

HON. S. B. HERMAN IS WELL AGAIN

LA GRANDE DOES GENUINE BOOSTING

The La Grande Star says of the booster meeting held at La Grande Wednesday night, at which Tom Richardson spoke and in which the sum of \$3300 was raised for advertising purposes:

The movement for a bigger and more progressive La Grande was fairly launched at the meeting held at the Commercial club rooms yesterday evening. The program as heretofore announced was carried out practically without change. President Campbell of the state university, spoke briefly, reciting the good work that had been done in the way of building up Eugene. Mr. Campbell was followed by the L. D. S. quartette which received the usual encore.

Judge T. H. Crawford introduced Tom Richardson, who went straight to work on the subject in hand and that was the enthusing of the audience with the benefits and necessity of advertising as a means of building up the community. He said the theme must become a matter of religious conviction with every resident of the town so that everyone from the children on up would become enthused with the fact that they were residents of La Grande.

It was also necessary to do this thing in the right kind of a way, and that money would be required. The idea that any good can be accomplished on a nominal monthly payment of dues is absurd. To pretend such a thing was only a subterfuge and an excuse. At the conclusion of his remarks he called for subscriptions to be made in monthly payments for the period of a year. At the meeting last night about \$3500 was thus pledged. The largest subscriptions are: La Grande National bank, \$50 per month; George Stoddard, \$25 per month; J. W. Schiber, \$25 per month; Amalgamated Sugar company, \$25 per month, with the privilege of raising the amount to \$50.

A half dozen or more subscriptions of \$10 per month followed, and when a large number at \$5. A committee of four was appointed to continue the work of securing subscriptions today until the sum of \$6000 for the year is raised. The committee appointed includes Mac Wood, F. L. Meyers, J. W. Schiber and George Stoddard. In addition to the amount of about \$3500 subscribed last night, there are 199 members in the new commercial club who will pay \$1 per month each. The meeting to perfect the organization of the new commercial body will be held in the Presbyterian church Friday night, on account of the fact that the Commercial club room is already engaged for that evening.

A committee of 10 was appointed on permanent organization and by-laws. They are: John Collier, A. S. Geddes, F. L. Meyers, J. W. Schiber, S. R. Haworth, Turner Oliver, F. Kilpatrick, F. G. Taylor, George Stoddard and Mac Wood. The meeting on Friday evening is to convene at 7:30 o'clock.

ROSS TO STAND TRIAL.

Wrecker of Portland Bank Held to be Criminally Responsible. A Salem dispatch says of the trial of J. Thorburn Ross for the failure of the Title Guarantee and Trust company bank:

Judge Martin L. Pipes, for the state, scored a splendid victory in the first legal battle of the Ross trial this morning, when Judge Burnett held that the officers of a bank are liable for the wrong doings of the corporation.

The defense had contended in a comprehensive argument extended over four hours that a bank as an institution, and not the officials of the bank, is liable.

"This is not a case between the Title Guarantee & Trust company and the defendants, but it is a case between the state of Oregon and the defendants. A corporation cannot be indicted, and therefore those who are the moving spirit of the corporation are held liable, for they have aided and abetted in a criminal act." That was the conclusion arrived at by Judge Burnett, after hearing the argument of counsel, which began at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning and lasted until 5 o'clock last evening.

PRESIDENT RECEIVES.

Roosevelt Talks to the Daughters of The American Revolution.

Washington, April 24.—President Roosevelt received the delegates to the congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution at the White House this afternoon and delivered a brief address, in which he complimented his guests on the patriotic purpose of their organization.

The morning session was devoted to business, and this evening the congress, as the guests of the Sons of the American Revolution of the District of Columbia, will attend a patriotic celebration in the New York Avenue Presbyterian church. Tomorrow will be devoted to new and unfinished business and at noon the seventeenth continental congress will adjourn for the year.

LARGE FUND APPORTIONED

OREGON SCHOOLS TO
RECEIVE \$119,100.

Largest School Fund Distribution Ever Made in the State—Total for the Year Will Be Over \$250,000—Umatilla County Receives \$5000.

The Salem Statesman says of the large school fund apportionment being made at this time:

Owing to the fact that there is an unusually large amount of money on hand in the state treasury it has been decided to advance the various counties of the state a substantial advance on the sums due the counties from the common school fund. Their payments are due in August and the remainder of the moneys due will be paid at that time.

Deputy State Treasurer Perkins states that the income from the school fund will be greater this year than at any time in the history of the state. Usually the total has been about \$250,000, but this year it is expected to be considerably more. The amount apportioned at this time, it will be seen by the following, is more than \$119,100.00:
