NOMINEES MUST DECIDE SOON

ACCEPTANCE MUST BE FILED BY MAY FIRST

Carter Has Not Decided to Accept Democratic Nomination for District Attorney—Newport Has Republican Nomination for Sheriff Under Consideration—Watts Not Heard From.

Candidates nominated at the primary election must file their acceptances with the county clerk, or secretary of state, as the case may be, by May 1 in order to have their names placed upon the ballots for the June election.

At the primary election held Friday several men were given nominations without having sought the honor. Whether or not these men will consent to run has not been fully decided by those concerned.

This morning Charles H. Carter, who was given the democratic nomination for district attorney, stated that he wished to make no statement regarding his candidacy at this time.

Col. H. G. Newport, who received the republican nomination for sheriff, also says that he has the subject under consideration and whether or not he will run remains to be seen.

Homer I. Watts, whom the democrats named as their candidate for school superintendent, has not yet been heard from. However, it has been disclosed that he was registered as a republican, though he had previously been affiliated with the democratic party.

Injured by a Blast. Dr. W. G. Cole was called to O. R. & N. train No. 1 today to attend a Greek laborer who was injured in a blast at Huron this forenoon on the O. R. & N. track work. The Greek was not seriously injured, one leg having been lacerated somewhat by the blast, and he was sent on to St. Vincent's hospital at Portland.

Walla Walla Elks' Meeting. At Walla Walla a rousing Elks' meeting was held last night and a class of 20 or 25 from Pasco was initiated. A special train was run from Pasco to Walla Walla to take the candidates to the Garden City.
