REVISED PLANS FOR THE CELILO CANAL

Slowly the work of opening the great Columbia river to transportation is proceeding. For years the people of the inland empire have hoped for an open river to the sea and now this hope seems about to be realized.

Revised plans of the government canal between The Dalles and Celilo will be forwarded to Washington soon for approval. Colonel S. W. Roessler, United States Corps engineer, is at present securing right of way in places where the new plans alter the course of the canal.

He believes this will be accomplished without much delay, since the owners of the land are willing to accept in lieu thereof other land relinquished by the change.

No actual construction work has been under way on the canal since the completion of the last contract several weeks ago, but Colonel Roessler states that it will be resumed as soon as the new plans are approved and money appropriated.

Future progress will depend altogether upon how liberally congress provides funds, but the engineer in charge believes the canal could be completed in four or five years should all necessary money be made available when desired.

The canal extends from Big Eddy

to Celilo, a distance of eight and a half miles, and when completed will furnish the key to the problem of cheap transportation from the Columbia river basin to Portland.

"The plans of the canal have been revised in several important features," said Colonel Roessler in discussing the work, "and no actual construction work can be done until these plans are approved. I have eliminated a number of curves shown in the original plan, and have projected an extra lock and have redesigned the whole question of foundations where embankments cross gravel and sand."

"These changes are completed and negotiations are now under way with a view of getting permission of owners of land adjoining the right of way to exchange some of their land for portions of the existing right of way where we propose to eliminate the curves."

"It would be difficult to predict when the canal might be completed since the rate of work depends altogether upon the appropriations. It is estimated that the whole project will involve the greater part of \$5,000,000, and so far about one-fifth of that amount has been provided."

Colonel Roessler states that the new plan will not materially change the cost of construction.

BAKER TEAM DEFEATED.

Astoria Won Laurels of Debate From Eastern Oregon.

By defeating the Baker City high school debating team last night the Astoria team has constituted itself one of the two teams that will contest in May at Eugene for the high school debating championship of the state, says an Astoria item. Its opponent in the final contest will be the Lebanon team.

The debate here last night was on the question of proportional representation in the lower house of the state legislature. The home team, composed of Jennie Jeffers, Birdie Wise and Carl Thomas, had the affirmative. The Baker City team is composed of William Hermans, Frank McCullough and Ray Barton. The judges were L. R. Alderman, city superintendent of Eugene schools; Professor F. G. Young of the University of Oregon, and Rev. C. C. Rorick, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of this city. Their vote was unanimous for the Astoria team.

After the debate the Astorians gave a banquet in honor of the visitors and judges. Covers were laid for 60 at the Occident hotel.

The final debate will be held at Eugene, May 15, when the victorious team will be presented with a silver cup. Great enthusiasm for the home team prevailed during the debate last night.

Lose 4000 Ties.

Rumble & McCully, who had 18,000 ties manufactured along Looking Glass creek, lost about 5000 of the number last Sunday night as the result of the pressure of the high waters taking out their boom, says the Elgin Recorder. The boom had been constructed with a view of permanence and but little fear had been entertained regarding the safety of the ties, and the loss was a surprise to the owners. The extreme warm weather Sunday and the few days preceding caused a great rush of water, however, which the dam was unable to withstand. Seven thousand of the ties had been taken out prior to the rush of high water and this fact is all that saved the entire amount from being swept into Grande Ronde river.

A few thousand ties still remain in the creek that will be recovered. The loss to the owners will be in the neighborhood of \$1500, as those which were swept into the river will never be recovered.

This is the second time in which a great loss has been sustained in ties getting away in the Looking Glass, as W. D. Graves of this city lost 18,000 in November, 1907, by the breaking of a dam, caused by unexpected high waters. The financial loss entailed by Mr. Graves was in the neighborhood of \$4500.

Shoe Thief Gets Four Years.

M. Smith, who was arrested a few nights ago while in the act of attempting to sell shoes on the streets, was Saturday afternoon sentenced by Judge Crawford to four years in the penitentiary, says the La Grande Star. Smith was kept in jail a few days after his arrest pending further investigation of the circumstances by the local police and the railroad company's detective. The prisoner agreed to divulge the place where the goods, stolen from a freight car, had been secreted and this was about all the information that could be gained.

Four suspects of the business of box car rustling were arrested at Pendleton last week and four others are in custody at Walla Walla. It is the belief on the part of the officials that they are all of the same gang, that they are well organized and that in addition to robbing the railroad company of goods in transit, the gang also carries what would be known as "side lines," such as burglary and in fact anything that promises the opportunity of speedy money.

Rosalie, Wash., is to have a model farm. The chamber of commerce has secured a 20-acre tract and is arranging to plant and cultivate it in conformity with the theories of the agricultural college experts who are advocating the theory of diversified farming.
