STUDENTS DO SURVEYING.

U. of O. Party Goes Out to Black Butte to Do Practical Work.

That the students of the University of Oregon engage in practical work along with their text book training is shown by the following from the Oregon Weekly, the official organ of the U. of O.:

A party of mining engineering students left Thursday evening to visit the quick silver mine at Black Butte, near Cottage Grove. The party is under the supervision of Engineer Walter M. Eaton, as Prof. Arthur C. Terrell, head of the mining department, is at present in California.

While at the mine the students will divide into two parties to survey the mine, making all possible computations regarding the mile or more of tunnels belonging to the mine. The Black Butte quicksilver mine, which is located 18 miles south of Cottage Grove, is the best equipped mine in Lane county, and is known throughout the mining world for certain patented improvements which are installed there.

The study of this mine and the conditions under which it is worked will be of great value to the students. They have had the trip in prospect for some time and have made elaborate preparation for the work in hand. Night after night they have crept into the attic of Deady Hall and in the pitchy darkness which prevails there in the wee sma' hours, have piled plumb line and figured by dim candle light.

They say that the four-story winding stairway of Deady very much resembles in the dark the shafts of a mine, and as they have computed it thoroughly, they anticipate no trouble with the more practical work which they have set out to do. Prof. Stafford, Dr. Shinn, A. J. Elton and Walter McIntyre will follow Monday to assist Mr. Eaton's group in its investigation.

NEW SIDEWALKS.

North Side of River making Improvements in Streets and Walks.

In no part of the city has there been such changes wrought in condition of streets and walks during the past few weeks as in North Pendleton.

Portions of Jackson, Garfield, Madison, Monroe, Washington, Perkins, Bush and Wilson streets have been placed on grade while new sidewalks have been constructed along each of these. Among the last walks to be built is one block of concrete along the west side of Madison between Jackson and Washington and a concrete walk along the Jackson street side of the Johnson half of the block between Monroe and Madison. Two blocks of wooden walk have also been built on the west side of Perkins avenue, between Jackson and Wilson streets.

Th graders are still at work on Garfield street and as soon as they are through, still other walks will be constructed.

These improvements have also served as an inspiration in other lines. One handsome new residence is well under way, another has been announced, while the paint brush and muck rake have been used industriously.

Lands Ruined By Water.

It is as important to consider the drainage of irrigated lands as their watering.

Much land last season at Yakima never had the water turned upon it any time during the year. The land had been formerly over-watered and was souring. Without water the crops markedly increased.

Still we feel like publicly warning purchasers against over-watering. Soak the soil thoroughly and deeply during the cooler months of winter and early spring, but use the water afterwards very sparingly or in fact not at all.
