CONGRESSMAN IS INTERESTED

HOBSON ASKS ABOUT THE IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Will Make Use of Knowledge Gained When It Comes to Voting on Important Measures—Smiles When Questioned Regarding Secret Mission—Royally Entertained While Here.

There are things in which Congressman Hobson are interested side from naval affairs. Though the chief reason for his present tour of the west is to rouse a public sentiment in favor of a greater navy, he is also interested in the industrial development of the northwest and he never loses an opportunity to gather information.

While here last night he made many inquiries regarding the irrigation projects of the northwest and was especially interested in the work being done by the government.

"I am not upon the irrigation committee, but I have a vote in congress and the knowledge may some day be of use to me," said he in explanation of his inquiries.

When asked as to the secret mission upon which press reports say he is bound for San Francisco, Hobson smiled and said he had not been informed. However, it is evident that his present lecturing campaign is not without a purpose and there are many who believe that he is now in the west partly at the instance of the president.

While away from congress Hobson is "paired" so that his vote is not lost should it be needed upon any important issue.

Favors Army Bill.
While more directly interested in the navy, Captain Hobson is also a strong believer in the national guard for he declares that in the event of

war the safety of the country would rest upon the citizen soldiery and that with the regulars the national guardsmen would constitute the first line of defense.

When told of the question that is now up regarding the army appropriation in this state he expressed a desire that the bill be sustained.

That the bill providing for joint encampments and maneuvers between regulars and guardsmen will pass congress is believed by the congressman. The bill is now in conference and the status of the measure is such that it is practically assured of favorable action. When the measure was first up in the house it lost by a majority of one. At the time the vote upon the bill came unexpectedly and Hobson and two southern colleagues, all favorable to the bill, were away without being paired.

Should the encampment bill be passed all the Oregon national guard with the guards of three or four other western states, will camp at American lake and hold joint maneuvers with the regulars.

Hobson Was Entertained.
While in this city Captain Hobson was given little opportunity to rest, and he was shown the courtesies due one of his standing. In the afternoon yesterday he addressed the high school students and told of his experience in sinking the Merrimac in Santiago harbor.

At dinner last night Captain Hobson and President P. L. Campbell were entertained at the Bachelors' club and after the lecture last night a splendid banquet was given in honor of the two men by the members of the Alpha Psi fraternity of the high school.

The banquet was at the St. George restaurant and was attended by all the local fraternity boys. Dan P. Smythe served as toastmaster and addresses were given by Captain Hobson, President Campbell and others present.

CAKE AND ELLIS HAVE GOOD LEADS

PLURALITIES RANGE FROM 2300 TO 2600

Both Received Heavier Votes Than Estimated Soon After the Primaries—Cake Has 2620 More Than Fulton With Several Counties to Hear From—Ellis Is Now 2372 in the Lead.

As the official returns from the primary election come in slowly the pluralities of Cake for senator and Ellis for congress, are constantly increasing. The vote of both these gentlemen is much larger than was reported immediately after the primaries and it is evident that their strength will have been still further increased by the vote from several counties not yet counted.

The Portland Oregonian says of the official count of the primary vote as far as made at this time and of the vote received by the various candidates in the state and districts:

With complete official returns from 24 counties, complete unofficial returns from two and incomplete returns from seven, H. M. Cake leads C. W. Fulton by 2620 votes.

The official returns have given Cake gains in Baker, Clackamas, Columbia, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa and Wasco. Fulton made gains in Harney, Lane and Tillamook.

J. W. Bailey's majority for food and dairy commissioner with only three counties to fill in returns, stands at 12,615.

In the first district for railroad commissioner, Campbell has defeated Carter by 2932 votes. Campbell polled 7775 votes, Carter 5753 and Robertson 2308.

In the second district for railroad commissioner Aitchison has 7519, Hurlburt 6847, Loucks 4932, Gaston 3245, Hamilton 3339, Whiting 1309. Aitchison's plurality is 672.

With official returns missing from four counties Ellis, for representative in the second district, has 11,554, Geer 9252 and Sheuherd 8399. Ellis' plurality is 2372.

The race is close between Andrew Jackson Derby of Wasco county and John A. Jeffrey of Multnomah, for the democratic nomination for congress. The incomplete returns give Derby 1601 and Jeffrey 1429. The count in Multnomah is not complete as is evident from the incomplete returns. Jeffrey carries Multnomah by 600. He may win by a close margin.

HIGH COMPLIMENT FOR BISHOP PADDOCK

The Weston Leader pays Bishop Paddock of the eastern Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church the following deserved compliment upon his visit to Weston during the past week.

The Right Rev. R. L. Paddock, missionary bishop of the Episcopal church for eastern Oregon, held services at All Saints' Church in this city Sunday morning and evening, Monday and Tuesday evenings.

It was a great event in the history of the local church, which has been established perhaps a third of a century. It was crowded at each service, and on the final evening the bishop invited a number who could not be seated to take stations outside at the open windows which was done. Bishop Paddock made a strongly favorable impression here, which explains the crowds.

He was regarded as an earnest and deeply religious churchman, anxious to serve humanity in every way possible, and at the same time possessing a warm and winning personality, a broad catholicity, and a most kindly humor.

The bishop preaches a religion of soul sunshine and smiles; of personal purity and unselfishness; a religion not to be worn on Sunday alone and set aside as a garment, but to influence also the daily walk in business and recreation.

Tuesday evening the church had been prettily decorated with cherry blossoms. Three people were baptized and a class of five received confirmation, which class included Mrs. M. J. Cokerline, Mrs. M. A. Baker, Mrs. J. E. McDaniel, Miss Grace Cokerline and Miss May McLaughlin.

Bishop Paddock, although a very busy man, expects to come to Weston again within a month, as there were several other candidates for confirmation in prospect. He has a large territory embracing all of eastern Oregon and involving much travel by stage and buckboard. He is eager for

the task, however, being as young as it is possible for an Episcopal bishop to be—doubtless the youngest in the United States.

He is familiar with the west, having lived out here when a boy. Twenty-seven years ago his father was bishop of Oregon; but illness prevented him from coming and the late Bishop Morris took hold of the virgin field in which he won so much honor and reverence. The uncle later became bishop of Massachusetts, where he was succeeded by Phillips Brooks, the noted divine.

Bishop Paddock has been following the ministry in New York city for the past 10 years and conducted a large mission in the slums, where 250,000 people live within a square mile of space, often rent chafed off sleeping room at "five cents a flop," and seldom see the sun.

Here he lived in a little tenement apartment, just as did the poor folks whom he sought to succor from the evil effects of their squalid environment. Under his direction were a dozen or more settlement workers who had consecrated their lives to the cause of unfortunate and fallen humanity.
