A GOOD TOWN, OF COURSE.

We hear the expression that Pendleton is a good town anyway, so what is the use of booster meetings, advertising funds, industrial awakening and other life-giving activities.

Even a good town would die if nothing were done to keep it alive. The finest apple tree in an orchard will quit bearing good apples if not nurtured, irrigated, pruned and cultivated constantly year by year.

It requires constant effort to maintain a good town, no matter how excellent the natural resources and surroundings. It requires constant attention to a business to keep it thriving. If it is allowed to drift it will soon become non-productive and will deteriorate.

The same is true of towns and cities. It requires constant community interest, co-operation, activity to keep the rich, warm life blood flowing through its veins without interruption.

Society requires the upbuilding processes of the churches, schools, educational forces, religious associations and other like organizations to keep the standard high. The natural tendency of community life to drift into a rut if the activities of united organizations cease.

So it is necessary in maintaining a good town to keep certain forces in activity at all times. If these forces stop, the town stagnates. We must keep shoulders under the load day by day and night by night. Boosting is simply keeping up the supply of fresh life blood in the veins of the community.

Pendleton is a good town, of course. She is a big, strong, stalwart, healthful, well developed woman, so to speak. But she must have nourishment, food, drink, life forces to keep her alive. We must not shut off the supply of these forces if we expect her to continue as she is now, a strong, beautiful, vigorous character.

HELP THE ENTERTAINMENT.

Pendleton Commercial association is preparing an entertainment for next week and the work is falling upon the shoulders of two or three people; many have refused to take part or allow their families to take part in this entertainment, although it is being given for the benefit of the association which is doing so much for the town.

Let us give this entertainment not only our support in a financial way, but let us assist those who are doing the work and preparing the features. Let us co-operate with the managers

and see that they have every assistance.

This is a public-spirited cause. It is for the good of the town. Whatever profit comes from it will go to building-up the Commercial association and through that association, Pendleton.

The entertainments heretofore have been highly successful. If the people of the city will co-operate just a little bit with the management this one will surpass all others but there must be an aroused interest in it. This is Pendleton's work. Let us do it well.

HOBSON'S PLAN APPLIED.

Suppose for argument that Hobson's plan of maintaining the biggest navy on earth, for the purpose of preserving peace, should be followed.

Would there ever be a "biggest navy?" Would not every new ship added by the United States be a challenge to England? Would she not respond by building another and a bigger? It would be an infinite program of battleship building, an endless rivalry to maintain the "biggest navy."

Let us apply the plan to individuals. Suppose a neighborhood, which is but a counterpart of the world, should undertake to maintain peace by each being strongest physically.

Suppose as long as one man in the neighborhood exceeded the others in physical strength, the others should spend their time, money, energy and vitality in taking physical culture to enable them to match this superior rival.

Suppose they spent their nights and days in developing their muscles, exerting their lung power to be able to "outwind" their big neighbor and in other physical development, to the neglect of their business.

How long would it be until this neighborhood would become a training ground for athletes, neglecting its business, allowing its industries to deteriorate, its strength sapped in this useless waste of time, energy and resources?

Would-be statesmen are not wiser than the common people nor are they more patriotic. The people want adequate defense, but they do not want to convert the nation into a navy yard with the glamor of war as the constant ideal of citizenship.

START THE WOOLEN MILL.

It is a shame to have it known that Pendleton woolen mill is standing idle. It is a discredit to the city of Pendleton and especially to the capitalists of Pendleton to advertise this fact broadcast.

Any two or three of the large property owners of this city could furnish funds on an hour's notice to start this industry and bring 50 employees to the city. There are half a dozen experienced men waiting to take hold of the proposition when funds can be secured and the knockers can be overcome.

Let us get together next Monday night in the booster meeting and see if something can be done to help Pendleton. Let us start the woolen mill and plan for other industries here. It is the height of folly to sit still and allow our industries to close and be abandoned one by one.

What will come of the town? How will property owners be able to secure an income from their property if they do nothing to keep men and industries here.

It is up to the property owners, the men who will suffer if Pendleton goes backward, to do something to help themselves. The renters and tenants have been bearing the burden long enough.

THE PEOPLE ARE STRONG.

That the unorganized common people are stronger than any organized and active political machine which may be maintained, is shown in the result of the primary election in Marion county.

In that county the machine was strongly organized against the popular election of United States senators and had determined to overthrow the will of the people. But the people nominated candidates on this principle and while they were not brilliant debaters nor experienced politicians, yet they succeeded in electing a large part of their candidates pledged to the popular election of United States senators.

It shows what the people can do if they will get together and demand their rights. The Oregon Daily Journal says of the Marion county victory: The victory, or more than half victory, for the statement No. 1 principle in Marion county is especially gratifying, and much credit therefor is due to a few earnest and vigorous republicans who led the opposition to the machine there, chief among whom was Colonel E. Hofer, editor of the Capital Journal.
