MANY IMPROVEMENTS UNDER WAY THIS SPRING

New Hall Will be Opened With Big Dance Tonight—Company Is Building Fine Ferry Boat for Umatilla—New Lands Being Cultivated—Will Take in Excursion to Hermiston—Crops Look Good.

Umatilla, April 24.—Much activity is being shown in and about Umatilla this spring. There is considerable building going on, and a number of new people are coming in.

Mrs. E. C. Bergh, who has been quite ill, is reported as being considerably improved.

The new hall has been completed, and it will be opened by a big dance tonight, which will be given by the Redmen. It will be attended by a number from outside points, among them being people from Echo and Hermiston.

John Switzer & company are having a large ferry boat built for use on the Umatilla. It will be 15x68 in size, and it will be a beauty.

Many improvements are being made about here this spring in the way of improving lands, settling out fruit, potatoes, etc. This promises to be a good crop year in this vicinity. Much new land is being improved and things look bright for the future of Umatilla as well as all parts of the west end of the county.

Umatilla people expect to turn out to the excursion which will be given to Hermiston in a short time.

BASEBALL AT POCATELLO.

Twelve-Team League Is Being Organized in Southern Idaho.

Manager A. J. Pierce of the Pocatello baseball team, is meeting with much encouragement in his efforts to organize a ten or twelve team league in southeastern Idaho to take in Montpelier, Soda Springs, McCammon, Preston, Blackfoot, Idaho Falls, Rexburg, Sugar City, St. Anthony, Marysville, American Falls and Twin Falls, says the Pocatello Tribune.

In response to numerous letters written by Manager Pierce to fans in the towns named, offers of assistance were made, and it now begins to look as if the proposed league will be formed. Manager Pierce is firmly convinced that such a league would be a success from not only a financial but sporting point of view. To the Tribune he said this morning:

"With 10 or 12 teams in the league the element of uncertainty would always be present. Playing only Sunday ball, it would require almost the entire season for any one team to get around to play another team a second time. Therefore, if it so happens that Pocatello, for instance, has the strongest team in the league, that would by no means mean she would win the pennant, for some slightly weaker team might win enough games from still weaker teams to overcome Pocatello's handicap."
