SPEEDY JUSTICE

MEN CAUGHT STEALING DRAW ONE YEAR EACH

Perjuring Sacks from Furnish Warehouse Friday Evening, They Are Arrested by Deputy Sheriff Wilson—Plead Guilty When Arraigned This Morning and Sentenced by Bean.

Speedy Justice was this morning given Harry McCoy and John Ericson, two transients who were caught by Deputy Sheriff Bert Wilson last evening while robbing the Furnish warehouse. The men were taken into custody shortly after 6 o'clock last night; this morning they were arraigned, pleaded guilty and were sentenced to serve a year each in the penitentiary.

Had the men been taken to Salem this afternoon they would have been inside the pen within a little more than 24 hours after they committed the crime.

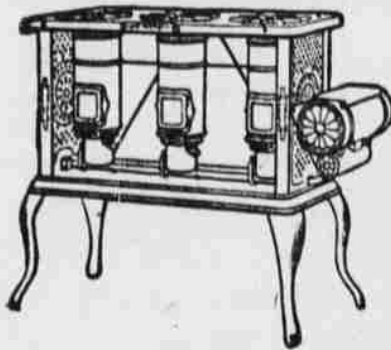
About 6 o'clock last evening Wilson was in the vicinity of the Furnish warehouse, now owned by the Pacific Coast Elevator company, when he noticed the two men acting in a suspicious manner. At this time they were carrying a couple of bundles of sacks and the general appearance of things looks suspicious to the deputy sheriff.

After questioning the two fellows to some extent Wilson became satisfied that they had stolen the sacks from the warehouse and he placed them under arrest.

On the way to the jail the party met Chief of Police Gurdane, who was hurrying to the scene. Over the phone he had been informed by Judge Fitz Gerald's son that two men had broken into the warehouse and he was after them. But in the meantime the deputy sheriff had been "Johnny-on-the-spot" and there was nothing for the police department to do.

After Indian Lands.

The local United States land office is in receipt daily of inquiries from all parts of the country, but particularly from Seattle and other Sound cities regarding the opening of the Yakima reservation, says the Yakima Republic. Some of these inquiries are of a most elaborate description. One correspondent, supposedly a clerk in a well known wholesale business house of Seattle, sent along a string of questions, many of which could not be answered definitely even by the secretary of the interior himself, at this time.

It is satisfactory to note that so much interest is taken in the opening of the reservation for it insures quite an influx of settlers when the opening takes place. According to the official reports of the department, the reservation is to be opened this year, but there is reason to doubt whether all of the preliminary work will be completed in time.

Will Buy 75,000 Sheep.

The state land board at a meeting held this afternoon set June 1 as the date upon which 80,000 acres of the Salmon river project will be opened for settlement, says the Boise Capital News.

The construction of the dam in the Salmon river for irrigating the land will be commenced in a short time. A large amount of cement will be used in the construction of this dam.

In regard to the opening of 80,000 acres to be held June 1, Mr. Hays, attorney for the company, stated that the water rights will sell for \$40, the first payment of \$3 being due at the time of filing and the first of the deferred payments being due in 1911.
