

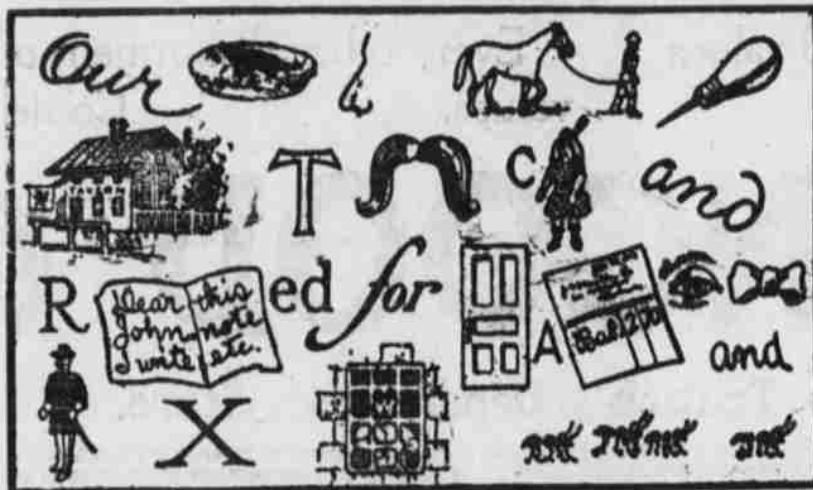

NEWS OF MILTON ATHENA BREVITIES

WELL KNOWN COUPLE UNITED IN MARRIAGE.

Strawberries Looking Fine and Will Soon Be Ready for Market—Walla Walla Doctor Files Suit for Collection of Account—Fruitgrowers Expect Another First-Class Fruit Season.

Milton, April 23.—A very pretty wedding took place at the M. E. church here Monday, when Miss Shumway was united in marriage to William Coghill. The bride is a popular young lady here, having lived here for several years. The groom resides between here and Weston, and the ceremony was performed by a Weston pastor, Rev. Walter Payne. The couple will reside at the old Mumford place in North Milton.

Strawberries the size of small marbles are found in the patches along the Walla Walla river, and it is thought that it will be only a few weeks before there will be berries ready for the market. Prospects are for a large crop this year, and prices promise to be good.

Dr. J. F. Cropp of Walla Walla, has filed action in Justice Miller's court against J. S. Warren to collect the sum of \$155 alleged to be due for professional services in the family. A writ of attachment was issued and the defendant's property has been attached.

ELECTRIC LINE WILL BUILD TO PENDLETON.

Promoters Making Inquiries as to Best Route—Revival Meetings Open at M. E. Church—Election Pleases Athena Voters—Well Known Farmer Is Seriously Ill—Wheat Looks Excellent.

Athens, April 23.—The people of this section fully expect that the promoters of the electric line now being operated between Walla Walla and Milton, and who have secured a franchise to run through Weston will make every effort to build the line on through the Athena country and to Pendleton as soon as possible. The promoters have been making inquiries as to the best route to take to Pendleton, and it is understood that they will also make an effort to come in touch with all wheat shipping points en route. It is reported that Athena will be asked for a franchise through the town in a very short time.

Last night the big revival meeting which has been talked of for some time opened at the Methodist church, under the supervision of Evangelist Carradine of St. Louis. The meeting last night was largely attended. Rev. Carradine proved to be an interesting speaker, and much good promises to result from the meetings.
