

METHODISTS IN GREAT MEETING

WORLD CONFERENCE OPENS IN BALTIMORE NEXT FRIDAY

Practically Every Country on the Globe Will Be Represented With Delegates—Many College Men Attend—Four Bishops to Be Elected—Several Questions of Importance Coming Up.

Friday next will be one of the most important world conferences known. The general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church opens the first of May in Baltimore.

There will be delegates from 129 conferences. These are found in every state in the union, in South America, in China, India, Japan, Korea, Africa and in the various nations of Europe.

There will be about 800 delegates. Many of these are college men, as the 244 colleges and universities in Methodism have sent their presidents largely to this great law-making body which meets every four years.

This is not the largest body for the Ecumenical conference which meets every 10 years is a larger body, representing every branch of Methodism of which there are 16.

A great many questions of importance will come before this body. It is expected now that there will be 10 new bishops to elect. Dr. Quale, Dr. Anderson, Dr. Eckman, and others, are in the field for this place and have a very large following. The question of the election of presiding elders, the districting of the bishops, the elimination of paragraph 248, the consolidation of the book concerns, and the union of all Methodism will be some of the features brought before this body, and then the union of all the churches in closer ties of fraternity work in which the M. E. church is taking a very active part now.

In Japan and in Canada this union spirit has taken active form and is now a real fact in the working of the church there. It is more than likely that a new bishop will preside over the destinies of the Columbia River conference this coming fall, which meets in Wenatchee, taking in all this territory in eastern Oregon, as well as eastern Washington and northern Idaho.

M'NAUGHT AT YAKIMA.

Hermiston Irrigationist Looking Over Eastern Washington.

J. F. McNaught, of Hermiston, Ore., is in North Yakima a guest at the Hotel Yakima, says the Yakima Republic. He is here studying irrigation. But it is not in connection with irrigation that Mr. McNaught is known to the people of this city and district. He is the man who first thought out in a definite way the street railway problem for North Yakima and the surrounding country. That was five years ago.

He had plans and surveys and a great deal of data and he believed this to be the most promising field for a street railway company. The Northern Pacific railroad, however, could not see it that way. At least it could not be convinced that the project was not backed by some rival railroad and North Yakima lost that opportunity for an electric railway line into the highways and byways of this great country.

The conditions are different today. The country has developed greatly and the success of a street railway is no longer problematical. Other railroad lines are coming and the freight will go to the railroad having feeders into the freight producing districts. The ideas which Mr. McNaught thought out are being put into effect. But he has not investigated the street railway project though it is altogether probable he will before leaving here.

He is at this time manager of an irrigation project at Hermiston, Ore., and came to North Yakima to study irrigation, this being the fountain head of all that is progressive and

definite in that respect. There is quite a gathering here of irrigation lights at this time.

In addition to the resident officials of the reclamation service there are in North Yakima now W. H. Code, the federal engineer in charge of irrigation works on the various reservations, the manager and attorney of the service at Sunnyside, and one or two Hanford officials.

Beet Thinning Begins.

Field Superintendent Sebbelov states that the thinning of the beet fields will commence Monday unless the work is interfered with on account of rain. About half of the total acreage is now sown and the plants have appeared above the ground and are in fine condition. Mr. Sebbelov expects to send a quantity of beet seed to Walla Walla county in a few days, and he will also go to that county and meet with the farmers to confer with them on the subject of sugar beet culture.

San Francisco, April 24.—George E. Littell, said to be the most daring and cunning confidence operator in the country, appeared before the United States commissioner Heacock, today, for examination for removal to Seattle for trial on the charge of impersonating a federal officer.

Little was arrested in Oakland a week ago on the complaint of Mrs. Josephine Daubney of Seattle. He is alleged to have wooed her and secured \$740 from her while representing himself to be in the federal service. Littell, according to the secret service men, has made a trade of wooing women and getting their money and jewels. Women are said to be relating to the secret service men in New Orleans, Chicago, New York, Boston, Denver and San Francisco, facts of former swindles of this nature.

THE MODEL AUTOMOBILE.

Ideal Car Is Soon to be Within the Reach of All.

The soundless, smooth-running, perfectly flexible car—what I like to call the Gentleman's car, because a gentleman can drive it without violence to good-breeding or to his finer aesthetic appreciation—is not far distant today, says Herbert L. Towles in the May Scribner.

Most of its elements are already present, some on this car, some on that, and in time they or their equivalents will be united in all the best machines. Because of its almost perfect smoothness and flexibility—its appeal to the aesthetic sense in short—I look to see the "six" accepted as highwater mark of excellence for cars of over, say, 24 horse power, until the time, now indefinitely remote, when the gas or steam turbine is made a success for vehicle propulsion.

In lower powers the vibration of "four" is not so marked as to thrust itself on the passenger's notice, and the flexibility, while not perfect, is sufficient for the moderate speeds intended.

Another point worth naming, in connection with flexibility, is weight. A heavy car with a given engine accelerates correspondingly slower than a light car, and the effect on the driver is nearly as demoralizing as that of an engine which will not run slow. The present tendency is for luxurious body equipment to run away with ease and delicacy of control; and this has a further ill effect in multiplying the troubles, which are a notable destroyer of the motorists' peace of mind.

Light weight means higher cost for materials and workmanship, but it is worth all it costs. I do not believe a "cheap" machine will ever be quite satisfactory as a Gentleman's car, though when it is now it may run as smoothly as the best; but on the other hand, with due progress in manufacturing skill, it will not be necessary to pay a fancy figure to secure perfect running qualities. We shall not need to revise our definition of the word gentleman to fit the owner of the Gentleman's car of tomorrow.

CONSTITUTION FOR WOMAN'S CLUB

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name of this Association shall be the WOMAN'S PERSONAL APPEARANCE CLUB.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be the improvement of the natural appearance of each of its members.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. Membership in this Club shall be of two classes, Active and Passive.

Section 2. Active Membership shall be limited to those who intelligently devote a reasonable share of their time to the object of this Association.

Section 3. Passive Membership shall be confined to those who, while disinclined to investigate the opportunities for personal improvement, are willing to accept the advice of those who do.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The offices of President, First and Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be honorary in character, and may be assumed, at will, by any member, when such assumption advances the good of the cause.

ARTICLE V.

MEETINGS.

Section 1. Regular meetings may occur upon bright days, following the careful preparation of members for the purpose.

Section 2. No member shall be admitted to any regular meeting whose appearance does not instantly stamp her a member of the Club.

Section 3. Special or unexpected meetings between members may occur at any time or place; therefore each member should at all times be mindful of her membership and never appear untidy or be seen with dull, brittle or unsightly hair.

ARTICLE VI.

QUORUM.

Section 1. One member shall constitute a quorum for the execution of any plan or the use of any phylactic not out of harmony with the object of the Association.

Section 2. Upon special occasions a larger number may constitute a quorum, provided the purpose of the meeting interests and instructs those who are known to be loyal to the Club.

ARTICLE VII.

AMENDMENTS.

Section 1. But one amendment is permissible under this Constitution.

Section 2. Article III may be amended by the addition of a section permitting Auxiliary Members.

Section 3. Any married man may become an Auxiliary Member by promptly and cheerfully purchasing—for his own family—such toilet remedies or requisites as may be desired by an Active or Passive Member.

NOTE 1. It is passing strange that we have no clubs for the improvement of one's natural appearance; "a back to nature club," so to speak. We certainly need them, for we all know that one lecture by a capable dermatologist would be more helpful to the complexion than a ton of beauty lotion.

ASK FLEET TO STAY ON PACIFIC

GOVERNORS OF STATES MAKE CONCERTED REQUEST

Petition to Be Presented to Secretary Metcalf at Breakfast to Be Given in His Honor in San Francisco—Thousands of Signatures Have Been Received.

San Francisco, April 24.—Arguments from all governors of the Pacific states accompanied by petitions will be served on Secretary of the navy Metcalf when the fleet arrives to convince him that it is necessary to leave a large detachment of the fleet in the Pacific.

The petition is to be presented to the secretary on the morning of May 6 at a breakfast in his honor at the St. Francis hotel just before the fleet arrives. Copies of it have been sent to Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Alaska, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, Hawaii, and the Philippine islands. Many thousands of signatures have been received. Governors Mead, Gooding and Chamberlain are among those invited to attend the breakfast.
