Prominent Man Dies.

Portland, April 24.—Charles Amos Cogswell, president of the Warner Valley Livestock company of southern Oregon and northern California, and a member of the city executive board, died suddenly on an interurban car as he was entering the city today from his home at Milwaukie. Heart trouble was the immediate cause of his death.

The deceased was one of the best known financiers in Oregon.

Resurrection a Fairy Tale.

Minneapolis, April 24.—Charged with teaching that the story of the resurrection of Christ is a fairy tale, Rev. Robert Hammond Cotton, an Episcopalian minister for 40 years, who has built three churches in this state, was refused a license to preach today by Bishop S. C. Edsall. After the refusal Cotton declared the church a great trust which bars all with advanced ideas on religion.

Criminal Business Ended.

With the conclusion of the Deal trial in the circuit court yesterday the criminal work was completed for the time being and all but a few jurors were discharged by Judge Bean. These will be retained on the list so that further trials may be held between now and the September term, should such be necessary.

Big Produce Exchange Falls.

New York, April 24.—The failure of the T. A. McIntyre Produce Exchange is announced this morning in a notice of suspension. The company was one of the biggest of its kind in the country. It dealt largely in stock, cotton and grain. Arthur Back of Syracuse, N. Y., was appointed assignee.

Box Car Thief to Pen.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor left at noon today for Salem with R. J. Miller, sentenced to serve two and a half years for robbing a box car at Umatilla. F. J. Burns, Miller's pal, secured his freedom by turning state's evidence.

Action Sues F. W. Boynton.

Suit has been started by Al Acton to collect the sum of \$183.50 alleged to be due him from F. W. Boynton upon a note given on June 28, 1907. The suit was filed by Raley, Richards & Raley.

Killed by Coin Swallowed 60 Years Ago.

Laporte, Ind., April 17.—A large copper coin, swallowed 60 years ago today caused the death of James Huckins, 67 years old. The coin became encased in the lining of the stomach at the time it was swallowed and remained there until recently when an abscess formed and acids in the stomach began to dissolve the coin. Poisoning ensued, causing death.
