Autos Barred from Roads.

The county commissioners passed an ordinance recently, prohibiting all automobiles from traveling the river grade out north of town, says the Boise Capital News. This was done because of the fear that some accident might occur by teams becoming frightened by the automobiles. All automobiles will be obliged to go by the hill road.

Some trouble occurred on the grade Saturday, when Mr. Baxter of Boise was driving his machine over the grade and met Henry Cox, who was driving a team. The team would not pass the auto and Mr. Cox insisted that Mr. Baxter should return and drive his machine over the hill road or he, Mr. Cox, would report him to the county commissioners. It seems that Mr. Baxter did not comply with Mr. Cox's request and was reported by the latter gentleman to the commissioners. What the outcome will be had not been learned.

Law Sometimes Winks.

That the law is inclined to wink at fraudulent statements made to further commercial transactions was remarked by Judge Preble in the superior court this morning, say the Yakima Republic.

"The law appears to appreciate sharp wits in commercial dealings," said the judge, "and numerous decisions in regard to statements made to further such dealing show that a certain amount of lying is permissible. In the case of a deal between two parties in which correct information can be acquired by both and one accepts as true the statements of another, even if those statements are fraudulent, that does not necessarily invalidate the transaction."

Working the Flagstaff.

John G. Cleary, one of the principal owners of the Dorothy Flagstaff mine, arrived in the city yesterday from his home at Boston and is busily engaged in getting things in shape to begin work at the mine, says the Baker City Herald. Men are at the mine now getting the cyanide plant ready to make a test and as soon as things can be gotten in shape work will be resumed underground and the property developed further. There is considerable ore on the dump and men were working to cross cut other veins when the mine closed because of the coal shortage. There is plenty of fuel on hand now and it will not

be long until a large force of men will be employed there.

Eastern Colony.

At the meeting of the governing board of the Commercial club, which will be held at noon today at the Hollinger hotel, attention will be given a communication from an eastern man who represents a colony of people who are desirous of purchasing a 1000-acre tract of land at some point in this section. The colony will be prepared to pay the sum of \$25 an acre should upon investigation the land offered be found desirable. The identity of the agent representing the colony is not given, as he prefers to keep that information from the public at this time.—Lewiston Tribune.

Laying Track.

The Moscow Post publishes the following showing the status of the work on the Spokane & Inland.

"Tracklaying on the Moscow extension of the Spokane & Inland was commenced several days ago with 100 men on the job. The track is already laid past the Ringo farm, three miles south of Palouse, and will be completed to Viola by the 20th. This side of Viola there are several large cuts to be finished and track laying will be held up for some time. The men will be kept busy, however, ballasting the road at the other end of the line and putting it in shape for traffic."

To Beautify Cemetery.

A movement to materially improve Tahoma cemetery has been started in North Yakima by the different women's clubs of the city, says the Republic. When the city council meets tonight it will consider the feasibility of passing a resolution giving the ladies of the city power to go ahead, on their own initiative, with the work outlined by them relative to making Tahoma cemetery one of the beauty spots of the valley.

Columbia River Valley.

Hood River, Wasco county, H. L. Hasbrouck.—Normal weather prevailed all this week, with no rain till Friday.

Mountain Park, Wasco county, Raymond Markley.—The weather during the fore part of the week was warm and clear, but the latter part was cooler, with heavy rains on Friday.

Cascade Locks, Wasco county, Val W. Tompkins.—Mild weather prevailed, with gentle westerly winds. The rainfall on Friday and Saturday was very beneficial. The snow is disappearing rapidly from high elevations. Mikalo, Gilliam county, J. F. Chandler.—The fore part of the week was fine, the cloudiness gradually increased. On Wednesday a light rain occurred.

Hermiston, Umatilla county, C. W. Kellogg.—Clear skies prevailed during the fore part of the week, but the latter part was cloudy. Light rains occurred on Wednesday and Thursday.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, H. F. Johnson.—The days were warm and the temperatures during the nights were well above freezing. The first rain for the month fell on Wednesday, which was followed by a heavy shower on Thursday.

Weston, Umatilla county, Maud M. Baker.—Mild days, with chilly nights, have prevailed, though for the first two days the weather was like early summer. The skies have been cloudy part of the time, but there was little rain.
