N. P. OFFICIALS TOUR THE LINES

PARTY OF 15 IN PEN-

DLETON ON SUNDAY.

Purpose of Visit to Inspect the Lines and Confer Together on the Management—North Bank Line Was Found in Good Condition With Increasing Business.

Fifteen Northern Pacific officials were in the city Sunday in a special train, on a tour of inspection and to hold a conference for the benefit of the heads of departments. The train came in from Pasco about noon and returned north late in the afternoon. The officials came up from Vancouver over the north bank on a tour of inspection over that recently completed line and found it in excellent condition with constantly increasing business.

Those in the party were Third Vice President C. M. Levy, of St. Paul; H. C. Nutt, general manager of the Western division; F. B. Clark, president of the north bank of Spokane. Portland & Seattle line; Henry Blakeley, general western traffic agent, of Tacoma; A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of Portland; J. L. De Force, superintendent of the Pasco division; E. Crosby, superintendent of motive power and machinery; C. M. Simonson, superintendent of tracks, bridges and buildings; Assistant Superintendent J. G. Cutler, of Walla Walla, and General Agent S. B. Calderhead, of Walla Walla.

The party was accompanied by Mrs. Levy and Mrs. Charlton, who, with Mr. Clark, returned to Portland from this city last night.

ABOUT WESTON POTATO SALE.

List of Those Who Contributed to 30-Car Shipment.

The Weston Leader says of the sale of 30 carloads of Weston Mountain potatoes noted in the East Oregonian last week:

In all 30 carloads were sold from \$10 to \$11 per ton, or a little better than 50 cents a sack, \$400 being the total number of sacks negotiated. These will be shipped next week, and Mr. Jarman will have the sign, "Weston Mountain Potatoes," painted in large letters for each car.

DRY LAND IS NOT DESERT.

Ruling of Blackfoot Land Office Changes Conditions.

A large number of entrymen on lands in Oneida county are much interested in the ruling of the register and receiver of the Blackfoot land office in the case of Nelson vs. Jorgensen, holding that lands where a crop of grain can be grown by dry farming are not desert lands, says the Boise Statesman.

Jorgensen, after taking his land, before obtaining water by means of the completion of a canal system secured seed wheat especially adaptable to dry farm lands, the same variety of grain that has been extensively experimented with at the agricultural college at Salt Lake, and planting a number of acres, reaped a fairly good crop.

Nelson thereupon started a contest upon the ground that the land was not desert land in that his crop had been grown, and the local officers sustained his contention. Attorney J. H. Peterson of Boise represented the contestee and Attorney John Jones of Blackfoot the contestant.

A case involving identically the same question, as to the character of these lands, was recently decided by the register and receiver of the Boise land office, who held adversely to the decision in this case.

There is a vast acreage of such land in Oneida county, where desert entries have been made, which, if this connection is sustained, on appeal, will be liable to cancellation. These lands are of the character for the entry of which the Smoot dry farm bill was designed.
