MONEYLESS WOMAN SPENT THOUSANDS

Kansas City, April 24.—A woman of refined appearance, apparently about 70 years of age, who gave her name as Mrs. Mary Louise Henry of Los Angeles, but who also went under several other names, was held by the police yesterday, but today was released because the prosecutor's office was unable to find that she had done anything criminal.

Mrs. Henry's case is peculiar. She came here over a month ago and opened negotiations with local bankers to buy securities to the amount of close to \$250,000 and dealt with others for valuable realty and furniture.

No Money Put Up. None of the deals was closed, for after working them up Mrs. Henry invariably told those with whom she was dealing that her money had not yet arrived. She bargained for a \$5000 house and gave it to newly found friends, "because they had been kind to her," as she said. She also purchased furniture for the house, and on Saturday last, when it did not arrive, went down town to ascertain the cause. She did not return, and yesterday the police took her in

charge. No charge was made against her.

"You have no cause to detain me," said Mrs. Henry. "Even if my money should not come, I have done nothing that you need bother about. I can back up everything I have started. I have been a widow 35 years, and have lived in Los Angeles, where I have plenty of property, 17 years. I have a wealthy daughter in New York and a son in Cuba. I have been in Kansas City a month and a half. I know that Kansas City is a good place to invest and want to make this a half way place, where I may stop going back and forth from New York to California from my daughter's home to my own."

Derived No Benefit. Today, after questioning the woman, Jay M. Lee, the assistant prosecutor, said: "She has defrauded no one and has not benefited herself a penny in her transactions. Efforts were made to learn from Mrs. Henry names and addresses of some of her relatives and friends. She declared George Arnold, her cousin, is in New York, with about \$300,000 of her money."

FOR HORSE STEALING.

Gang Operating Near Wallula Is Being Broken Up.

Richard Tycke, of Wallula, who is out on \$1000 bonds awaiting trial on the charge of horsetealing, was arrested at Wallula by Deputy Sheriff John Cummins this morning on another charge of horsetealing, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. The warrant was issued out of the superior court. Tycke is accused of being an accomplice of Rolla Warner, who was arrested at Wallula night before last and brought to jail yesterday to await trial.

Tycke will be brought to Walla Walla tomorrow morning and an effort will be made to secure his release on bonds.

This will make two cases against this man to be heard at the coming term of the superior court.

Richard Tycke, together with his father, John Tycke, and brother, John Tycke, Jr., was arrested about six weeks ago on a charge of horsetealing. The Tycke family was accused of being in league with Kruger and Anderson, who were arrested in Oregon. They secured their release on bonds and Richard Tycke is now accused of continuing the work of horsetealing.

Warner was taken while he had four horses claimed to be other than his own. Warner, himself, had just escaped prosecution in Pendleton on an old warrant he having been arrested a couple of weeks ago by John Cummins. He was taken to Pendleton, where he got out of the trouble.

NO MORE JAPS EMPLOYED.

Marion County Berry Growers to Employ White People.

White women and children are to be given work picking loganberries the ensuing summer in preference to Japanese by A. M. Aspinwall, an extensive grower of these berries, at Brooks, Marion county, says the Salem Statesman.

Mr. Aspinwall has written to G. W. Parsons, president of the Federated Trades Council at Portland, asking him to use his influence in procuring help in Portland, and Mr. Parsons will do what he can in the matter, although the work being peculiarly adapted for women and children does not come under the head of occupations covered by organized labor.

Mr. Aspinwall says in his letter that he has been approached by persons in the interest of Japanese labor, offering to engage as many of the orientals as he desires, but he prefers giving employment to people of his own race, if they can be procured.

The berries will be ripe enough to pick about June 15, and the picking will furnish work to 125 persons for about six weeks. The pickers will camp out in their own tents, in a fine oak grove, where they can get all the wood and water they want for cooking purposes.

The picking will therefore resemble an outing in the hopfields, though much earlier in the season, hops not being ready to pick until September 1.

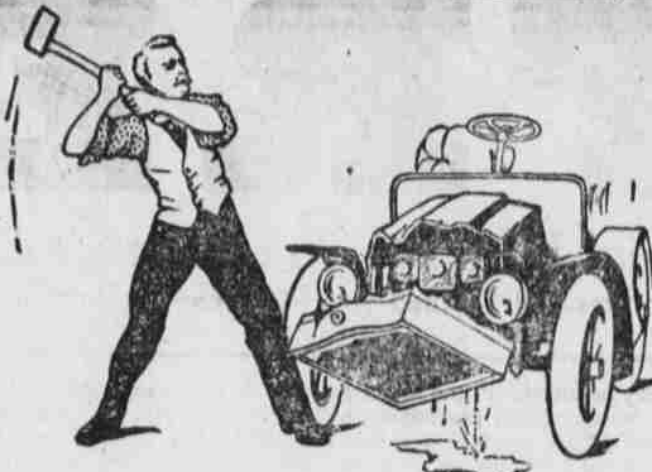
LA FOLLETTE LEADS IN IDAHO.
