LYNCH LAW RULES IN CAMP SKIDDOO.

Rhyolite, Nev., April 23.—A mob at Skiddoo, a Nevada mining camp, lynched Joe Simpson last night. He is a gambler who shot and killed James Arnold, a butcher, Sunday.

Simpson was being held a prisoner in a vacant building, guarded by a deputy sheriff and guard. The mob swooped down early last night, secured the prisoner and within 10 minutes the prisoner's body was hanging to a telephone pole.

Simpson was a hard character. Sunday he went on a rampage and after attacking Cashier Dobbs of the Southern California bank, went to Arnold's shop and in a quarrel killed him.

OPEN CEMENT MINES.

Flourishing Industry Started on the North Bank.

Development work has been started on the cement mines near Cliffs, says an item from the north bank. A force of men with powder, picks and shovels teams and other equipment is on the ground. Three large holes will be dug and numerous ditches plowed and other excavations made to reach the cement formation. At this time the developments indicate that the cement deposits cover a large area, and that it is in the form of a blanket ledge about eight feet thick, and from outcroppings at the surface to 12 feet under the soil. Dynamite has to be used in removing the cement that lies near the surface, but where it is deep under the soil it is easily removed with pick and shovel.

It was reported that the company having the option on the lands under which the principal deposits are found is from Seattle, but this is not confirmed by the workmen now on the ground, as they claim it is Portland capital, but refuse to say who the principals are. Since it has become known that the peculiar formation has been carefully analyzed and thoroughly tested, great hopes are entertained that the discovery will prove a valuable addition to the resources in and around Cliffs.

Some of the old settlers of the Columbia river valley have known of this cement formation for more than 20 years, but did not understand its value, although they remember that some of it was dug out, treated, then hauled to Goldendale, a distance of about 25 miles, and there used in the first large brick building erected in that town, which is still standing in perfect condition.

NO SUNDAY THEATERS.

Pocahontas Manager Arrested for Violating Sunday Law.

Hoping that the Sunday closing law of the state, so far as Pocahontas is concerned, might be merely a sort of ornament on the statute books, the managers of the New Orpheum theater, in the Fair store building, opened the playhouse last Sunday night and sold tickets, says the Pocahontas Tribune. Before the first performance was half way completed, the manager was arrested. The matter is in the hands of the acting attorney and it is not impossible that some sort of a formal complaint will be made against the theater man before many days.

The attention of the police last Sunday evening was directed to the fact that people were buying tickets at the window of the theater and entering the green portals. An investigation revealed the fact that a performance was being given. The arrest of the manager followed.
