BASEBALL AND ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES

New York, April 24.—Trouble in the form of a powerful new outlaw organization, will loom large on the baseball horizon tomorrow, when the new Union league opens its championship season. The new league will furnish opposition to the National league in Brooklyn, to the American league in Washington and to both of the major leagues in Philadelphia. The Eastern league will find the outlaws a competitor in Baltimore.

The Union league opening tomorrow will find Philadelphia at Brooklyn, Baltimore at Elizabeth, Washington at Reading and Paterson at Wilmington. The season will extend to September 19, giving practically five months of playing. Some fast players have been signed by the various clubs and there is every prospect that the outlaws will draw big crowds to their games and may seriously affect the attendance of other leagues in some cities. Overtures have already been made to some of the best players in the big league and, with a successful season for the new organization, there may be serious defections in the ranks of the major league players within a year or two.

If the Union League manages to live through the coming season it is said that the promoters will invade New York with a club in the Bronx and will also put a club in either Providence or some other New England city. An attempt will also be made to induce many of the major league players to jump the reserve rule next fall, which means that a red hot baseball war will result. Richmond and Norfolk. It is said, have also been considered for next year, and if clubs should be placed in these cities, it would probably result in the disruption of the Virginia league.

Athletic stars of at least a score of schools will compete for the trophies and medals offered by the university in the various events.

Golf at Yale.

New Haven, Conn., April 24.—Six team matches have been arranged for the Yale golfers, the first to take place tomorrow with the Hartford Golf club. The following Saturday will find the wearers of the blue at the Wee Burn Golf club. A match with the New Haven Country club over the latter's course is on for May 9 and on May 16 the collegians will try their luck at the Nassau Country club. Their only New Jersey schedule appearance is at the Morris Country Golf club May 23. The last match listed is with the Meridian Golf club on June 3. It will be seen by this that all the matches are away from home.

As all but two members of last year's championship team are available at present, the university golfers are able to enter upon their spring season with bright prospects. The two men who are unable to play because of baseball and track work are C. E. Van Vleck, jr., '09, and Robert Abbott, '08. The latter, who won the intercollegiate championship in 1905, is also prominent as a weight thrower, while VanVleck is rated as one of the best on the ball team.

Texas Athletic Meet.

Dallas, Texas, April 24.—One of the best track and field meets ever held in the southwest will be that of the Central Texas Athletic association scheduled for this city tomorrow. The association is the holder of one amateur world's record, that of the shot put, and it is possible that one or more others will be broken at tomorrow's meet. Fourteen events are included in the program and the pick of the amateur scholastic talent of Texas will be seen in action.

ROOT TALKS LAW.

Secretary of State Is Principal Speaker at International Meeting.
 Washington, April 24.—Secretary of State Root delivered the principal address at the opening session today of the second annual meeting of the

American Society of International Law. His subject was "The Sanctions of International Law." Secretary Root is president of the society. The meeting is being held at the New Willard Hotel and will be continued this afternoon and evening and tomorrow, closing with a banquet tomorrow night.
 Among the topics for general discussion at the meeting will be the advisability of making violations of treaties a federal offense, arbitration at the second Hague peace conference, the codification of international law and the organization, jurisdiction and procedure of an international prize court.

BUBONIC PLAGUE SCARES VENEZUELA

PEOPLE ARE SAID TO
 BE IN A PITIABLE PLIGHT

Physician Who Diagnosed the Disease and Was Thrown Into Jail Has Been Released—Disease Spreading With Alarming Rapidity—News Received at Washington.

Caracas, Venezuela, Saturday, April 24.—The prevalence and continuance of a suspicious epidemic at La Guaira, which has caused a number of deaths, has decided some steamship companies not to admit passengers from that port, while others have resolved not to have their vessels call there at all.

This malady has been described as pernicious fever. Dr. Peraza, a local physician, diagnosed the disease some months ago as bubonic plague. For this he was at once thrown into jail. Today, however, he was liberated.

Washington, April 24.—An alarming spread of what is declared to be bubonic plague continues to be reported unofficially from La Guaira and other places in Venezuela. Whole families in La Guaira are said to have been stricken and many deaths have resulted from the disease. Despite the efforts of the government to minimize the situation, a reign of terror has seized the inhabitants. It is also stated that doctors and government agents are moving the stricken to crowded hospitals in the middle of the night to conceal as far as possible the exact situation from the inhabitants.

Reports received here positively assert that the disease is rapidly gaining headway.

Americans recently from Venezuela describe the condition of the inhabitants of that country as pathetic. Fish is said to be a staple diet, and owing to the climate it is most difficult to keep this one article of diet in condition for consumption for any length of time.

ROYAL VISIT TO SWEDEN.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra to Be Given Great Reception.

Stockholm, April 24.—Preparations of elaborate character are being made for the reception of King Edward and queen Alexandra on their coming visit to Scandinavia. Their majesties are expected to cross from Copenhagen by ferry and travel to this city tomorrow night, and the public welcome to Stockholm will be given Monday.

King Gustaf has ordered to be prepared for the visitors at the royal castle the special apartments, commanding attractive views and providing the acme of Swedish luxury and comfort. The king and queen will be received in state and given a splendid round of entertainments, which will be participated in by the social leaders of the kingdom. The swedes will unite with the Danes and Norwegians in welcoming the British king and queen in the north. Their coming is regarded as a fresh testimonial of British interest in the safety and happiness of the Scandinavian peoples.
