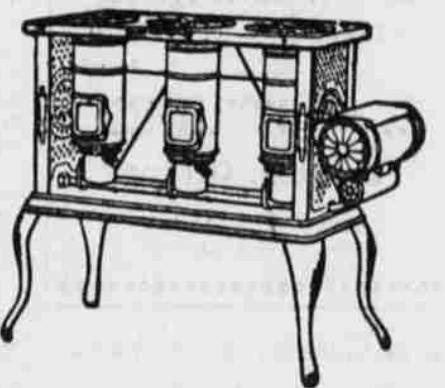
