TEAM CONFIDENT

BIG EXCURSION GOES TO WALLA WALLA TOMORROW

Players Expect to Take First Game of Series With Garden City Ball Tossers—Parkes Will Be in the Box for Pendleton and He Will Be Supported by Strong Lineup—Contest at Meador Park.

Tomorrow morning the baseball team will go to Walla Walla to meet with the Garden City players for the first time this year and from indications the excursion train to be run for the occasion will take half the city's population to the game.

The excursion will leave here at 9 o'clock in the morning and will reach Walla Walla shortly before noon. Returning the train will pull out of Walla Walla at 7 o'clock. For the round trip a fare of \$1.40 is given.

In the game tomorrow Pendleton will have a lineup as follows:

Parkes, pitcher; Conrad, catcher; Lorimer, first base; Van Houten, second base; Kern, third base; Lee, short stop; Baker, right field; Gray, center field, and King, left field.

All of these men have been playing together during the season and the lineup with one exception, is the same as it was in the game with La Grande last Saturday.

The game tomorrow will be played at Meador park, the new resort a few miles out from Walla Walla and it will mark the opening of the park. It is claimed by the Walla Walla people that they will have out the largest crowd that ever witnessed a ball game in that city.

CONVICT'S NARROW ESCAPE

Robert Weddle, Sent Up From This County, Is Nearly Burned.

Robert Weddle, now in the penitentiary from this county for assisting in a hold-up at Echo, narrowly escaped being burned to death in his cell last Friday night. He had covered the cell walls with coal oil and then set them afire to kill the bed bugs.

With Weddle in the cell was J. R. Barre, serving a life sentence for a murder committed in Walla Walla county. In a strenuous effort to rid their cell of bugs the two men took the oil from their cell lamps and washed the walls. They then set fire to the same. In an instant the cell was enveloped in flames and the two men were in danger of being burned to death.

According to the account from Salem, Weddle saved himself by rolling on the floor and covering himself with a blanket. Barre tried to fight the flames and was badly burned about the head and hands. There is a chance that he may not recover.

Weddle is the fellow who with Lewis perpetrated a brutal hold-up at Echo two years ago and he later escaped from the county jail only to be caught later in Spokane by Sheriff Taylor after a stirring footrace.

OFF TO THE CONVENTION.

Umatilla County Delegates Will Attend State Sunday School Meeting at Forest Grove.

Umatilla county will be well represented in the state Sunday school convention which convenes next Monday morning at Forest Grove. Six delegates at least will be in attendance from this county, and perhaps more whose names have not been learned will attend.

Those who are known to be planning to go are Mrs. S. A. Lowell, who is now in Portland on her way to Forest Grove, Mrs. W. L. Van Nuy, who went down to Portland several days ago, Rev. R. E. Storey of the First Baptist church of this city, Mrs. S. S. Shields of Milton and Mr. and Mrs. John Geiss of La Grande.

The convention will meet on Monday morning for a three-days' session, and both Mrs. Lowell and Rev. Storey of this city, are on the program for addresses.

NORTH BANK GETS GRAIN.

Montana Shipments Will Flow into The Port of Portland.

City Treasurer Evan E. Day of Kallispell, Montana, and C. B. Roberts, secretary and treasurer of C. E. Shoemaker & Co., investment brokers of that city, spent some time at the Portland Commercial club yesterday studying the publicity methods that have proved so effective in that organization, and investigating the work of the Oregon Development League, says the Oregon Daily Journal.

Kallispell has in contemplation an active campaign under the supervision of an experienced director.

"We have an abundance of material for a basis," said Mr. Roberts, "in the agricultural and timbered area directly tributary to Kallispell. With the completion of the north bank road our grain will come down hill on the Great Northern to make even greater Portland's record as a cereal shipping port."

Paul V. Maris Is Deputy.

Paul V. Maris is now a deputy dairy commissioner for Oregon, he having recently been appointed to such a position by J. W. Bailey, the state dairy and food commissioner. He is a son of N. C. Maris, the well-known field editor of the Rural Spirit, and he will render the dairy industry valuable service as he is fully competent to perform the duties required of him. His work will be in the country mainly where he will visit the dairy farms for the purpose of testing each cow's milk, ascertain the feed given to the cows and note the various methods pursued by the most successful dairymen.

Cut Pay of City Employees.

The city of Seattle has decided that hereafter all new men on city work shall receive only \$2 per day, a reduction of 50 cents over the prevailing scale. The reduction will apply to men employed hereafter only, the old men being continued on the payroll at the rate of wages that has been in force, according to advices received from that city. The new rate of wages will apply only to the men working in the city parks, and it is not expected that it will be extended to other city laborers.

Dropped Dead in Field.

Andrew Negle dropped dead Tuesday afternoon at John Weissenfluh's place while chasing a hog, says the Long Creek Ranger. He had been driving a clod smasher over newly sown ground when he noticed the hog in the field. He started to drive it out. He ran about 50 yards and walked about 50 yards and fell over. Ed and Frank Weissenfluh saw him fall and hurried to his assistance. When they arrived Mr. Negle was gasping for breath and died almost immediately.

Andrew Negle was born in Germany in 1859. He came to Grant county eight years ago.

O. R. & N. MEN ARE SATISFIED

CONFERENCE AT CHICAGO COMES TO AN END

Crews Will Not be Tied Up Away From Terminals Hereafter Unless Absolutely Necessary—When Tied Up Away from Terminal They Will Be Kept on Pay.

O. R. & N. employees are satisfied with the arrangement made with the general managers of western railroads concerning the operation of the 16-hour federal law, according to the reports of the delegates who have returned from the Chicago conference.

Under the operation of the federal law train crews had been tied up away from the terminals and had been allowed to make but 80 per cent of the mileage per month which they made before the law went into effect and a general complaint was sent up to the Harriman headquarters concerning the matter.

Instances of crews being tied up at Kamela, Meacham, Baker City, Bingham Springs and other points on the O. R. & N., away from La Grande, which is the terminal and home of the mountain crews, were taken before the conference and it is understood that satisfactory agreements have been reached. A Chicago dispatch says of the result of the conference.

The general managers of the principal roads west of Chicago and the representatives of men engaged in train service announced their agreement as to the application of the 16-hour law. Crews are not to be tied up unless it is apparent that the trip cannot be completed within the lawful time, and not then until after the expiration of 14 hours on duty under the federal law or within two hours of the time limit provided by state laws if state laws govern.

Crews tied up by a less number of hours than mentioned above are to be regarded as tied up under the law and will be paid. When crews are tied up between terminals under the law they are to be considered on duty and under pay immediately upon the expiration of the minimum legal period of off duty applicable to the crew, provided the period of rest for any member, eight or 10 hours, be the period of rest for the entire crew. Crews tied up will be paid the time or mileage of their schedules from initial point. Pay is allowed for any service for an engine crew if held responsible for the engine.

Arrested on Old Charge.

George Beard, who has managed to remain free for five years, was arrested at Lind, Adams county, last night and will be returned to Walla Walla by Deputy Sheriff Painter tomorrow to await trial on the charge of horsestealing, says the Bulletin. This makes 12 arrests on this charge that have been made by and for the Walla Walla county officers this year. It was in 1903 that the crime for which Beard is wanted, was committed. A warrant was issued for the man at the time but he skipped the country.

Deputy Sheriff Charles Painter was sheriff then and though he did all he could, was unable to locate him. He sent accurate descriptions of the man to all officers of the northwest and urged them to watch out for Beard.

As a result a message was received last night from Lind, Washington, saying that the man was under arrest and Deputy Painter left immediately for Lind.
