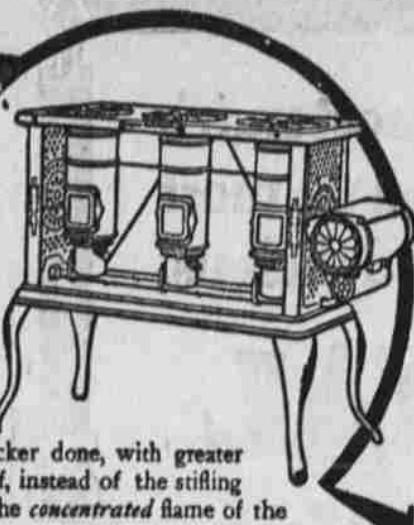

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SWEETHEART MURDERER'S BRAIN NORMAL

Philadelphia, April 23.—Physicians, scientists and savants from nearly all the important universities and large cities of the country will take part in a discussion of important topics during the general meeting of the American Philosophical association, which was opened here today will extend through tomorrow and Saturday.

One of the most important addresses of the meeting, it is expected will be that of Dr. E. A. Spitzka, who has chosen for his subject, "Observations Regarding the Inflection of the Death Penalty by Electricity."

Dr. Spitzka is a member of the faculty of Jefferson Medical college, an authority on anthropometry, and on mental processes and diseases, and the man who, within 15 minutes after Chester Gillette went to his death in the electric chair at Auburn, N. Y., had removed and made a scientific examination of the brain of the young man executed for the drowning of his sweetheart, Grace, or "Billy" Brown, in Big Moose lake, July 11, 1906.

"It was a thoroughly successful execution," said Dr. Spitzka. "Only one contact was necessary, and I was enabled to remove and examine the brain between 10 minutes and a quarter of an hour after the condemned man had been pronounced dead."

"So far as the resulting examination went, I can safely say that Gillette's brain was thoroughly normal. I used the prison scales in weighing it, and its weight was 57½ ounces avoirdupois, which is rather heavy and may be said to place the brain among the largest sort. It was, at any rate, that of a typical, healthy American lad of his age."

Dr. Spitzka has made charts and drawings of Gillette's brain and skull, which will be exhibited, "you see that it was a fairly good-sized head. The circumference of the head was 59.1 centimeters. From ear to ear, meas-

uring over the crown of the head, the distance was 36 centimeters, and the space between the pupils of the eyes 6.2.

"Neither of these measurements, or of the others which I made, point toward abnormality. Therefore, as death by electricity does not affect the brain tissues or structure for immediate examination, my personal belief that Chester Gillette was a quite sane and healthy young man."

Planting 125,000 Fir Trees.

Supervisor Peter Wrensted of the Pocatello and Portneuf national forest, yesterday received from the government planting station at Halsey, Neb., 125,000 Douglas fir slips for reforestation in the government's reforestation nursery on Mink creek, 12 miles above Pocatello, says the Pocatello Tribune. Supervisor Wrensted left this afternoon for the station, taking with him 13 men, recruiting from the Idle Short Line shops, who will be employed in planting the slips in the enlarged nursery.

Wife Murderer to Hang.

Sparta, Ga., April 23.—Porter Cooper, a negro who killed his wife last month and was given an immediate trial, convicted and sentenced to death, will be hanged tomorrow. Cooper, after crushing his wife's skull with an ax, dismembered the body, severed the head and lower limbs from the trunk. He is said to have placed the fragments in crocus sacks, buried and fired his house to conceal the evidence. In the court room he made a full confession.

Girls Play Shakespeare.

New York, April 23.—Fair students of Bernard college will appear tomorrow in a "magnificent production" of Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew." There will be four performances of the play on the afternoons and evenings of tomorrow and Saturday. All of the parts will be played by girls, and the management declares that the dramatic talent at its disposal will make the professionals sit up and take notice.

FULTON WILL SUPPORT CAKE

NO DIVIDED REPUBLICAN VOTE ON SENATOR.

Before Leaving for Washington Senator Fulton Wrote a Letter to H. M. Cake Assuring Him of His Hearty Support—Senator Fulton's Manly Stand in the Matter Assures Mr. Cake's Election.

That there will be complete harmony and co-operation among the republicans of Oregon in the coming contest over the United States senatorship is shown by the fact that Senator Fulton has given H. M. Cake assurances of his hearty support and influence in the campaign.

It had been declared by many that Senator Fulton's friends would be hostile to Mr. Cake and that perhaps there would be a divided party vote on the senatorship, but Senator Fulton's manly and courageous declaration that he will support Mr. Cake, dispels any fears that the republican vote will be divided and assures the election of Mr. Cake on June 1.

The Oregon Daily Journal says on the subject:

Senator Fulton has pledged his aid and assistance to H. M. Cake in his campaign for election and has given him assurances of friendship and support. Previous to leaving for Washington, Senator Fulton wrote a letter to Mr. Cake which was in part as follows:

"Portland, April 20.—My Dear Mr. Cake:—I am leaving for the east in the morning, and before going wish to extend to you my congratulations on your nomination and my assurance of all the support I can give you. Trusting and believing that you will be elected, I am sincerely yours,

"C. W. FULTON."

Mr. Cake is now arranging his plans for a tour of the state in behalf of his candidacy. No definite itinerary or plan of action has been prepared out, however, though all plans will be completed, it is thought, by the end of the week. W. M. Cake returned this morning from a trip to eastern Oregon, and will arrange the future campaign plans after a conference with his brother, H. M. Cake.

The final arrangements have been delayed, for one thing, until after the organization of the city and county central committee here, which is expected to have charge of the general republican campaign in Multnomah county. The chairman of this committee, when he is elected, will be consulted in mapping out the movements of Mr. Cake.

It is Mr. Cake's intention, however, to make a complete tour of the state, speaking in all of the principal towns along his route. This tour will perhaps take him three weeks. It is presumed that he will close his campaign in Portland just prior to the general election in June.

MORE SCHOOLS ACCEPT.

Whitman's List of Visitors Continues to Grow.

Whitman College, Walla Walla, April 24.—Several more high schools have accepted the invitation of Whitman college to the tri-state interscholastic track meet and declamation contest in Walla Walla on April 30 and May 1. The list now numbers 21 high schools and includes all the large schools of the inland empire except Colfax, which was the only one to decline Whitman's invitation to enter the meet.

The following are the 21 high schools which have promised to send representatives: Pomeroy, Spokane, Prosser, Ritzville, North Yakima, Ellensburg, Roslyn, Garfield, Oakesdale, Palouse, Lewiston, La Grande, Boise, Baker City, Island City, Pendleton, The Dalles, Walla Walla, Waitsburg, Prineville, Fossil. Such a list of schools assures a splendid meet, and a much larger one than that of last year.

Six representatives from each school will have their entire railroad expenses paid by the college and entertainment provided during their stay in Walla Walla. The preparatory department of the college will not be allowed to compete, but its students

will devote themselves to entertaining the guests of the college. The meet has the hearty backing of the people of Walla Walla and the whole city will suspend business on the day of the finals. The railroads have granted an open rate to all of one and one-third fare for the round trip. This means that in addition to the 156 athletes who come there will be several hundred of their supporters.

Whitman has an ideal track for the meet, and it has never been in such good condition as it will be for this meet. The distance races will be run on the quarter-mile oval, and the dashes and hurdles on the 220-yard straight away, capable of accommodating 10 runners abreast. The capacity of the bleachers and grandstand is more than 2000.

SHOOTS SELF-CLEANING GUN

Henry Burchett Accidentally Shoots Self Through the Heart.

With a bullet through his heart, the body of Henry Burchett was found at his home at 1019 Boone avenue last Saturday, his 18-year-old son making the shocking discovery several hours after death had claimed

the victim, says the Spokane Chronicle.

No one heard the shot, and it is not known just when it was fired, but from the condition of the body it is believed he was killed about 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

That death was accidental is the opinion of those who have investigated the case. Burchett evidently was clearing a 25-caliber single shot Stevens rifle, which was loaded. All of the apparatus for cleaning the gun was in the kitchen where the body was found. Burchett also had gotten out his fishing tackle to prepare for a short trip he was planning to take. On finding the body Coroner Witter and the police were notified and investigated the case, accidental death being the cause, in the opinion of Coroner Witter and Detective Herndon.

The deceased was 47 years old and survived by a son, aged 18, and a daughter, aged 12. His wife died several years ago. He is a brother of Franklin R. and William J. Burchett, grocers, whose place of business is at 521 Monroe street. The deceased had head charge of the Burchett estate for a number of years. He was a member of the Elks and the Modern Woodmen of America. His remains have been taken to Turnbull's undertaking parlors.
