REVISED PLANS ARE ADOPTED

CEMETERY FUND MUST BE COLLECTED AT ONCE

Council Will Not Let Contract Till Subscriptions Are Paid In—Fiscel Against Henry Fisch Remitted—Howard Is Chosen As City Hall Supervising Architect—Sidewalk Matter Disposed Of.

Revised plans for the cemetery watering system were adopted by the council last night and as soon as the money subscribed for improving the burial ground can be collected a contract will be let.

The new plans, which were up for the first time in detail last night, call for the connection of the cemetery watering system with the city main at the end of Webb street. It is estimated that to install the system will cost slightly over \$6000.

The city will not let the contract for the work until sufficient money has been subscribed and collected to meet the expense.

Fisch Fine Remitted.
By going before the council last night Henry Fisch, driver for the Golden Rule hotel, succeeded in having his \$25 fine remitted. Fisch had been fined that amount for dumping manure upon the Matlock tract near the ball park. REPUBLICANS IN LINE FOR WORK

CENTRAL COMMITTEE ELECTS ITS OFFICERS

Asa B. Thompson to Lead Hosts of G. O. P. for Two Years—Ben Burroughs Is Secretary, Major Moorhouse, Member of State Committee and Tom Thompson Is Congressional Committeeman.

At a meeting of the new republican county central committee held here last evening officers were elected and May 7 set as a date for another meeting, at which delegates to the state convention will be selected.

Asa B. Thompson was elected as chairman for the next two years, taking the place of Frank Curli, for whom a vote of thanks was passed by the committee. Ben Burroughs was elected secretary of the committee, while Major Lee Moorhouse was elected a member of the state central committee and Tom Thompson as a member of the congressional committee.

Eight delegates are to be sent from Umatilla county to the state convention and they will be chosen May 7.

TO ATTEND PRESBYTERY.

Seven Umatilla County Delegates Left for Moro This Morning.

Seven Umatilla county delegates left on the O. R. & N. local this morning for the meeting of Pendleton presbytery, which will be held in Moro, Sherman county, this week. Those in the party were the following ministers: Rev. W. L. Van Nuys of this city, Rev. B. F. Harper of Milton, Rev. S. J. Campbell of Free-water, Rev. J. M. Cornelson and Rev. E. J. About 20 delegates from the district will be present at the meeting of the presbytery and considerable important business will be transacted. The meeting of the presbytery was held last year at the Tutuilla Indian church on the Umatilla reservation.

N. P. TRAIN HAS SLIGHT WRECK

PASSENGERS BROUGHT IN ON A HAND CAR

Tender Trucks Leave the Rails and Demolish the Track for Hundred Feet—Accident Happens Near Fulton Station Just North of Town—No One Is Injured—Train Waits for Help.

While the southbound Northern Pacific branch line train was a short distance this side of Fulton this afternoon, the tender trucks left the track and the train is now stalled there while waiting for a wrecking train. A portion of the passengers were brought to this city on a hand car arriving about 2:30.

After leaving the track the tender trucks bumped along the track for a hundred feet or more and demolished the track. It is said new ties will have to be placed for the entire distance.

When the trucks left the track the engine was reversed and the train brought to a standstill without harm and no one was injured by the wreck. Conductor Bertholet walked to a neighboring farm house and phoned the news to Agent Walter Adams.

ALFALFA HELPS THE SOIL.

Long Roots Carry Humus Deep Down and Enrich the Land.

"At the Kansas station alfalfa roots have been traced to a depth of over nine feet, while at the Colorado experiment station Dr. W. P. Headen has washed out the roots of an old alfalfa plant to the depth of nearly 12 feet, says an alfalfa leaflet. Various reports have been made, without good authority, of finding alfalfa roots at even greater depths. It is without doubt one of the deepest rooting plants grown on the farm.

"Alfalfa will do more for western agriculture in the next 50 years than all the other crops which farmers may be able to grow in this region. The soil of western Kansas and of much of the western plains is usually rich in the mineral elements of plant food, but, as stated before, it is often lacking in humus, which becomes especially noticeable if the land has been farmed continuously to wheat for a few years.

By growing alfalfa it is possible to increase the supply of humus in the soil, and the roots of the plants penetrate deep into the subsoil disintegrate and deepen the soil, and altogether greatly improve its texture, giving it greater capacity to absorb and hold water. The beneficial effect on the soil of growing alfalfa is only incidental to the rapid introduction of the crop throughout the west.

The great value of the crop as a money maker is the main factor which is introducing it into the agriculture of the central west. Where alfalfa can be successfully marketed or fed, no other crop grown in the west will yield so great a net profit per acre in a series of years.

LONG CONTEST CASE.

Land Contest Has Lasted Three Days in Local Land Office.

One of the longest drawn out land contest cases that has been held in the local land office for some time, is now about to be completed, says the La Grande Observer. It started three days ago and has been under constant action until this afternoon.

The parties interested are Pilot Rock people, Joseph Shields is the contestant, and Thomas D. Wough the contestee. Attorney J. T. Williamson is appearing for the former and Colonel James H. Haley of Pendleton, for the latter. The land in contention is located about two miles from Pilot Rock. Both parties hope to complete their testimony tonight.

Kemmerer Coal Man Here.

T. J. O'Brien, a coal dealer of Kemmerer, Wyo., was in the city last evening conferring with W. C. Minnis, who handles their coal in this city. Mr. O'Brien says it will be possible to get better coal with much less difficulty this year than ever before, and Mr. Minnis will handle the choice output of the Kemmerer mines in this city.

ROOSEVELT'S ENTERTAIN.

Daughters of Revolution Will Be Received at the White House.

Washington, April 23.—It is announced that President and Mrs. Roosevelt will give a reception at the White House early tomorrow afternoon to the distinguished women in attendance at the continental congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

This morning's session was devoted to an election for 10 vice presidents general and an editor and business manager of the American Monthly Magazine, the official organ of the society. The result of the election will not be announced until this evening, when a brief business session will be held, followed by a concert by the United States marine band.

Among the candidates presented by the various state organizations for vice presidents general and who were voted on this morning, are Mrs. Ira H. Evans of Texas, Mrs. Truman H. Newberry of Michigan, Mrs. Theodore C. Bates of Massachusetts, Mrs. Drayton W. Bushnell of Iowa, Mrs. Egbert Jones of Mississippi, Mrs. Ira Yale Sage of Georgia, Mrs. William E. Stanley of Kansas, Mrs. James M. Fowler of Indiana, Mrs. Erastus Gaylord Putnam of New Jersey, Mrs. Martha B. C. Clarke of New Hampshire, Mrs. William A. Smoot of Virginia and Mrs. Sallie Marshall Hardy of Kentucky. Ten vice presidents general are elected each year, to serve two years.

Hen Worth \$1000 a Pound.

Booneville, Mo., April 23.—Booneville has a hen for which its owner has refused a fortune, which has been three times around the world, costs \$1500 a year to maintain and has a private valet of her own.
