

GREAT MEETING OF CATHOLICS

MOST NOTABLE CELEBRATION OF THE CHURCH IN AMERICA

Eminent Prelates of This and Other Countries Gathering at New York to Celebrate Centennial of Empire State Diocese—Two Cardinals Participate in Week's Program—Requiem for Deceased Bishops.

New York, April 28.—The most notable Catholic celebration in the history of the church in America will be held in New York during the week and has attracted to the city some of the most eminent prelates of this and other countries. The celebration marks the beginning of the second century of the diocese of New York, which was created in 1808 by Pope Pius VII.

Two cardinals will participate in the week's program, Cardinal Logue, Archbishop of Armagh, in Ireland, the diocese founded by St. Patrick, and Cardinal Gibbons. In addition there will be present Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul; Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia; Archbishop Quigley of Chicago; Archbishop Keane of Dubuque; Archbishop Messmer of Milwaukee; Archbishop Riordan of San Francisco, and many bishops and the apostolic delegate to this country, the Most Rev. Diomedo Falconio.

First Big Event.

The first important event of the week will take place tomorrow morning, beginning with a solemn pontifical mass in the cathedral. Cardinal Logue, Archbishop of Armagh, will be the celebrant, and Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore, the preacher. At 8 p. m. solemn pontifical vespers in the cathedral. Most Rev. Diomedo Falconio, D. D., apostolic delegate, will be the celebrant, and Most Rev. John J. Glennon, D. D., Archbishop of St. Louis, the preacher. Wednesday, at 10 a. m., solemn mass in the cathedral, at which the children from the parochial schools of the diocese will assist and sing the chant of the mass, and will listen to a special sermon, for the occasion. At 8 p. m. there will be a grand mass-meeting of the laity at Carnegie hall.

Requiem for Dead.

Thursday, at 10 a. m., solemn pontifical mass of requiem in the Cathedral for the deceased bishops and priests of the diocese. At 8 p. m. a reception will be tendered to the visiting prelates at the Catholic club. The festival week will close with a parade of the Catholic societies on Saturday, at 2 p. m., when 40,000 members of Catholic societies are expected to be in the line of march.

The first bishop of the New York diocese was the Right Rev. Luke Concanen, who was consecrated on April 24, 1808, and died in 1810. The second head of the diocese was Bishop John Connolly, 1814 to 1825; he was followed by Bishop John Dubois, who presided from 1825 to 1842. In the latter year he was succeeded by Bishop John Hughes, one of the ablest prelates the Catholic church in America has produced. Bishop Hughes became the first archbishop on the elevation of the see in 1850, and died in 1864. He was followed by Cardinal McCloskey, who was archbishop from 1864 to 1885, and who in turn was succeeded by Archbishop Corrigan, since whose death in 1902 Archbishop Farley has presided over the diocese. St. Patrick's cathedral was begun in 1858 and consecrated in 1879.

Diocese Territory.

Geographically, the diocese comprises the Boroughs of Manhattan, the Bronx, and Richmond, the counties of Dutchess, Orange, Putnam, Rockland, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester, and the Bahama Islands. Its territorial extent is more than 9000 square miles.

Some History.

Until 1808, New York was included in the diocese of Baltimore. When

first separated, it comprised the entire states of New York and New Jersey. The members in both states in 1808 numbered but 15,000. Today in the same territory there are 3,000,000 members. In 1808 there was in New York city but one church, the Church of St. Peter, standing at Church and Barclay streets, and one parochial school, while the priests numbered but four or five. Today there are 2500 priests in the same territory. In the New York diocese alone there are now 1,200,000 members, 130 churches, and 135 schools, with 65,000 pupils. In addition to this, there are many hospitals, orphanages, asylums and other charitable institutions.

BROOKLYN HORSE SHOW.

Notable Spring Society Event Opens This Evening.

New York, April 28.—Brooklyn's notable spring society event, the sixteenth annual horse show of the Brooklyn Riding and Driving club, opens this evening and promises to be more interesting than ever to lovers of good horses, as well as affording the Brooklyn dames and damsels the opportunity to display their spring finery.

Horse centers in various parts of the country are represented among the entries and the show will be much more than a local event. Brooklyn horse owners have many fine animals and in recent shows have been strong competitors for the Manhattan horsemens.

Thirty-nine classes have been provided and all are well filled. For harness horses there are 10 classes, with prizes of \$50 and \$25, for light, middle and heavyweights, singles and pairs; ladies' pairs and singles, runabout horses and best collection of three. Two classes are for tandems, one for park fours for the Loesser cup, and one for road fours. Then there are classes for broughams, with appointments, ponies in harness, maidens and combination horses. In the saddle-horse classes there are 10 classes, of which one is for registered horses, one for best trained horses, and one for five plaited horses. Polo ponies will also have a class. For jumpers there are four classes, and the Brooklyn Eagle cup for gig horses is up for competition. The other classes are five in number, and open only to members of the club. The judges will be as follows:

Harness horses, four-in-hand, tandems—J. W. Ogden, New York, and Robert A. Fairbairn, Westfield, N. J. Saddle horses—L. E. Waring, New York.

Hunters and jumpers—Richard Newton, Jr., New York.

Polo ponies—William A. Hazard, New York, and Louis E. Stoddard, New Haven, Conn.

INTERNATIONAL BILLIARDS. Real Battle Will be Between American and French Champions.

New York, April 28.—Five players will constitute the "field" in the international amateur billiard championship at 18.2 balkline, which will begin tonight in the concert hall of the Liederkranz club, under the auspices of the National Association of Amateur Billiard Players. The winner will hold the world's amateur title at the 18.2 style of game.

The entrants are Lucien De Rolle, representing France; Calvin Demarest and C. F. Conklin, both of the Chicago A. A.; J. F. Foggenburg, New York, and E. W. Gardner, Passaic, N. J. Experts believe that the real battle will be between De Rolle, the champion of the French Amateur Billiard Federation, and Calvin Demarest, the American national champion.

In making conditions for the play in the tournament, the committee ceded the wish of the Amateur Federation of France, that the size of the balls used shall be larger than is usual in America, the standard fixed being 2 3/8 inches in diameter, the games to be of 400 points, with the anchor shot barred.

A SQUARE DEAL FOR INDIANS

MOVEMENT TO PROTECT REDS FROM RAPACIOUS

Inter-State Conference of Heads of Indian Tribes Now in Session—Prominent Educators and Philanthropists Meet With Them—Land-Grabbers and Politicians to be Guarded Against.

Riverside, Cal., April 28.—A movement to give the Indians of the far west a square deal and to protect them from the rapacity of the land-grabbers and politicians was launched here today at an interstate conference of heads of Indian tribes, well-known educators and philanthropists. The greatest object of the conference, which will continue through three days, is to open the eyes of the interior department and of the people to the utter incapability of the Indians to compete in a commercial way with their white neighbors. Dr. David Starr Johnson, president of Stanford University, is one of the leaders in the movement.

It is declared that thousands of western Indians are now landless and homeless, and on the point of starvation, because of their inability to cope with the unscrupulous whites who have robbed them of their possessions. It is admitted that their effort to educate the Indians to the standards of white men's civilization, while successful in some individual instances, has been largely a failure and that other methods of conserving the interests of the native Americans will have to be devised.

A state convention of the California Fruit Growers' association was also opened here today and has attracted a large number of delegates. The session will last four days.
