LITTLE GIRL IS A SMOOTH THIEF

ELEVEN YEAR OLD MAID WANTED TOYS

Tiny Tot Confesses to Bellingham Police that She Stole the Money to Buy Pretty Clothes and Toys—Told Mother Things Were Given by Fabulous Rich Woman Who Cannot be Found.

Bellingham, April 22.—Sobbing until her frame shook, Ida Tuell, the 11-year-old daughter of Mrs. Almada Tuell, living on Elk street, confessed to the police Tuesday that she had stolen money from the New York Outfitting company and had been spending it for fine clothes, millinery, etc. By this confession she removed from the minds of the police all about that they had unearthed a smooth shoplifting scheme.

Search of the girl's home showed a number of articles of wearing apparel, toys and other things. According to the police the girl has deceived her mother and has been claiming that these articles were given her from time to time by a mythical rich old woman. An effort to find the residence of this woman failed. The police are still investigating the girl's actions.

The police first became suspicious of shoplifting Monday night, when they were called to the Fair store. There they found the 9-year-old sister of Ida, who claimed to be lost. She had a number of packages under her arms and gave her name to the police as Hazel Johnson. She said her home was near the brewery, but Patrolman Huntton failed to find it. Later Shelly went with the girl up Holly street and saw the mother, who denounced the girl for giving a false name.

DIXIE BANKERS MEET.

Representatives of Financial Institutions in South Carolina and Georgia.

Columbus, S. C., April 22.—Nearly every financial institution in the state is represented among the delegates here today for the eighth annual convention of the South Carolina Bankers' association. The meeting begins tonight with a social function, followed by business sessions tomorrow and Friday. The annual banquet will be held Friday evening. Visiting bankers report prosperous conditions all over the state.

In Georgia Also.

Griffin, Ga., April 22.—Members of the Macon Group of the Georgia Bankers' association met here today in annual session, nearly all of the banks of the district being represented by their officials. Among the subjects discussed were "The South and the Panic" and "Hoarding and Its Effect on Business."

Boys Guilty of Murder.

Gunnison, Colo., April 21.—Fred Collins, aged 17, and Ed Carver, aged 13, were convicted yesterday of the cold blooded murder of Louis Bruno, near Crested Butte in September, 1907. Collins was convicted of murder in the first degree and a life sentence was recommended, while Carver was found guilty of second degree murder and a recommendation for clemency was made. The evidence showed that the lads had fired on Bruno from ambush and when he ran had followed, shooting him down as he begged for mercy, and robbing him of \$57. The defense claimed Collins was mentally unbalanced and Carver, because of his youth, easily led.

Barbed Editors Meet.

Charlotte, N. C., April 22.—Moulders of public opinion in North Carolina, to the number of several scores assembled in Charlotte today for the annual meeting of the North Carolina Press association. An interesting program of papers and addresses has been arranged for two days of the convention.

Bryan to Address Editors.

New York, April 22.—Editors and publishers of prominent newspapers in all parts of the United States are in attendance today at the annual meetings of the Associated Press and the American Newspaper Publishers' association. The convention will close with a banquet, which will be addressed by William J. Bryan and other prominent men.

San Francisco Dog Show.

San Francisco, April 22.—One of the greatest exhibitions of bow-wows of all breeds and varieties ever seen in the vicinity of the Golden Gate was opened in the auditorium today by the San Francisco Kennel club. The show will last until Saturday night and promises to be a distinct society event.

CHICKEN THIEVES CAUGHT.

Freewaterites Rob Roosts and Flee to Garden City.

For stealing chickens, a quartet of Freewaterites were arrested in the city yesterday afternoon and this morning and have been sent to the Oregon town to answer for the offense.

George Anagnost, Rob Weller, Dan Kelley and Amos Thompson are the alleged offenders.

It is said they made away with several of the domesticated fowls of a Freewater resident and then left the place. Justice pursued them, however, and they have gone back to face the music under the protecting wing of the law.

William H. Jarvis, a half breed Indian, is in jail at Condonally, charged with stealing horses. Saturday he developed a clear case of measles.

BRYAN IN BAY STATE.

Nebraska and His Leaders Feel Confident of Delegation.

Boston, April 22.—Although there are contests in only six of the 25 Boston wards at the democratic caucuses today, it is evident from the indications that George Williams and his wing of the democratic party will make a determined attempt to capture the democratic state convention and send a pledged delegation to Denver for Bryan.

In a large majority of the wards the candidates for delegates to the state convention and to the 14 congress district conventions are not pledged to anyone, but it is generally understood that they will be for Bryan. Ward Sixteen is the only one in the city that is even favorable to the nomination of Governor Johnson of Minnesota.

Similar conditions are reported from other sections of the state and it is likely that the Nebraskan will secure a large majority of the delegates from Massachusetts. The state convention will be held in Boston on May 7.

BLUE GRASS RACING.

Home of the Race Horse Comes Into Its Own Today.

Lexington, Ky., April 22.—Lexington, the home of the race horse, came to its own again today, when a ten-day meeting was opened by the Kentucky association. Many fast horses are stabled at the historic Lexington track and the meet promises to be very successful.

Following the Lexington meet, a session of 23 days will be commenced at Louisville on May 5 with the running of the Kentucky Derby. Latonia track, at Cincinnati, will open June 2 and continue for 41 days.

"No racing association licensed by this commission shall furnish to poolrooms and their agents any information whatever in regard to racing or permit it to be furnished to any person." The ruling is in line with the new poolroom law.

At Pimlico Also.

Baltimore, April 22.—Racing at Pimlico will be commenced this afternoon by the Maryland Jockey club the meet lasting until Saturday, May 9.

Adjourns Legislature.

Albany, N. Y., April 22.—The present session of the New York legislature will finally adjourn tomorrow, in accordance with the senate resolution, which was concurred in by the house. The principal feature of the session now closing has been the fight for and against the passage of the bill abolishing race track gambling, in which Governor Hughes took a prominent part.
