"POOR WHITES" TO BE EDUCATED

LEADING EDUCATIONAL LIGHTS OF THE SOUTH

Prominent Gathering for Discussion of One of Dixie Land's Greatest Problems—Pure and Vigorous Stock Have Never Taken a Start Because Never Given Any Opportunities.

Memphis, Tenn., April 22.—Distinguished educators, university presidents, state superintendents, state men, editors, bishops, clergymen and club women, the leading intellectual lights of the New South, together with a considerable sprinkling of famous visitors from other sections of the country, are the guests of Memphis today and will attend the eleventh meeting of the Conference of Education in the South.

The opening session this evening will be addressed by Governor M. R. Patterson, who will welcome the visitors to Tennessee. Robert C. Ogden, the venerable New York philanthropist who is the present president of the conference, will also speak. The sessions will last through tomorrow and Friday and will be addressed by the Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, and scores of other prominent men who have interested themselves in the development of the schools and educational institutions in Dixie.

The Association of State Superintendents of Education in the South will hold its convention in connection with the conference, as usual, and nearly all the members from Virginia to Texas are here. State meetings will be held by delegates from the various southern states tomorrow. Headquarters for the conference have been established by the Memphis Business Men's club, where all the delegates were given a hearty welcome.

The object of the conference is to educate and uplift the "poor whites" of the south and in this effort it has already been highly successful. In regard to the work of the body, Secretary Edgar Gardner Murphy says: "The illiterate mass of our white population are a pure and vigorous stock. They are not the decadent, but the unstarred. Their promise is illimitable. To tell of their needs was no pleasant enterprise. Even now an occasional reactionary spirit is heard to declare that because he loves and esteems them, and because they are better than many of the illiterate population of other sections, the movement that reveals their ignorance and insists upon their education is to be resisted."

"The answer of the south, as a whole, is that because she loves and esteems them—their children are entitled to the broadest opportunities and the best advantages which life may offer; that any movement which reveals their ignorance in order to bring them knowledge, which would increase their knowledge not upon the ground of their incapacity, but upon the ground of their value to society, which asserts their right to their best, is a movement to be commended and re-enforced."

BIG RACE IS ON.

Briarcliff Trophy for Stock Cars to Be Contested For.

New York, April 23.—Interest in the Briarcliff trophy race for stock cars, which will be run tomorrow in Westchester county, is now at fever heat and it is certain that the contest will be the greatest road event in the last two years, or since the running of the last contest for the Vanderbilt cup.

Motoring enthusiasts from all over the country, including a considerable contingent from the Pacific coast and from Canada, are in the city and will be among the enthusiastic throngs that will fill the big grand stand and line the entire course.

The work of oiling, banking and preparing the roads, erecting signs and telephone stations and preparing for a proper policing of the course has been completed, and all is in readiness for the start at 4:30 o'clock tomorrow.

Beginning at 11 o'clock tonight, trains will be run to the course every 15 minutes, and it is believed that any uncomfortable congestion will thus be averted.

The total list of 21 entrants will undoubtedly be at the starting tape, and from the time when the last of the 22 stock cars starts upon its 30 mile circuit there will not be a dull moment. The distance of the contest is to be three hundred miles. It will not be completed until noon or later. The Briarcliff trophy stock car contest is the first road race with anything like a big field to be contested in America, although it would seem that we are to have more of these in the future.

All drivers who are to compete are now tuning up their cars on the course. The universal opinion of the contestants is that the course will be a difficult one to drive and that it will require the most careful handling.

On the comparatively straight stretches (there are no real straight-aways) fairly good time can be made, but owing to the many turns and curves it is believed that the average speed for the race will not be more than 40 miles an hour. But to make this average will require hair-raising chances and the most careful manipulation of the steering wheel.
